# Organization Chart



The School Resource Officer (SRO) is responsible for providing security and crime prevention services at Westchester Public Schools District 92½, as well as Divine Infant Jesus and Divine Providence schools, Britten School, St. Joseph High School, and Immanuel Christian Academy. The SRO operates off the TRIAD concept that reflects the philosophy of the SRO program and adheres to the following roles: Teacher/Guest Speaker; Informal Counselor; Law Enforcement Officer. The SRO also works closely with school administrators in an effort to create a safer environment for both students and staff. Additional duties included mentoring, coordinating investigative procedures between Police and school administrators, checking for residency and truancy, organizing and

then performing safety drills, and conducting presentations on youth-related issues. The SRO plays an integral role in the school system and has a positive impact on the students that the SRO is involved with.

Through the SRO all schools within the community are part of the School Safety Information Sharing Program of the Statewide Terrorism & Intelligence Center (STIC). The program provides a monthly newsletter and webinars.

The SRO also assists at school dances and at the Middle School graduation providing security and traffic control. At the end of the school day the SRO works closely with the Westchester Public Library to ensure students visiting are in compliance with library policies in regards to behavior and conduct.

Some of the highlights of the SRO program, over 2016 included the following classroom presentations:

- "No Bullying Allowed"... a program that addresses bullying and cyber bullying at various grade levels.
- Implemented Sexual Abuse Prevention/Stranger Danger education (Erin's Law) to the District
- Veterans Day
- "A Dose of Reality"... a program that addresses drug and alcohol related issues at the High School level.
- Unity Day... last week of October
- Red Ribbon Week... a full week of programs including drug awareness, personal awareness, stranger danger and others at public and private schools during the month of October.
- Career Day... offers middle and high school students an opportunity to learn about law enforcement.
- "Police Officers Role in the Community"... for various grade levels.

#### COMMUNITY RELATIONS UNIT/CRIME PREVENTION

The Westchester Police Department's Community Relations Unit (CRU) is charged with the responsibility of establishing positive communication, to share concerns, perspectives, ideas and solutions to crime between the community and the Department. While all police officers are obligated to project a positive and professional image of the Department, the CRU assisted and created avenues in which to accomplish this task.

The Departments Crime Prevention Officer (CPO) serves as a liaison between the Department and the community, and is responsible for designing and implementing community programming in the areas of crime prevention, personal safety and neighborhood protection. The officer of this unit focused on projects that the Department could implement to enhance services to the community and to improve the quality of life.

The CPO maintains a social media page on Facebook to provide more transparency and enhance networking capabilities with the public. The Westchester Police Department uses the popular social networking site to more effectively provide timely information to the community.

- How to observe, recognize, and report suspicious activity
- How to improve home security and personal safety
- How to identify ownership of property through 'Operation Identification'.
- How to deter criminal behavior through Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)

#### Scenario Based Training











# WESTCHESTER POLICE DEPARTMENT







The Elderly Service Officer (ESO) deals with the needs and problems of the senior community, and plays a more active role in helping members of the senior community protect themselves against violence and fraudulent crime. The Departments ESO serves as an advocate and is versed in the aging process, elder abuse and neglect, communication skills, and crime prevention programs for seniors. The officer could be contacted if assistance was needed with anything from reporting a crime against a senior citizen to senior crime prevention help. The ESO could also direct seniors and their families to a multitude of county and state resources that specialize in assisting seniors.

Through AgeOptions the ESO was connected with the Illinois Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) Program. The SMP Program empowered consumers to prevent healthcare fraud. Each month information is posted on the Departments social media page on Facebook to more effectively provide timely information to seniors within the community.

The ESO presents at various venues throughout the area. Some of the highlights of the ESO program, over 2016 included the following presentations and topics:

- S.A.F.E. Senior program S.A.F.E. stands for Safety, Abuse, and Fraud Education. The purpose of the program is to educate seniors about home and personal safety, elder abuse, neglect, financial exploitation, and con games and fraud schemes.
- Smartphone Safety For Tech-Shy Seniors
- KNOX-BOX program A Knox-Box enables firefighter-paramedics rapid entry to your home without damage if you're not home or unable to open the door.
- Care Trak program This is telemetry based tracking for people at risk. The equipment is used to locate Alzheimer's
  wanderers and children with special needs such as Autism, Down syndrome and other conditions and bring them home
  safely.

#### Citizen Police Academy (CPA) -

The CPA, which was run by Ofc. Rob Verber, is one of the most popular and successful programs with the community. The Westchester Police Department brought back the CPA in 2016 by hosting a fall/winter session. The 10-week program was designed to give the participants a working knowledge of the Westchester Police Department. It consisted of a series of classes and discussions held once a week. There was NO COST to anyone who lived or worked in the Village of Westchester.

The classes provide an in-depth view into various areas of law enforcement to include crime prevention, patrol, investigations, gangs, juvenile crime, traffic safety, firearms, terrorism, and K-9 unit. It is an educational and informative program that allows residents the opportunity to learn about the issues that affect law enforcement efforts in the Village of Westchester, and how to develop a partnership with the police department.

#### Westchester Park District Safety "U" program -

Sponsored by the Park District in June and co-taught by both the Police and Fire Department the weeklong two-hour class taught children age 5-7 years old about strangers, seatbelt safety, how to call 911, fire safety, poisons, school bus evacuation/safety, bike safety, playground safety and water safety.



#### Cyber Safety -

The Westchester Public Library hosted Ofc. Verber's 'Cyber Guide For Parents' presentation. Upon completion of the presentation parents were empowered to answer the following questions and covered topics such as: Who is my child talking with? What apps is my child using? How to perform a search of your child's computer. Internet predators on having access to our children through their cell phone

applications.





#### KinderCare "Safety Day 2016" -

KinderCare, located in tower one of the Westbrook Corporate Center, invited the Police Department to visit with the children. During the visit Ofc. Verber, School Resource Officer, spoke with the children about Stranger Danger, Outdoor Safety, and how to make positive choices. The children enjoyed the opportunity to check out the squad car. The Fire Department spoke with the children about fire safety on the previous day.





#### Westchester Public Library Summer Reading Finale -

The Community Relations Unit was present along with Safetypup® who greeted guests.





#### National Night Out -

In the month of August this annual event, funded in part by community partnerships, is a unique crime prevention campaign that includes local businesses, residents and the police department. The event generates support for anti-crime programs and aims to strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships.

#### **Dunkin' Donuts Cop on Rooftop -**

The CRU coordinated fund raising at both the Mannheim Rd. & 31st St. Dunkin' Donuts for this year's event for the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics Illinois. Special Olympics provides opportunities for adults and children with intellectual disabilities to train and compete in Olympic-type sporting events to increase their physical fitness levels, achieve success in meeting goals, and experience the fun and camaraderie of competitive sports. The Westchester Police Department raised in total \$5,602.00 in donations for Special Olympics Illinois.

#### Westchester Police Department Open House -

The annual Open House, held in May to culminate National Police Week, was also another occasion to connect with residents in a relaxed, informal setting and share information about programs and services available to the community. The open house offers guests an opportunity to tour the prisoner processing area and jail cells, the interview rooms, and the squad room – and even got a chance to experience what it is like to be DUI/under the influence. Free "mug" shots for children under 10 were offered, as were free gun locks. Programs like Crime Cams, Stop Arm Violation Enforcement (S.A.V.E.), and Free Prescription Drop Off were also promoted.



#### Crime Cams - A Community Camera Partnership

The Crime Cams program enlists the help of residents who have home outdoor video cameras to solve neighborhood crimes. Investigators have found when canvassing a neighborhood after a crime has occurred that a home video system may have captured a picture of a suspect and/or a vehicle. This can be a valuable lead that can help in an investigation and may lead to an arrest. The Crime Cams program is voluntary and asks residents who have outdoor surveillance cameras to register their cameras with the Police Department. While still in its early stages, the program has already helped with the identification of suspects.

#### Narcan -

The growing heroin and opioid epidemic in Illinois is here to stay with Cook County at its epicenter. In September 2015 legislation was passed allowing state and local law enforcement officers to be equipped to administer the lifesaving drug Naloxone. Naloxone or Narcan is an opioid antagonist, designed to reverse an opioid overdose.




The image depicts both the size and look of the injector carried by officers

In October Westchester officers completed a training program developed by the CPU and can now carry and administer the drug. By means of an auto-injector victims receive the drug through intramuscular injection, typically the thigh. Within 2-8 minutes the effects of the opioid overdose are reversed giving paramedics time to perform after care and ultimately save a life. The drug does come at a price, \$3,800 for two auto-injectors. Through a grant the department was provided with several of the kits free of charge.

#### Ring Video Doorbell program -

The device streams live audio and video of a home's front doorstep directly to a smartphone or tablet, allowing homeowners to stay connected to their homes whether in the kitchen or across town. Ring customers have used the technology in the target hardening of their home and add more to their peace of mind. Coupled with the Crime Cam program the Department now has additional eyes in the community. Ofc. Verber works closely with the good people at Ring. The end result, the creation of a discount for Westchester residents.

#### Stop Arm Violation Enforcement (S.A.V.E.) program -

The focus of enforcement centered on vehicles that passed a stopped school bus actively picking up and dropping off children. Child Safety is a top priority! The SRO conducts a random 'ride along' in school buses throughout the school year while an officer follows behind the bus cites motorists in violation. The SRO utilizes a social media page on Facebook to push school safety to include school bus stop arm awareness out into the community.

District school bus drivers also have an active part in the program. Once a violation is observed the color, make, model, and license plate are recorded on a Department issued Stop Arm Violation Observation Report. Completed reports are then picked up by Ofc. Verber. The information is then ran through the Department with a warning letter sent to the registered owner of the vehicle.
