#### Collection Details

The Village of Westchester and SBC Waste **Solutions** are excited to announce our first annual Spring Clean-Up! Please read all of the **details** below:

- Items must be placed at the curb by 6:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 12.
- Do not set items out until the day before the event.
- Regular **refuse** and **small items** must be contained in **bags, cans, or boxes** (maximum 50 lbs each).
- There will **not** be a separate recycling collection truck. Any **recyclables** set out would be collected with regular refuse.
- Yard waste is not included but is collected on your regular service day April-December.
- Hazardous and electronic waste are **not** included, but a separate pickup can be arranged by contacting SBC.

#### ACCEPTABLE Items

- Appliances (refrigerator, dishwasher, etc.)
- Bulk items (mattress, piano, etc.)
- Carpet (must be rolled, maximum 5' long, 2' diameter)
- Construction and demolition debris from DIY home improvements
- Furniture
- Fixtures
- Landscape timbers (cut to 3' lengths)
- Regular refuse (properly contained)

#### Items NOT Accepted

- Car batteries, tires, and automobile parts
- Concrete, bricks, cement, and asphalt
- Electronics
- Explosives and ammunition
- Paint, fluids, radioactive materials, and hazardous or medical waste
- Riding lawnmowers, boats, snowmobiles, and snow blowers

# Smoke alarms in Vour home



- Install smoke alarms outside all sleeping areas and on every level of your home, including the basement.
- For added protection, place an alarm inside every bedroom.
- Alarms should be installed at least 10 feet away from any cooking appliances.
- Ceiling installation is best. If mounting on a wall, place the alarm no more than 12 inches from the ceiling.
- Replace smoke alarm batteries every 6 months.
- The average lifespan of a smoke alarm is 10 years—replace units accordingly.

# This April, Don't Be Fooled!

Now more than ever, we all need to stay alert and cautious when it comes to protecting our personal information. Scammers are getting more creative and more deceptive—reaching out through phone calls, emails, and even text messages. Unfortunately, it's often our senior residents—our lifeline to the past and a wealth of wisdom for future generations—who are targeted the most.

I take it personally every time I hear that one of our residents has been scammed out of their life savings or even a few thousand dollars due to false information or fraudulent promises. Just last month alone, I received three scam texts from fake numbers claiming I owed money for tolls or that the DMV needed more information, threatening my driver's license.

What really concerns me are cases where a senior is approached at their home by someone claiming they can make quick repairs, only to then meet that person at the bank for payment.

Please—only hire contractors with solid references and never pay in cash or let a stranger into your home. Always pay by a more protected and trackable form of payment such as a check or credit card, get a receipt, and be cautious of anyone who wants to meet you at the bank.

On many occasions, while driving through the Village, I've stopped when I see contractor or landscaper vehicles and checked in to make sure everything is okay. I've also verified that companies operating in the area are licensed and legitimate.

Some of the Biggest Types of Scams:

• Someone posing as an official from your bank asking for personal information (Always call your bank directly and speak to a supervisor)

Impersonators pretending to be from:

- Medicare
- IRS
- Social Security
- Technical Support
- Fake Charities



- Lottery or Prize Notifications
- Investment Opportunities
- Government Agencies
- Family members or relatives asking for money

When in doubt:

DELETE IT. DISREGARD IT. DO NOT

RESPOND.

Instead, contact the Westchester Police Department by dialing 911 and report it.

# PUBLIC WORKS

#### Village branch collection for April will be the week of the 7th - 11th

May's collection will be the week of May 5th – 9th June's collection will be the week of June 2nd – 6th

The Public Works Department will collect branches the first full working week of every month (April-November)

- $\bullet$  All brush must be put out on the front parkway by 7:00 a.m. on your designated collection day. Branches can be up to 7 feet in length and stacked with the butt ends facing the street in the same direction. If not stacked properly, a "restack" notice will be left.
- Again, please put ALL brush out on your designated collection day and Public Works crews will determine what constitutes an open load, which will be picked up later in the
- An open load would include any brush that will not fit through the chipper such as logs, stumps, and large limbs. These must be cut for one man to lift. Dirt must be removed from any root balls for pickup.
- Public Works Crews will only pass through a designated pickup area once due to time, scheduling, and other workload responsibilities.

Landscapers & tree services are responsible for their own brush disposal.

#### Please note the following schedule for branch pickup:

THURSDAY: From Belleview Ave west to Wolf Rd, Martindale Dr south to 31st Street.

Weekly yard waste collection by S.B.C. will begin on your first regular collection day in April.

- If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.
- You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.,) at the curb every week for collection. Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.
- S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), at no additional charge, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, universal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

#### **Street Parking Restrictions**

As of April 1st, snow parking restrictions are lifted and street maintenance parking restrictions go into effect. Please check the signs at the ends of your block or check the Village website so you don't receive a ticket! These restrictions are for one side of the street, once a week, 7am-3pm.

#### Westchester Tree Replacement Program

- 1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.
- 2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees, please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

# **Curious About Composting? We're here to help!**

#### Why compost?

• Food waste is the largest contributor to landfills in the United States. Here in Illinois, it accounts for 20% of waste in our landfills. This waste releases methane, a harmful greenhouse gas that traps heat in the atmosphere and contributes to rising temperatures (Source: Illinois EPA). Composting keeps food waste out of landfills, thus reducing harmful greenhouse gas emissions. Compost creates healthy soil that builds strong plants (Source: Feeding America).

#### What is composting?

• Composting is a natural process which breaks down organic material (food, leaves, cardboard, etc.) into healthy soil.

#### How to get started?

- First things first is to reduce food waste. Plan out meals so as not to buy more than you need, learn the best ways to store food to maximize freshness, make the most of your foods (use stems, greens, etc. in your cooking), and use leftovers. Reducing food waste also saves you money!
- Interested in starting your own compost? Here are steps to get going:
- 1. Keep a bowl or compost collector on your kitchen counter to collect food scraps
- Vegetable and fruit scraps, coffee and tea grounds, eggshells, unbleached coffee filters, and pieces of cardboard are examples of what to collect
- Removing seeds from tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, etc. during food prep, helps keep them from sprouting in your compost
- 2. Purchase or construct an outdoor compost bin. Layer in food scraps from your kitchen, chemical-free grass clippings and leaves, and torn up pieces of cardboard. The key to composting is maintaining the right wet to dry ratio, so layering in cardboard or paper scraps helps with this ratio.
- What not to put in a home compost: meat, bones, dairy, grease, onions, citrus peels, labels from fruits and vegetables 3. Stir the bin/compost regularly to produce heat and

move the decomposition process along (you might also need to add water when it's warm out). Stirring every 3-4 days is ideal; the more frequently it's turned the faster the decomposition process.

# **Actions You Can Take**

Reduce food waste – compost to contribute to a healthy environment!


4. Finished compost will look like healthy soil, dark brown or black. Use this in garden beds and spread on the lawn to provide natural nutrients to the soil.

Not interested in handling the entire compost process? Our new waste management company, **SBC Waste Solutions**, offers compost pick up. An Organics Waste cart is available for rental at the following rates: \$12 (35-gal), \$14 (65-gal), or \$16 (95-gal) per month. Service is available April through December. Participants can then request the final compost product from SBC at no additional charge. Call SBC at (312) 522-1115 to sign-up.

#### Spring Cleaning Can Wait—Nature's Not Ready

You may be tempted to "spring" into action cleaning up and mowing your yard after a long winter, but consider delaying these chores through April. Delaying spring cleanup gives overwintering insects, like native bees, fireflies, and butterflies, time to safely emerge from leaf litter and hollow stems. Holding off on mowing through April allows early-blooming plants like dandelions and clover to provide essential nectar and pollen for pollinators just coming out of hibernation. These small actions help sustain vital insect populations that support biodiversity and healthy ecosystems.

Look for GROW's table throughout the community the week of May 4-10, International Composting Awareness Week, to learn more and see a composting demonstration.



# Recipe of the Month

There are so many yummy ways to reduce food waste. Chop up herb stems and use them in soup (add them early to give them time to soften up); sauté beet greens, chard stems, and the like with oil, garlic, salt, or your favorite spices; make a soup/broth with leftover veggies; the possibilities are endless. This classic minestrone allows for adding any leftover veggies, beans, pasta, whatever you'd like. Enjoy!

## Classic Minestrone Soup

#### Ingredients

- 4 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided
- $1\,\mathrm{medium\,yellow\,onion,\,chopped}$
- $2\,\mathrm{medium}$  carrots, peeled and chopped
- 2 medium ribs celery, chopped
- 1/4 cup tomato paste
- 2 cups chopped seasonal vegetables (potatoes, yellow squash, zucchini, butternut squash, green beans or peas all work)
- 4 cloves garlic, pressed or minced
- ½ teaspoon dried oregano

½ teaspoon dried thyme

1 large can (28 ounces) diced tomatoes, with their liquid (or 2 small 15-ounce cans)

- 4 cups (32 ounces) vegetable broth
- 2 cups water
- 1 teaspoon fine sea salt
- 2 bay leaves
- Pinch of red pepper flakes
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 1 cup whole grain orecchiette, elbow or small shell pasta
- 1 can (15 ounces) Great Northern beans or cannellini beans, rinsed and drained, or 1 ½ cups cooked beans
- 2 cups baby spinach, chopped kale or chopped collard greens
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice

## Instructions

- Warm 3 tablespoons of the olive oil in a large Dutch oven or stockpot over medium heat. Once the oil is shimmering, add the chopped onion, carrot, celery, tomato paste and a pinch of salt. Cook, stirring often, until the vegetables have softened and the onions are turning translucent, about 7 to 10 minutes.

- Add the seasonal vegetables, garlic, oregano and thyme. Cook until fragrant while stirring frequently, about 2 minutes.
- Pour in the diced tomatoes and their juices, broth and water. Add the salt, bay leaves and red pepper flakes. Season generously with freshly ground black pepper.
- Raise heat to medium-high and bring the mixture to a boil, then partially cover the pot with the lid, leaving about a 1" gap for steam to escape. Reduce heat as necessary to maintain a gentle simmer.
- Cook for 15 minutes, then remove the lid and add the pasta, beans and greens. Continue simmering, uncovered, for 20 minutes or until the pasta is cooked al dente and the greens are tender.
- Remove the pot from the heat, then remove the bay leaves. Stir in the lemon juice and remaining tablespoon of olive oil. Taste and season with more salt and pepper until the flavors really sing.






# 1926 Advertisements for the Model Town of Westchester

The Proviso Mystery of who was buying up the old farmsteads in 1924 in the Westchester area was solved by November 8th, 1925. A Chicago Tribune article announced that William Zelosky and George F. Nixon were the two key developers joining forces to sell lots and build homes on 2,200 acres gained from recent purchases of land from a syndicate headed by CA&E president Thomas Conway, Jr. The Westchester Branch of the "L," being built to connect the Chicago Aurora and Elgin line to a brand-new station at Roosevelt Road, was nearing completion. Real estate developers began placing ads in the Chicago Tribune about visions for this model community and the growth of financial opportunities that would ensue. These ads only gained momentum and frequency up to October 1, 1926, the day train service began officially. That Friday was celebrated in both the Zelosky and Nixon offices all weekend long. In the spirit of the 1920s, there was quite a bit of "hoopla," with adverting slogans such as "where the L goes, profit grows." Fancy notices creating interest were placed throughout the newspaper to get prospective buyers to invest in this new model town outside Chicago. Chicago was usually depicted with all the soot, steam, and overcrowding of a busy city, whereas Westchester showed the tranquil English-style community in the country away from offensive city living. Other companies also featuring ads around that time were the Shekleton Brothers and Auspitz & Oakes, usually featuring "the Heart of Westchester" in their ads.


Roosevelt Road became the dividing line as Zelosky was to develop the northern area of Westchester from his Englishstyle office (often featured in the ads) on Roosevelt Road, near the newly completed Roosevelt "L" Station. The land south of Roosevelt Road was in the capable real estate development hands of George Nixon. Both had major offices downtown, and before the Great Depression they and other developers also placed ad after ad in the Tribune recruiting a workforce of solicitors, salespeople, company representatives, and managers for the Westchester venture. It was a time of limitless possibilities capitalizing on the American Dream of a better life and great prospects, to be realized through the new Westchester model community, at that time the largest suburban comprehensive development undertaking ever in the Chicago area. Featured here are some of the 1926 advertisements promoting the Westchester venture.
