Welcome Spring!!!

The Bellwood, Broadview, Hillside, Maywood and Westchester Fire Departments recently took part in the West Suburban Chili Cook-Off, a fundraising event for female veterans sponsored by Top Flight Defense. I was honored to be a judge alongside Mayor Thompson of Broadview and Mayor Booker of Maywood and thank our fire department for their participation. Unfortunately, the Westchester Fire Department, having won the top honors the past two years, was dethroned by the Village of Bellwood Fire Department this time around. A big thank you to them for their efforts this year.

I cannot emphasize enough to our residents how detrimental telephone and email scams have been in our community. Please know that the IRS, Village, police and others will never demand bank account information or immediate payment regardless of the claims that are being made on the phone or through your email. We ask that if you are called or emailed by someone asking for information you would not be comfortable giving, please immediately contact the police department for further information on determining the validity of the caller.

Callers that are stating that your income or property taxes were underpaid and that you might face arrest, loss of your home or worse are ALL false. Police officers can assist in determining the validity of who is attempting to contact you. We are here to help and assure you that your call is confidential.

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District has partnered with Westchester to continue providing funding for green alleys. These projects are important for those who currently have gravel alleys and cause an increased potential for flooding. This year, 4 alleys will be reconstructed with their funding partnership, leaving only a few remaining that we expect to have completed in the next two years.

Finally, after several years of being pushed back, the Balmoral Ave reconstruction project started in March. Due to the extensive project scope such as replacement of water mains and sewers, along with the curbs, streets and ADA sidewalk improvements, the overall cost of the project is \$3,250,000, with \$1,700,000 being funded by a federal

grant that is distributed by the West Central Municipal Conference. Having spoken with several residents in the affected area over the past 4 years I know that this was a long overdue project and would like to thank everyone for their patience during the periodic road closures in the area.

Village vehicle stickers went on sale March 1st. The sticker chosen as the contest winner was Westchester Intermediate School 3rd grader, Sebastian De Guzman. Congratulations to him for being selected and seeking to kick off the celebration of Westchester's upcoming 100-year anniversary. As a reminder, vehicle stickers must be purchased and displayed by May 1, 2024.

The Village of Westchester will once again host its spring shredding event at 2305 Enterprise Drive on Saturday April 20th from 10am to 12pm. It is a great opportunity to safely dispose of private documents and paperwork you may have at home and avoid those documents getting into the wrong hands. Additionally, the Cook County Sherriff's police will be disposing of unwanted and expired prescription drugs as well as safely disposing of household electronics (limit one television per household).

Our public works branch pickup resumed April 1st. Visit the Village of Westchester website (www.westchester-il. org) to view the weekly schedule for pickup on your block. Public works have also resumed street sweeping and ask that you please observe your street's parking restrictions for maintenance. In addition to street sweeping, other spring and summer road maintenance activities will be occurring throughout town such as crack filling, permanent pothole repairs and more.

I expect that if you are reading this far along in this newsletter you have an interest in what is occurring in Westchester. Due to review and publication deadlines, all items that are printed in this newsletter were submitted in early March. The Importance of Smoke Alarms

Smoke alarms save lives. Smoke alarms that are properly installed and maintained play a vital role in reducing fire deaths and injuries. If there is a fire in your home, smoke spreads fast and you need smoke alarms to give you time to get out. Here's what you need to know!

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire. Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home.
- Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- Test your smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.

- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions, yet mitigate false alarms.
- When a smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside.
- Replace all smoke alarms in your home every 10 years.

Facts and figures about Smoke Alarms

- In 2014-2018, smoke alarms sounded in more than half (54%) of the home fires reported to U.S. fire departments.
- Almost three of every five home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms (41%) or no working smoke alarms (16%).
- The death rate per 1,000 reported home fires was more than twice as high in homes that did not have any working smoke alarms compared to the rate in homes with working smoke alarms (13.0 deaths vs. 5.8 deaths per 1,000 fires).
- In fires in which the smoke alarms were present but did not operate, two of every five (41%) of the smoke alarms had missing or disconnected batteries.
- Dead batteries caused one-quarter (26%) of the smoke alarm failures.

New Smoke Alarm Law in Illinois

Effective January 1, 2023, the updated law requires Illinois residents to replace their old smoke alarms with the type that has a long-term, 10-year sealed battery. This would

apply to residents that are still using alarms with removable batteries or alarms that are not hardwired.

What is the Updated Illinois Smoke Alarm Law²

- Since 1988, all dwellings in Illinois have been required to have smoke alarms
- In 2017, Public Act 100-0200 was passed to update the Illinois Smoke Detector Act to reflect advances in alarm technology
- As of January 1, 2023, any new smoke alarm being installed within a single or multifamily home are required to be featured with a 10-year sealed battery
- Smoke alarms in single or multi-family homes prior to January 1, 2023 may remain in place until they exceed 10 years from their manufactured date, fails to respond to operability tests, or otherwise malfunctions Exemptions:
- Homes built after 1988 that already have hardwired smoke alarms
- Home with wireless integrated alarms that use low-power radio frequency communications, Wi-Fi, or other Wireless Local Area Networking capabilities

Smoke Alarm Installation Program

The Westchester Fire Department is proud to participate in the "Be Alarmed" program. "Be Alarmed!" is a fire safety education and smoke alarm installation program administered cooperatively between Camp I Am Me (CIAM) and the Office of the Illinois

State Fire Marshal (OSFM). The program distributes fire safety education materials and 10-year sealed battery smoke alarms to fire departments in the state of Illinois. The fire departments then deliver the education while installing smoke alarms in at-risk homes within their communities. Both the educational materials and smoke alarms are provided at no cost as a result of funding from both the CIAM and OSFM.

The program was developed to educate Illinois residents on the dangers of fire in the home and how to prevent fires from occurring in the home, as well as to ensure there are working smoke alarms properly installed in homes. By providing 10-year concealed battery smoke alarms, it ensures that the power source cannot be removed from the unit and, if properly maintained, will last the life of the device.

The program seeks to:

- Educate residents, young and old, on home fire safety and prevention methods,
- Reduce the number of fire-related injuries,
- Reduce the number of fire-related deaths, and
- Identify the reason for non-functioning smoke alarms in homes across the state.





Let's Talk About the War on Drugs

It is expected that Fentanyl will remain the leading cause of narcotics-related deaths in the U.S. in 2024, according to the documented reports received from Law Enforcement agencies across the United States. The reports also note that illegal drugs impact American communities by "supporting violent criminal enterprises, money laundering and corruption and numerous other crimes that undermine the rule of law."

In 2023 the overdose death rate topped 12,000 in a 12-month period for the first time, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Most of these deaths were young adults who had a close friend that led them down the road of addiction.

In 2023, the DEA seized more than 78.4 million Fentanyl-laced fake pills and nearly 12,000 pounds of Fentanyl powder. The 2023 seizures are equivalent to more than 388.8 million lethal doses of fentanyl.

With new drugs entering our country in various forms, it's critical that we stay vigilant and educate our children about the dangers they face. Even legal medications, when abused, can be as dangerous as street drugs. If there's ever a moment to have a heart-toheart with our kids about the dangers of taking drugs or any kind of medicine from friends, it's now! They need to understand the real risks involvedone small, toxic pill could tragically end their life, leaving their family in anguish, trying to piece together what went wrong and how it could have been prevented. As parents, our job is tougher than ever with the prevalence of peer pressure, social media, and a wide array of drugs readily available



on the streets, on the internet, and in medicine cabinets. It's our responsibility to educate ourselves and our children about these dangers.

Heroin is particularly difficult to quit, even more so when it's mixed with substances like cocaine, methamphetamines, and Fentanyl. Methamphetamine is a drug many turn to for its ability to keep you awake and alert for extended periods. However, it's produced using highly flammable chemicals and leads to severe side effects such as tooth decay, weight loss, and an intense craving for more. These drugs are immensely dangerous.

In closing, we must all do our best to shield our children from those who see them as nothing more than an opportunity for profit. Learning about different drugs and the signs of drug use is crucial in protecting our loved ones.



Gas-powered lawn care equipment is commonly used but comes with an array of issues such as air and noise pollution. Electric lawn equipment is easy to find at major hardware retailers. Retailers offer dozens of options for electric mowers, trimmers, leaf blowers, chainsaws, and other types of equipment. I recommend that you choose one brand, so that batteries will be interchangeable with different devices, including drills, circular saws, flashlights, etc.

Electric lawn equipment is comparable in quality and performance to gasolinepowered equipment, with typical equipment performing better on some metrics and worse on others in product testing. Certainly,

Personally, my family has been using an electric mower for over 20 years. We have replaced the battery once. The device has NO rust, with the only issue being a wheel that falls off, because of bad design. As you can see above it is rather modern in appearance. It is quiet and has ZERO emissions. We keep our grass somewhat long and thick where it is not heavily shaded, which makes it more durable & healthier. Mulching also helps to keep the lawn strong & saves a great deal of time. Our String Trimmer or "Weed Wacker," is part of a family of tools that includes a hedge trimmer,

drill, circular saw & a second mower that weighs about ¼ the weight of the Black & Decker. Many other power tools are available & all use the same batteries. This simplifies my life.

I like to read the headlines and found the following headlines in a document entitled "Lawn Care Goes Electric" published by: Environment America Research & Policy Contor

- "Gasoline-powered lawn and garden equipment is noisy and dirty."
- "Pollution from gasoline-powered lawn equipment threatens our health and the climate."
- "Noise and vibration from gasolinepowered lawn equipment are irritating and unhealthy."
- "Lawn and garden equipment produces as much pollution as tens of millions of cars."
- "Electric lawn equipment is effective and affordable"

Our home gardens & yards are places that we can develop far beyond having a nice lawn. The GROW committee encourages homeowners to consider removing areas of grass & replacing them with wildflowers or vegetable gardens, as well as fruit trees & berry plants. This not only makes your lawn less work & more interesting, but helps with water infiltration, as well as producing food that is fresh and healthful.

Electric lawn equipment is up to the task & good for our environment, our health, and our neighbors. I encourage you to consider your choices and how these can effect change for the better.

Easy tips to reduce Air Pollution:

- Take short trips on foot or by bicycle.
- Carpool whenever possible, this makes the commute more fun, and functional.





The Public Works Department will collect branches the first full working week of every month (April-November)

- All brush must be put out on the front parkway by 7:00 a.m. on the designated pickup day. Branches can be up to 7 feet in length and stacked with the butt ends facing the street in the same direction. If not stacked properly, a "restack" notice will be left.
- Again, please put ALL brush out on your designated pickup day and Public Works crews will determine what constitutes an open load, which will be picked up later in the week.
- An open load would include any brush that will not fit through the chipper such as logs, stumps, and large limbs. These must be cut for one man to lift. Dirt must be removed from any root balls for pickup.
- Public Works Crews will only pass through a designated pickup area once due to time, scheduling, and other workload responsibilities.

Landscapers & tree services are responsible for their own brush disposal.

Please note the following schedule for branch pickup:

MONDAY: From Mannheim Rd west to Wolf Rd and from Canterbury St south to Windsor Dr-including both sides of Windsor Dr. Also Waterford, Waverly, Camelot and Concord.

TUESDAY: Roosevelt Rd south to Cermak Rd-from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd.

WEDNESDAY: From Roosevelt Rd north to the expressway and from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd. Also, Roosevelt Rd south to Canterbury St from Haase Ave west to Heidorn Ave.

THURSDAY: From Belleview Ave west to Wolf Rd. Martindale Dr south to 31st Street.

This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted sooner rather than later in a parkway.

If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident can choose the tree from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree and planting with the Village. To request a 50/50 tree, please call the Public Works Department at 708.345.0041.

Reminder: As always, residents are asked to call Public Works at 708.345.0041 if an unusual amount of water is visible in the street or parkway. This could be a main break or water leak that requires our immediate attention. If after 3:30pm M-F & on weekends and holidays, please call police non-emergency at 708.345.0060.


