I was extremely humbled to attend an event honoring Westchester resident Gillian Grimes after she led her Penn State volleyball team to clinch the national championship, beating Louisville 3 to 1. Gillian is a resident of Westchester and after graduating from Divine Infant, Gillian attended Nazareth Academy where she led the team to a state championship her senior year. The Village surprised her with a proclamation read aloud honoring her for her achievements both athletically and academically.

The Village of Westchester's administrative staff has completed the 2024 annual report. Please help me welcome two newly opened restaurants to Westchester. Wing Snob, which opened in January, is located at Mannheim and Roosevelt and is a chicken wing franchise expanding its presence in Illinois. Tastefull, located at 1929 Mannheim Road, was also recently approved for a liquor license and is scheduled to open in February. Westchester resident and now business owner Damien McIntosh will be serving chicken, burgers, and pizza with a casual interior atmosphere.

As of this writing, snowfall in our area has been minimal, however, we have experienced some extremely cold days with negative temperatures. With the low temperatures, we begin to experience more water main breaks due to the freezing grounds. Our

public works department repaired 11 water main breaks in January. Our staff does an incredible job as they seek to minimize the time water is required to be off for the repairs. If you have not yet done so, sign up for CodeRed and be notified anytime water main work is performed in your immediate area. Visit our website or email info@westchester-il.gov to sign up. If you do experience a water shutoff, we ask that you be patient as most outages are restored within 2 hours.

Having changed waste contractors to SBC in 2024, the village wishes to promote all of the added services that are offered in addition to regular weekly garbage pickup. One such service is a town-wide clean-up day. On Saturday, April 12, 2025, SBC is hosting a clean-up day allowing residents to dispose of both large quantities of items as well as bulk items all on a single special weekend pickup. Appliances, rolled-up old carpet, construction debris, and furniture in addition to regular bagging of unwanted items are just some of the things residents may not have yet had an opportunity to schedule for a private pickup. A flyer for the collection event is included within this newsletter.

Lastly, I am frequently reminded of the extensive list of services provided by Proviso Township and encourage residents of Westchester to utilize and learn what the Township offers. Proviso Township offices in Hillside offer youth assistance services connecting our younger residents with educational and employment opportunities. The township also has a general assistance program that helps single residents with basic maintenance needs for those not eligible for other programs. One of the most utilized programs is the handyman services which provides those over 60 years of age or disabled minor home repair services for a cost of \$5 (not including any parts needed). If you need assistance installing or repairing blinds, door locks, electrical outlets or even need assistance moving furniture around the house you can schedule an appointment with Proviso Township at 708-547-4001.

Tips from the Westchester Fire Department

The Westchester Fire Department administration and staff hope you had a nice holiday season! As we head into the cold and short days of winter, we would like to let you know about some great resources for our community regarding mental health and other services that may be needed locally. Part of our Fire Department mission is to provide emergency medical services to all our residents and visitors. Often, we are called upon to help in emergencies that involve mental health crises, senior services, substance abuse, and other non-medical issues that require assistance from a wide range of agencies. Our response as a fire department to some of these scenarios is limited. While you can always call 911 for help, there are also agencies and professionals who are ready to help you in different ways.

The Proviso Township Mental Health Commission (PTMHC) in Hillside serves all of Proviso Township. The PTMHC offers services for many mental health and other human needs as well as providing direction for township residents who need other services. Anyone who wants assistance can simply call one phone number and be directed to the agency or service that they may need. Callers can remain anonymous if they choose. We have also attached a resource guide that can help you quickly find everything for yourself or friends and neighbors from housing assistance to senior services. Proviso Township can be a one-stopshop for you to find the right person to help in many situations. As our township states, "the Proviso Township Mental Health Commission ensures that you have treatment services in your community. Services include Mental Health, Substance Abuse, Domestic Violence, Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities, Senior Services, Youth Prevention, and Crisis Hotline." 

Don't Be a Victim of Scams

It's heartbreaking to see that almost every month, one of our seniors or residents falls victim to a scam, often losing their hard-earned money or, in some cases, their entire life savings. Despite efforts from our Village Manager, Village officials, and myself to raise awareness about scams and how to avoid them, our officers continue to take reports involving these fraudulent schemes. Scams are being orchestrated not only across the United States but also internationally.

Criminals are becoming more sophisticated, using advanced tools like artificial intelligence (AI) to mimic voices, create convincing emails, and even generate fake videos. These scammers can draft false legal documents to steal your money—or even your home.

Here are some of the most common scams targeting people, especially those aged 60 and older, in 2025:

1. Phony Recruiters Claiming to Represent Large Companies

Scammers purchase phone numbers that mask their true identity, making it almost impossible to trace their calls. They may pose as legitimate recruiters, asking for personal information under the guise of a job offer.

2. Cryptocurrency Scams

Fraudulent businesses claim they can make you rich overnight by investing in their socalled "expert services." Be wary of any offer that seems too good to be true.

3. Bank and Credit Card Alerts

You might receive a message stating your credit card has been declined or a call claiming to be from your bank, urging you to call back immediately. Never trust these unsolicited messages. Instead, contact your bank directly using a verified phone number and ask for a supervisor to confirm the claim.

4. Pop-Up Scams

Pop-ups on your phone or computer might warn you of a virus or urge you to upgrade software by contacting a specific company. Always delete unknown messages or emails—especially those claiming a package can't be delivered unless you provide more information.

5. Fake Celebrity Requests

Scammers can now use AI to mimic the voices of well-known celebrities, asking for donations to their "favorite charities." For example, I recently received a call from someone claiming to be Elvis Presley, but when he couldn't sing "Hound Dog," I knew it was a scam! We need to be more cautious than ever with our phones, computers, and private

information. Many of us underestimate the power of these devices. They don't just store our personal information; they can also track our locations—an important reminder to stay vigilant, especially in today's world.

Protect yourself and your loved ones by staying informed and skeptical of unsolicited requests. When in doubt, take a moment to verify the source and think twice before sharing any personal information.

2025 President's Day Holiday Garbage **Schedule**

There will be no change to the garbage collection schedule.

SBC yard waste collection will resume your first collection day in April

Village branch collection will resume the week of April 7th - 11th

S.B.C. Waste Solutions, Inc. - 312-522-1115

- If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.
- You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.,) at the curb every week for collection. Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.
- S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), at no additional charge, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, universal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be prescheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Village Snow Restrictions

Public Works crews keep our streets free of snow and ice during the winter months. Please assist us by observing the following:

- Place garbage cans 3 feet behind the curb line- do not place them in the street.
- Do not shovel or blow snow back into the cleared streets.
- Please observe the "NO PARKING SNOW ROUTE" signs.
- -The snow portion of the signs will be enforced after 2 inches of snowfall between December 1st and March 31st.

If you reside on a Primary designated SNOW ROUTE, after 2 inches of snowfall you must remove all vehicles from the snow route. Vehicles must stay off the street until the streets are cleared thoroughly by the plows by Public Works. If the snowfall is continuing, the restriction is in place until Public Works completes the plowing for the day. Please check the signs at the corners of

If you reside on a Secondary route, there is no parking Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday on the even numbered house

side and no parking Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday on the odd numbered house side after 2 inches of snowfall. Please check the signs at the corners and center of your block for guidance. (This includes ALL side streets not designated a Primary snow

If you have a Fire Hydrant on your parkway, please help keep the hydrant clear of snow so that the Fire Department may easily access the hydrant in case of an emergency, and so that the snow plows may quickly identify the hydrants while plowing.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

- 1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.
- 2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees. please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

1 cup sliced almonds

 $1\ \mbox{cup}$ raisins or other dried, chopped fruit

Instructions

- Heat the oven to 300°F and line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

- Items must be placed at the curb by 6:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 12.
- Do not set items out until the day **before** the event.
- Regular **refuse** and **small items** must be contained in **bags**, **cans**, **or boxes** (maximum 50 lbs each).
- There will **not** be a separate recycling collection truck. Any **recyclables** set out would be collected with regular refuse.
- Yard waste is not included but is collected on your regular service day April-December.
- Hazardous and electronic waste are **not** included, but a separate pickup can be arranged by contacting SBC.

ACCEPTABLE Items

- Appliances (refrigerator, dishwasher, etc.)
- Bulk items (mattress, piano, etc.)
- Carpet (must be rolled, maximum 5' long, 2' diameter)
- Construction and demolition debris from DIY home improvements

Westchester: Dreams of a Model Community

In 1924 the "Proviso Mystery" had people talking and newspapers writing articles with the key question: Who is buying up the farmland in Proviso? Most of the local farmers were descendants of German immigrants who had settled the area in the 1840s and 1850s. They were offered great deals on their farmland that they just could not pass up, even if they had never dreamt of selling. An acre, which was worth around \$300 at that time, was suddenly worth from \$600 to \$1,500. One by one they sold everything, $including farm \, equipment, tools, wagons \, and \,$ animals. There were rumors about what was planned—perhaps a golf course, industrial plants, a Ford car factory, cemeteries, and to the chagrin of neighboring communities, maybe even the stockyards. Brokers and lawyers worked out the fine points of the deals and paid at least a third of the money in cash. No one knew the actual buyer until Chicago's best kept secret was finally revealed when Westchester was officially incorporated on October 30, 1925. A group of real estate developers had completed the purchase of 2,200 acres in Proviso Township in order to create what was billed as Chicago's first totally planned model community. Dream town USA would be created 12 miles to the west, with direct public access to Chicago by train and regular, efficient service.

Transportation was the key, and that involved Samuel Insull, who served as head developer, already having had interests in and around Chicago in trains, electricity and gas since the late 19th century. His company Commonwealth Edison was indeed the main supplier of Chicago electricity. He was on the board of 65 companies that ran many of Chicago's largest enterprises involved with electric power.

Insull is credited with the creation and integration of the electric grid in and around Chicago, extending into several other states.

Samuel Insull was born in London in 1859 and attended private school in Oxford. As a young man he got interested in Thomas Edison's inventions while working in London. With a lot of study and drive, he impressed Edison with his knowledge of Edison's own business affairs. When Samuel arrived in America in 1881, Edison hired him as his personal secretary. Insull worked to improve Edison's business management and became vice president of Edison's General Electric Company in Schenectady, New York. When I.P. Morgan forced a merger of Edison's power companies, Insull left to come to Chicago in 1892, on the eve of the Columbian Exposition. He became president of the Chicago Edison Company and worked to create the electrical infrastructure in the city and surroundings by acquiring railroads and utilities. He worked with others to unify the elevated ("L") train system. His holdings included Chicago Rapid Transit Company and the Chicago Aurora and Elgin Railroad (also called "The Great Third Rail"). Mrs. Seida, who is attempting to piece together the history of the village, discovered that Grant Britten, an early resident who later became one of the first village presidents, and for whom one of the village schools is now named, lived in the white house and allowed the state to use the red barn and other buildings to house men and horses needed for a state road project. Area became known as Britten's camp and these early residents reportedly signed the petition in 1925 enabling Westchester to become a village. (LIFE Photo)

and extension of electric power to rural areas around Chicago and bringing interurban transit to the suburbs, Proviso Township seemed ideal for modern development. Insull is credited with conceiving Westchester as an English-style town, reflected today in its street names of British origin (noteworthy exceptions, in homage to Franzosenbusch families, include Heidorn, Boeger, Mandel, Evers and Haase, all connected to Roosevelt Road)

Polish-born William Zelosky was a leading real estate developer who imagined an ideal community

that he could not realize in Chicago, due to its building density. The open space available in Westchester changed all that. Zelosky wanted to create a city free of the grime and noise of factories, where nothing offensive would obstruct the beauty of the town. Careful zoning and tight building restrictions would create more uniformity, allocating separate spaces for single residences and apartments, and allowing for some businesses along the main arteries. Ten percent of the town was to be dedicated to public use, with green space and parks, some even having small streams.

Convenient transportation would link the village to the Loop. The planned streets would be at least 100 feet wide, with a parkway in the middle (e.g. Westchester Boulevard). Having only gentle curves in streets would minimize confusion. The blocks would run north and south, and the houses would be lined up east to west to maximize sunlight. Along Roosevelt Road, Zelosky built an English-style office that was to be presented to Westchester as a civic center, which later became the village hall. The money invested in the project was astounding, running into the millions. Nevertheless, profits on the venture were not expected immediately. In 1926, Zelosky and other developers and real estate agents created a slew of fancy ads in The Chicago Tribune advertising lots in this new "dream town." Weekend excursions for prospective buyers to this new town were organized through abundant promotion. The first Westchester development under Zelosky began in the northeastern part of the village. Working out of La Grange, The Westchester Tribune, founded in 1925, reported on the progress.

The beginning of Westchester is also

associated with the Britten Camp, where Grant N. Britten acted as superintendent, overseeing the extension of the train line. The command center was located on the former Pflug farm. Over 175 workers lived in a large barn next to the main house while working on the railroad tracks and leveling the streets, initially in secrecy. Their families lived in small huts and barracks around the farm, which also became part of the Britten Camp. This was east of Mannheim Road north of the Illinois Central tracks. The plan was to build a branch off the Chicago Aurora and Elgin Line from the Bellwood station. The four Westchester stations were to be at Harrison, Roosevelt, Canterbury and Mannheim at 22nd. (The last two stops at Roosevelt were added later, by December 1930.) On October 1, 1926 train service began with the promise of twenty-four hour service. But unfortunately service was to be discontinued in 1951.

The first family to move into Westchester was the Reiche family, followed by the Jesse Wilburns.

Then came the Charles Gardaphes, whose son, the first baby born in Westchester, was supposedly named William after William

Zeloski.

While the 1920s were "roaring," so was the hectic activity in early Westchester. A dual sewer and storm system was built, 41 miles of water mains were laid, Roosevelt received the first concrete paved

street in Chicago, and underground cables were laid. In 1926 Charles Weigel, with the aid of his son Frank, laid 80,000 feet of concrete sidewalks. (Remnants of these are found today in the middle of Wolf Road Prairie!) The first apartments were built, and 15,000 American Elm trees were planted. A police department was organized. In 1926, people voted for the first time in a Westchester election, making Otto Taeterow the first village president. On October 15, 1929, streetlights were lit. Some even referred to it as "the white city in the prairie."

Nobody could anticipate the sudden collapse and the Great Depression that ensued. The promotors had sold lots, but money was now too scarce for widespread building projects. Nor could they anticipate that another world war would follow. Properties were tied up by contract and tax delinquencies, a key reason Wolf Road Prairie was not built upon. Once these delinquencies were cleared, the village grew rapidly from 1950 on to eventually surpass 18,000 residents. Lot sizes were reduced, and the modern ranch houses, bungalows and split-levels being built varied from the original Old English town concept.


The village was eventually divided into four areas, Britten, Nixon, High Ridge and Kennedy, corresponding to the names of its four schools. The Britten School (September 1930) was named after Grant Britten. The Nixon School (January 1931) was named after the other principal developer south of Roosevelt, George F. Nixon. The High Ridge School (October 1954) was built on the highest point in Westchester. The Mary Jane Kennedy School was built in 1959.

Even when construction ground to a halt in the 1930s, the village foundations were laid in other ways. In that decade, a community club, a women's club, the first PTO, the Girl Scouts and the Boy Scouts were all founded. In 1931, The Westchester News began operation.

Of the three village halls, the first was on Westchester Boulevard. The second was off Mannheim Road north of the IC tracks where the Britten Camp had been. The third was William Zeloski's old office on Roosevelt Road.

In 1958 Proviso West High School was built on the former Bohlander and Evers farmland. That same year the library moved into a wing of the village hall. Soon churches, parochial schools and businesses all arrived.

In 1985 the towers of the Westbrook Corporate Center were built, displacing the Prairie House containing the first school of the Immanuel Lutheran congregation. The forty acres dedicated to the church on the eastern side of Wolf Road stayed as unincorporated property until 1958, when it was added to the Village of Hillside. Prior to that, the Prairie House had been moved to the southwest side of the intersection of Cermak and Wolf. The Dieckhoffs who lived there sold eighty acres of that prairie remains. After the Treaty of thrived for almost a century, until all but a few

to the developers in 1924. By 1926 Reuben Nelson had rented the Prairie House with his wife Stella and their two daughters, where they lived for about four years. Mr. Nelson served as Office Manager and Time Keeper for Nixon's Westchester development. Later he became a trustee and fourth president of Westchester. His wife became a lay historian, as some of the information in this article was relayed by her in a written record from 1943.

Perhaps taking a step back to consider some historical background would be useful to establish perspective. Before European settlement of the "Prairie State," 21 of the 36 million acres of Illinois wilderness consisted of tallgrass prairie. Today, less than 0.01% Chicago in 1833 brought the resettlement of the native Potawatomi westward, new US public lands were made available for sale. Aaron Parsell is said to have resided in what was to become Proviso Township as early as 1832. A document signed by Martin van Buren in 1839 shows part of section 29 (which is located near Salt Creek bordering 31st Street) being sold to Parsell. Records show he would eventually own over 300 acres, joining other early investors who would acquire large holdings. It was mainly German farmers who settled the area, which they called Franzosenbusch (named for Nicholas Torode, of French origin, who lived further northeast). The resulting farming community

traces of the old farmsteads were demolished and cleared to make way for the new concept of an ideal modern town called Westchester.

Keeping all this in mind gives us more reason than ever to feel fortunate that Wolf Road Prairie and the Prairie House containing the 1853 schoolhouse museum have survived. They give us rare opportunities to not only become familiar with little-known aspects of times past, but also with the beauty and thriving wildlife of our natural heritage, for the people of Westchester and beyond to appreciate throughout the changing seasons.



Westchester Primary School

To start the new year on January 6th, Westchester Primary School revisited our Dolphin Pride Expectations (Be Ready. Be Caring. Be safe.) and participated in activities to build our school culture, climate, and community of learning after the winter break. We know that when students are explicitly taught and held to high expectations, they are prepared and empowered to be successful. When our students showed exemplary behavior in January for showing self-control, they were awarded a lanyard to wear displaying their use of the Zones of Regulation.

Last month, Westchester Primary School's first and second-grade students were assessed to determine their progress with our benchmark assessments, including the NWEA MAP (Measures of Academic Progress). This state-aligned computerized adaptive assessment program provides educators with the information they need to improve teaching and learning and make student-focused and data-driven decisions. Students are tested on MAP three times each year (fall, winter, and spring) in the areas of reading and math. The teachers use this growth and achievement data from MAP and other benchmark assessments to develop targeted instructional strategies and to plan school improvement for the remainder of the year.

Additionally, students identified as English Language Learners participate in ACCESS each January. ACCESS is the state assessment designed to measure a student's English proficiency and growth in all four language domains- reading, writing, listening, and speaking. This test is also designed to measure student performance with the social language used daily and more complex academic language. Students will participate in whole group reading, writing, and listening tests and individual speaking assessments. Information gathered from this assessment assists teachers with designing effective instruction. All students participating in ACCESS testing kicked off the testing period with an assembly highlighting the testing areas and explaining why it is essential to try your best!

With winter benchmark data collection completed, WPS continues learning and celebrating this month. WPS excitedly honors Black History Month through daily activities. Also, we will celebrate Valentine's Day with activities planned and organized by the Westchester Parents and Teachers for Children (WPTC), and students will participate in activities to commemorate the 100th day of school and the mid-year mark.


