Village of Westchester

From the desk of Village President Greg Hribal



Happy New Year and Happy Birthday Westchester!!!! I hope everyone had a happy and healthy end to 2024 as we look forward to an exciting 2025.

Westchester is rooted in deep history from its humble beginnings in 1925 to where we are today in 2025 with almost 7000 households. Throughout the year expect to hear or see some of that history as we celebrate the 100th anniversary. A 100th-anniversary committee has recently been established to bring forward plans to celebrate the centennial throughout the year.

On October 3rd 1925, residents residing within the boundaries of Westchester voted in favor of formally incorporating the community. Although a lawsuit was formally filed in an effort to claim that the vote was not legal, the judge saw otherwise. On November 8th 1925 developers George Nixon and William Zelosky closed a deal acquiring 2000 acres of Westchester land for a record breaking \$5,000,000 (90 million in 2024 dollars) and began marketing the future home building in the community. Although a few hundred homes were built in the 1920's, the Great Depression completely halted building until the 1950's when a housing boom spurred thousands of homes that nearly all continue to exist today.

Before we get too far into 2025, I wish to take a moment to thank everyone who donated and provided support towards the various holiday gift giving activities the Village of Westchester participated in this season. Shop-with-a-Cop, Toys for Tots and Christmas in Proviso were all extremely successful in bringing joys to families in need.

Residents have been asking what might be happen if a proposed merger of Jewel and Mariano's were to happen as previously reported in the news. The Village was contacted in the fall about the two brands that were to combine and advised the Mariano's brand would be sold to C&S Wholesale Grocers who would take over the operations of the Mariano's but not be making any changes to the name or appearance of the store. On December 18th the Village was notified that the sale between the parties involved would not occur and that the two grocery brands would continue to operate independently.

The Westchester Police Department has asked that inform residents of various scams involving text messages. In this era of online ordering where home deliveries are commonplace, there are various scams involving text messages reportedly being from the U.S. Customs Office and the United States Postal Service claiming that a package cannot be delivered. Please do not respond to any of these messages and ignore them.

As a reminder, Proviso Township continues its handyman program that can help homeowners with minor repairs around the house in addition to providing referral services for larger home maintenance issues. Residents that are 60 and older or disabled qualify for the \$5.00 per visit (not including parts) to assist with various minor repairs such as assistance with door repairs, window caulking and much more. Visit the Proviso Township website for an entire list of what services they provide or call 708-449-4307.

Join us in congratulating Sergeant Brian Lamphere on his retirement after 20 years of dedicated service to Westchester. A former Army Sergeant with deployments during the Iraq War, Brian's contributions to our community and country are deeply appreciated. Best wishes in your retirement!

And finally, this month we have been fortunate to have avoided heavy snowfalls this winter but wish to remind residents of the restrictions to parking in the event 2 inches or more of snow does fall. The following provides the best information to help understand how the parking restrictions work.

Winter Parking Restrictions are between December 1st, 2024 and March 31st, 2025, after 2" or more of snowfall. It is unlawful to park any vehicle, on odd numbered sides of the street on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, and on even numbered sides of the street on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays until snow has been removed.

Stay Safe This Holiday Season: Tips from the Westchester Fire Department

We hope you had a wonderful December! As we move into the cold months, the Westchester Fire Department wants to remind you to be mindful of carbon monoxide safety. Carbon monoxide is a gas that remains after incomplete burning of materials containing carbon, such as gasoline, natural gas, propane, charcoal, firewood, etc. While our homes are designed to vent CO to the outside, there are some safe practices you can do to ensure a safe and healthy home. Think about all the appliances you have that run on natural gas or use burning to create heat and keep them maintained properly. Some apartments that have electric stoves and heaters will still have gas-fed boilers in the basement—that is why we have adopted into our municipal code that a residence shall have properly located and operating carbon monoxide detectors located within fifteen feet (15') of each sleeping room/area and outside of the furnace room. Another reminder is to keep key fobs away from children to avoid automatic starting of vehicles in attached garages which can cause a CO emergency. If your CO detector activates and you need assistance, call 911 and we will come to your home to check your CO levels.


Please check out the following safety sheet from The National Fire Protection Association on CO safety.

- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- Choose a CO alarm that is listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel declare that it is safe to re-enter the home.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.
- Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO — only use outside.

Happy New Year 2025

As we leave 2024 behind, I think we can all agree it was one of the most challenging years we’ve seen in a long time.

My hope and prayer for 2025 is that it brings more stability to the world—along with peace, prosperity, and unity for all. Every night, the news highlights another person being victimized or another police officer losing their life while protecting others. Stress and tension seem to be at an all-time high, leading to incidents that might have been avoided if people could pause and remain calm in difficult moments.

While our officers write plenty of traffic tickets each year, people continue to drive at high speeds, putting innocent lives at risk.

In residential areas especially, we all need to slow down and stay alert. In 2024, our local police departments saw a rise in serious weapons violations and shooting victims.

Across the country, 130 police officers were tragically killed in the line of duty, and an average of 180 officers took their own lives. These statistics are sobering, and they remind us of the risks officers take every day to keep our communities safe.

One year, as a young officer, I wrote 632 speeding tickets—and even then, I could have written 10 more each day in the same location. The issue persists, and it’s a reminder for all of us to be more mindful of our surroundings, whether we’re driving, walking, or simply going about our day. The members of the Westchester Police Department remain dedicated to protecting our residents, ready to put our lives on the line to shield the innocent from harm.

As we start this new year, I encourage everyone to take a moment to connect with their neighbors.

It’s disheartening to hear from residents who’ve lived here for decades and don’t even know the people next door.

While not every neighbor will be friendly right away, taking that first step can make a big difference. In a time when division seems to grow, we need to come together, look out for each other, and strengthen our community.

Working together, we can make a difference. As a man with strong faith, I see the challenges in our world today as reminders to stay vigilant and work toward positive change. Let’s make 2025 a year of unity, safety, and kindness.

Garbage Schedule**

There will be no change to the garbage collection schedule.

Live Christmas trees up to 5 feet long will be collected on your regular rubbish day through January 17, 2025. Trees over 5 feet in length must be cut down for collection.

SBC yard waste collection will resume your first collection day in April

Village branch collection will resume the week of April 7th - 11th

The Village Hall will be collecting non-working holiday lights for recycling until February 3rd

S.B.C. Waste Solutions, Inc. – 312-522-1115

- If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.
- You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.) at the curb every week for collection. Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.
- S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), at no additional charge, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, universal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Village Snow Restrictions

Public Works crews keep our streets free of snow and ice during the winter months.
Please assist us by observing the following:

- Place garbage cans 3 feet behind the curb line-

- do not place them in the street.**
- **Do not shovel or blow snow back into the cleared streets.**
 - Please observe the “NO PARKING SNOW ROUTE” signs.
-The snow portion of the signs will be enforced after 2 inches of snowfall between December 1st and March 31st.

If you reside on a Primary designated SNOW ROUTE, after 2 inches of snowfall you must remove all vehicles from the snow route. Vehicles must stay off the street until the streets are cleared thoroughly by the plows by Public Works. If the snowfall is continuing, the restriction is in place until Public Works completes the plowing for the day. Please check the signs at the corners of your block.

If you reside on a Secondary route, there is no parking Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday on the even numbered house side and no parking Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday on the odd numbered house side after 2 inches of snowfall. Please check the signs at the corners and center of your block for guidance. (This includes ALL side streets not designated a Primary snow route.)

If you have a Fire Hydrant on your parkway, please help keep the hydrant clear of snow so that the Fire Department may easily access the hydrant in case of an emergency, and so that the snow plows may quickly identify the hydrants while plowing.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted, sooner rather than later, on any

parkway.

2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees, please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

Improving Your Indoor Environment

Did you know we spend about 90% of our time indoors?

Levels of air pollution indoors can be as high, and sometimes higher, than outdoor levels. Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) can affect anyone’s health, but older adults, children, and people with health conditions like asthma and heart disease can be more vulnerable. Learn about indoor air pollution and the steps that you can take to improve your indoor environment.

Indoor Air and Health are Connected - Take Action

- Learn how reducing indoor contaminants may improve health. Tour the IAQ Demo House at <https://www.epa.gov/indoor-air-quality-iaq/interactive-tour-indoor-air-quality-demo-house>
- Ventilate! When outdoor air quality and weather permit, open doors and windows. Run kitchen and bathroom exhaust fans when cooking and showering.
- Consider a high-efficiency air filter for your HVAC system and/ or a portable air cleaner that does not intentionally emit ozone.
- Control indoor moisture to prevent mold. Fix water leaks and keep humidity levels between 30-50% by ventilating or using a dehumidifier if necessary.
- Install and inspect carbon monoxide and smoke alarms.
- Declutter, wipe dust with a damp rag, and vacuum to help reduce asthma triggers, allergens, pests, and pollutants.
- If you rent, inform your landlord right away about indoor air quality or water concerns. You may also consult Environmental Law Institute’s Indoor Air Quality Guide for Tenants at <https://www.eli.org/buildings/indoor-air-quality-guide-tenants-2017>

Vent Your Combustion Appliances

- Vent all combustion appliances to the outside. Combustion appliances like heaters, stoves, and dryers can produce dangerous pollutants in your indoor air. See: Literature Review on the Impacts of Residential Combustion Final Report July 2022 (American Lung Association) at https://www.lung.org/getmedia/2786f983-d971-43ad-962b-8370c950cbd6/ICF_Impacts-of-Residential-Combustion_FINAL_071022.pdf
 - Have your combustion appliances (like wood heaters and gas stoves) inspected annually and follow manufacturer instructions. Appliances that are not working properly can produce dangerous pollutants like carbon monoxide.
 - Never use a cooking stove to heat indoors and never use a fuel powered generator indoors, even during power outages.
- Consider Outdoor Air Quality**
- Learn about pollution in your community and check outdoor air quality at AirNow.gov. Outdoor air pollution can impact IAQ.
 - Be smoke ready. Purchase air cleaners and extra filters before wildfires start and create a clean air room. see: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=V8DqzogXcVg>
 - During fires, check air quality at fire.airnow.gov or local news.
- Reduce Chemical Pollution Indoors**
- Minimize the indoor use of cleaners, pesticides, perfumes, and other household and personal chemical products.
 - Use less toxic cleaning products like mild soap and water. Look for products with EPA’s Safer Choice label.
 - Follow product label instructions, don’t mix chemicals, and ventilate when painting, cleaning, sanitizing or disinfecting.
 - Use non-chemical methods like integrated pest management whenever possible to manage pests. Avoid using pesticide sprays and foggers.
 - Avoid smoking or using e-cigarettes



indoors. If you live in multi-unit housing, consider advocating for a smoke-free policy in your building.

Check for Lead and Radon

- Test for lead in your home or school if it was built before 1978 and consult with your child’s healthcare provider for advice on blood lead testing. Welcome to 2025! This month’s recipe works well for breakfast, a snack, and even a light dessert. This sweet, vegan treat is packed with flavor and takes only minutes to prepare. A great one to add to the weekly rotation.

Strawberry Chia Seed Pudding
makes about 6 servings

Ingredients
2 cups of frozen organic strawberries
¼ cup of white chia seeds

2 tablespoons of maple syrup
½ teaspoon of vanilla extract
1 can (13 ounce) of coconut milk
½ cup of non-dairy coconut milk
1 cup of fresh organic blueberries and/or sliced organic strawberries

Instructions

- Blend first 6 ingredients in a blender for 15 seconds, wait 3-4 minutes before blending for an additional 15 seconds.
- Refrigerate covered for 6 hours to overnight.
- Serve with fresh blueberries and/or sliced strawberries.

Each serving contains about 150 calories, 3g protein, 6g fiber, 12g carbohydrates (5g sugar), and 2g fat.

Celebrating 100 Years of Westchester: 1925–2025

Westchester, located in Cook County, 13 miles west of the Chicago Loop, has a rich history that reflects its transformation from farmland to a distinctive suburban community. In the mid-19th century, German farmers settled in the area, leaving behind a few old farmhouses and streets named after them. These remnants hint at the nearly 150-year history of farming that preceded the Village's development.

The name "Westchester," along with the predominantly English street names and several homes built in the 1920s, reflects the vision of its founders. Utilities tycoon Samuel Insull, a native of London, purchased approximately 2,200 acres of farmland in 1924, envisioning a model English-style town. The planned extension of the Garfield Park rapid transit line from Chicago made this location ideal for suburban development.

On October 3, 1925, residents voted to incorporate the community, and Westchester was officially incorporated on December 16, 1925. Developers George Nixon and William Zelosky acquired significant portions of the land, investing in infrastructure such as paved streets, sidewalks, sewers, street lamps, and water mains, as well as the planting of parkway trees. The distinct English-style architecture, featuring brick, stucco, and hand-hewn timbers, set Westchester apart from many other suburbs. The rapid transit line, completed to 12th Street (Roosevelt Road) in 1926 and to 22nd Street (Cermak Road) in 1930, enabled prospective buyers to view properties in the burgeoning Village.

However, the Great Depression brought construction to a halt in the 1930s, with many properties tied up in contract and tax delinquencies. After World War II, Westchester began to clear these delinquent properties, and the postwar housing boom between 1950 and 1960 spurred a dramatic population increase from 4,308 to 18,092 residents. The few English-style homes built before the Depression were soon surrounded by Georgians, ranches, and split-levels. As the rapid transit line was removed and expressways such as the Eisenhower Expressway and Tri-State Tollway reshaped transportation in the 1950s, Westchester's location became increasingly advantageous.

In the 1980s, some of the village's remaining farmland was developed into the Westbrook Corporate Center, a cluster of five 10-story office buildings near Cermak Road and Wolf Road, expanding the Village's commercial tax base. Residential development in the 1990s consumed nearly all remaining

open land, except for the 85-acre Wolf Road Prairie. Preserved largely through the efforts of the Save the Prairie Society, active since 1975, this Illinois State Nature Preserve remains a rare remnant of the prairies that once covered much of Illinois.

As Westchester approaches its centennial in 2025, the village reflects on a history marked by visionary planning, resilience through challenges, a commitment to preserving its natural heritage, and unwavering community spirit. Throughout the centennial year, residents can look forward to events and stories celebrating the journey that brought us to this milestone.

The Village extends a special acknowledgement to our 100th Anniversary Committee—Bethanny Alexander, Bill Ernst, Jeannie Helgesen, Julie Jordan, Magdalene Ladas, Rosann Nicholson, and Andrew Roback—who have worked diligently to brainstorm creative ways to acknowledge and celebrate Westchester's history. Their

dedication ensures this milestone year will be memorable for the entire community.

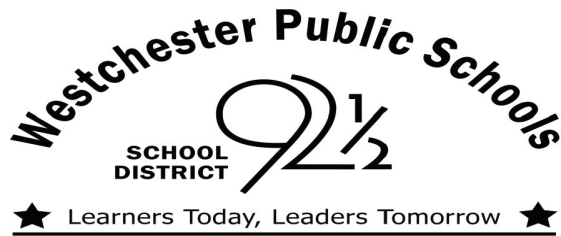

Westchester Primary School

Westchester Primary Community is dedicated to social-emotional and academic growth. During December, our students focused on "Being the Light" through their kind actions and following Dolphin Pride: Be Ready. Be Caring, Be Safe. Through our activities our students shined bright at WPS!

Additionally, all kindergarten-second grade students revisited their goals for academic learning. Our students will demonstrate their progress through a variety of assessments including the NWEA Math and Reading Map Assessment for first and second graders. When our students returned to school in January, Westchester Primary School gathered additional student growth data using other district benchmark assessments. These assessments provide our educators with the information they need to improve teaching and learning, make student-focused and data-driven decisions and provide our families with student growth information. Students in grades one and two are tested three times each year (fall, winter, and spring) in the areas of reading and math on NWEA MAP. All kindergarten, first, and second graders are also assessed using Fastbridge and other grade-level assessments to determine their growth from fall to winter and then again in the spring. Our staff uses this growth and achievement data to develop targeted instructional strategies, differentiate instruction, and plan school wide curricular improvements.

Additionally, at the end of each January, students who have been identified as English Language Learners will participate in ACCESS, the State-assessment designed to measure students' proficiency and growth in English in all four domains of language- reading, writing, listening, and speaking. This test is also designed to measure student performance with both social languages used every day and more complex academic language. Students will participate in whole-group reading, writing, and listening tests and individual speaking assessments. Information gathered from this assessment assists teachers with designing effective instruction.

In December, the Westchester Primary School Student Council created ornaments and decorated our Westchester Park District tree that was sponsored by the Westchester Parents & Teachers for Children (WPTC) Organization. WPS would like to thank the WPTC for sponsoring this tree as part of the Westchester Community Trim-A-Tree event. Our WPS students participated in the WPTC classroom winter parties and an all-school sing-along with songs to celebrate the diverse holidays before winter break. Also, WPS celebrated with a spirit week created by the Student Council to bring extra joy to our last week of school in 2024! 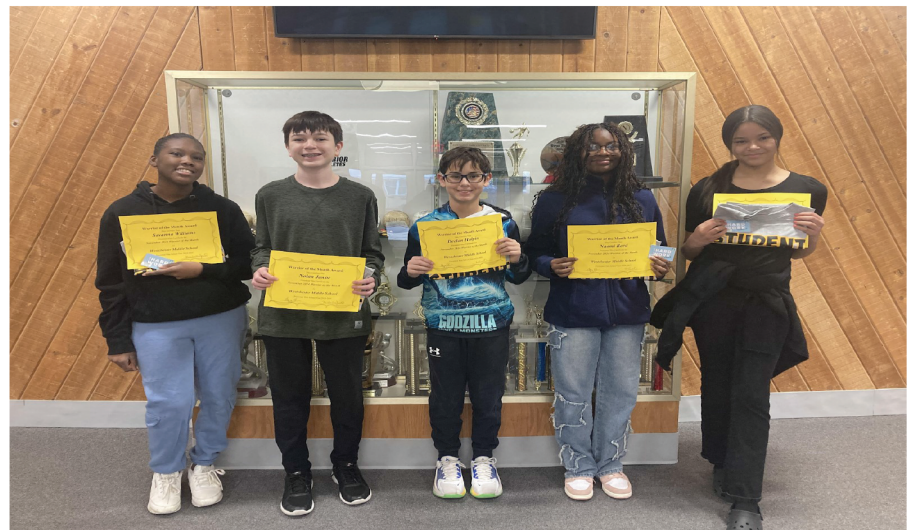

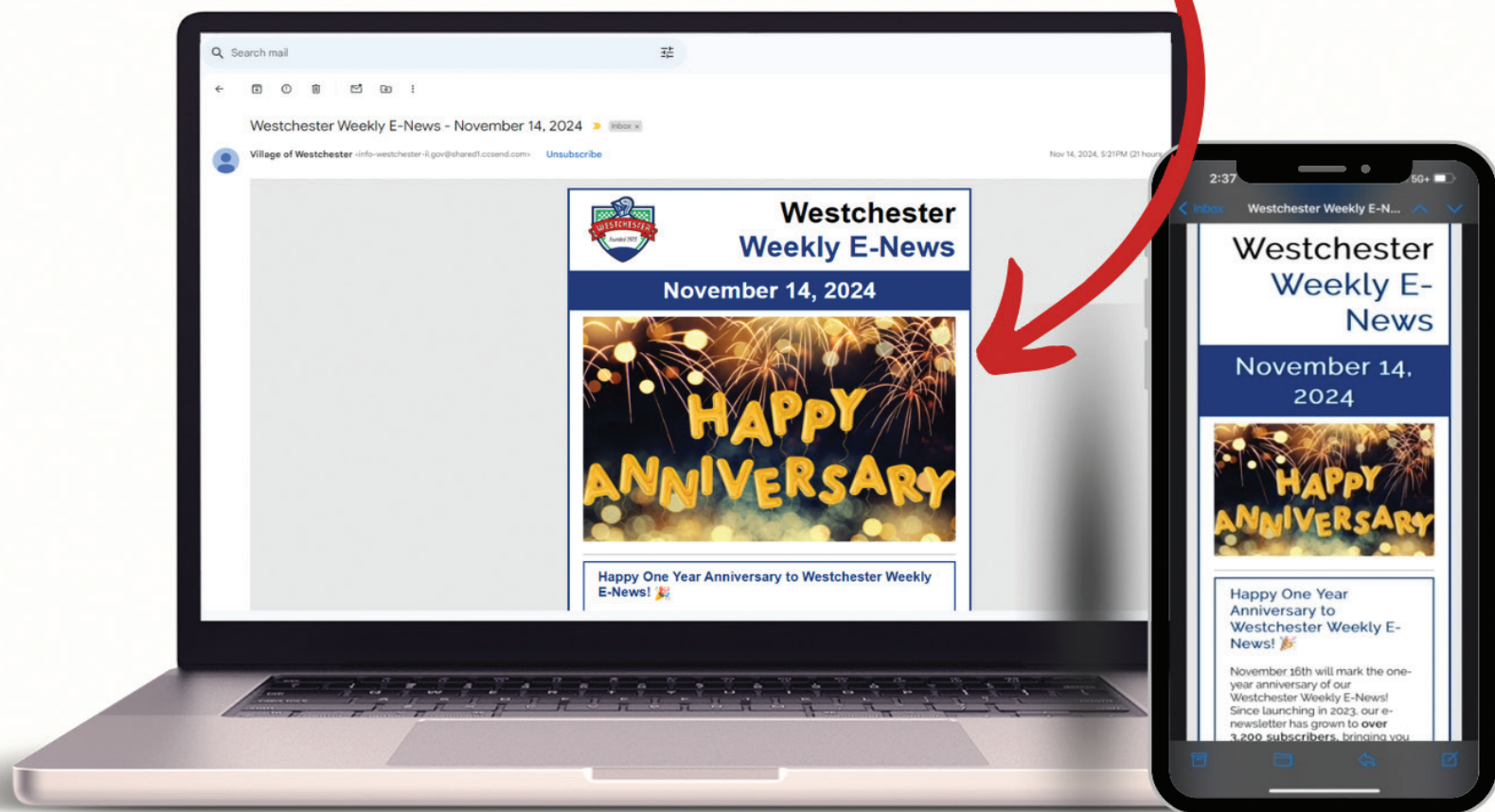
