From the desk of Village President Greg Hribal

Summer is here.

The Waste Management garbage contract was scheduled to expire in July of this year, requiring the board to seek bids for rubbish removal. The village received 6 bids, with Waste Management's bid coming in at 75% higher than the lowest bidder, SBC Waste Solutions. The board discussed, over several meetings, the options presented to us and formally selected SBC Waste Solutions to replace Waste Management this July. The goal is to provide equal or increased services and minimize disruption during the transition.

At the May 14th Village Board Meeting, a water rate increase was passed that will go into effect July 1st and will be reflected on the September water bill. The September utility bill will be the first bill to reflect both the garbage cost reduction as well as the water rate increase. This utility rate increase was to provide exclusively for the replacement of lead water mains and service lines within the community that has recently been mandated by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Residents can preview what their expected bi-monthly bill would be on our website, with our online calculator. Your water bill includes the amount of usage for the two-month period that will be calculated with the reduction in garbage costs to determine what potential increase in cost you may have in September. For further questions and answers please see the article to answer many of your questions later in this newsletter. This information along with frequently asked questions about our change to SBC Waste Solutions can be found online on our website.

This past month I had the honor in swearing in both newly hired as well as promoted personnel. Firefighters Mark Wandtke and Daniel Perzyna were sworn in as Fire Lieutenants. Sean O'Connor and David Middendorf as Fire Captains. Patrol officer and Detective Kevin Tierney was promoted to Police Sergeant and Erick P. McCord III and Jose Rodriguez Tabuyo were sworn in as newly hired patrol officers who have recently completed the police academy. We wish them all great success in their new positions.

Deputy Chief Michael Fellers attended and graduated from the 10-week prestigious Northwestern University Center for Public Safety's school of Staff and Command. The program, commonly reserved for administrative staff, provides excellent training on critical command-level content such as planning and policies, media relations, organizational behavior, budgeting and resource allocation, human resources, contemporary policing, and more. Congratulations Deputy Chief Fellers.

Thank you, Officer Cristian Aguirre, for your hard work in the annual fundraising for Special Olympics. Cop on a Rooftop raised \$3,400 this year, surpassing our collection of \$2,800 from last year. For those unaware, this fundraising event is statewide, and locally the fundraising activity occurs at our Dunkin Donuts on 31st Street at Wolf. Those who donate receive shirts and mugs for their generous contributions. A continuation of this fundraising event is

scheduled for Saturday June 22nd at 8am as police officers participate in the torch run from Forest Park to Hillside.

The Balmoral Avenue reconstruction project which was previously planned to be complete in September is ahead of schedule and is expected to be complete sometime in June. The remaining 2024 street projects include Martindale Drive, Boeger from Windsor to Cermak, Kensington from Fleet to Wakefield, along with Newbury and Fairfield. Residents in the affected areas will be notified prior to construction beginning.

Summer Swimming Safety Tips

As the warm weather settles in and summer beckons us to cool off in the water, the Westchester Fire Department would like to remind everyone of the importance of swimming safety. Whether you're heading to a local pool, lake, or planning a trip to the beach, keeping these essential tips in mind can ensure a fun and safe experience for all.

1. Never Swim Alone

Always swim with a buddy. Even experienced swimmers can encounter unexpected difficulties. Having someone with you can be a lifesaver in an emergency.

2. Supervise Children Closely

Children should always be supervised by an adult when near or in the water. For younger children or weak swimmers, an adult should be within arm's reach at all times. Designate a "Water Watcher" to maintain constant vigilance.

3. Learn to Swim

Enroll yourself and your children in swimming lessons. Knowing how to swim can significantly reduce the risk of drowning. The Westchester Park District offers swim lessons.

4. Understand Pool Rules and Signage Pay attention to posted rules and follow lifeguard instructions. These guidelines are in place to protect everyone.

$5. \, Use \, Life \, Jackets \, When \, Necessary \,$

For non-swimmers and those not confident in their swimming abilities, wearing a U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jacket is crucial. Ensure it fits properly and is in good condition.

6. Avoid Alcohol

Do not consume alcohol before or during swimming, boating, or supervising children in the water. Alcohol impairs judgment, balance, and coordination.

7. Learn CPR

In the event of an emergency, knowing CPR can make the difference between life and death. The Westchester Fire Department offers CPR classes. Contact us to find out more about our next training session.

8. Be Aware of Weather Conditions

Check the weather forecast before heading out to swim. Avoid swimming during storms or when there is lightning.

9. Stay Hydrated and Use Sunscreen

Swimming outdoors can lead to dehydration and sunburn. Drink plenty of water, and apply and reapply sunscreen to



protect your skin.

10. Know Your Limits

Don't push yourself beyond your comfort level or ability, whether it's swimming distance or trying new water sports.

By following these simple yet effective safety tips, we can all enjoy a safe and refreshing summer. The Westchester Fire Department is committed to the safety and well-being of our community. Upcoming Utility Rate Increase - Overview and FAQs

Purpose of This Effort

As part of the Village's commitment to community improvements, capital infrastructure, and maintaining safe and reliable utility services, the Village President and Board of Trustees have approved adjustments to water and sewer utility rates, effective July 1, 2024. These adjustments are necessary due to two primary factors: aging infrastructure and the Lead Service Replacement Mandate.

How Does Water and Sewer Service Work?

The Village purchases water from the Broadview Westchester Joint Water Authority (BWJWA), who purchase water from the City of Chicago. The water purchased from the BWJWA is just for obtaining water for the Village. Once purchased, the Village is responsible for all costs to operate, maintain, repair, and, if needed, replace the water system infrastructure throughout the Village.

Furthermore, sanitary sewer treatment and stormwater runoff is handled by the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (MWRD). While MWRD treats sewage and manages stormwater runoff downstream when it discharges into waterways, the Village, like the water system, is also responsible for all costs related to the sanitary and storm sewer systems throughout the Village.

Why is a Rate Increase Needed?

Utility Fund revenues can only be used to fund the operations, maintenance, and improvements of the Village's Utility System. Our community is facing a pressing challenge of aging underground infrastructure, with a significant portion of our water mains (49%), storm sewers (27%), and sanitary sewers (60%) dating back to the 1920s-1930s. This centuryold infrastructure, over 75 miles of main in total, requires urgent attention and an ongoing improvement plan to ensure the continued delivery of safe and reliable water and sewer services to our residents. Funds received from increased utility rates support the capital improvements needed to bring this underground infrastructure up to date, reducing the frequency of service interruptions due to main breaks and emergency repairs. This improvement plan is anticipated to be a 20-year effort, and is estimated to cost approximately \$120

What About Lead Water Services?

The Lead Service Replacement Act, mandated by the federal government, requires the identification and replacement of all lead service lines in our water system. This unfunded mandate reinforces the critical need for proactive investments in our infrastructure to uphold public health standards and meet regulatory obligations. Currently, there are approximately 1,000



"resident-side" (from the outside valve to the water meter) lead water services, and approximately 3,600 "Village-side" (from the water main to the outside valve) lead water services throughout Westchester. Under this mandate, the Village must remove all lead services from the water system by 2044.

While municipalities have the option to devise a funding strategy that could entail individual residents bearing the burden of lead service line replacements, which can cost upwards of \$15,000 per service line, the Village has instead chosen to incorporate and fund lead water service line replacements as part of these adjust utility rates. These utility rate adjustments enable the Village to absorb these costs as part of the overall underground infrastructure program, without separate additional cost to Village residents. This approach ensures that lead service line replacements are seamlessly integrated with the Village's community-wide infrastructure projects, at more competitive rates due to utilizing economies of scale.

Utility Bill Impact

The water usage rate will be \$16.70 per 1,000 gallons used, and the sewer usage rate will be \$3.50 per 1,000 gallons used, which will take effect on July 1, 2024. These rates will be seen on the September utility bills, and water and sewer charges are billed in arrears. It is important to note that individual usage is notated on utility bills as units, where each unit equals 1,000 gallons. For example, if your utility bill says 5 units of water usage, that equates to 5,000 gallons used.

This initial rate adjustment aims to prevent a deficit in the Village's Utility Fund while a comprehensive professional study is conducted by a third-party consultant to determine the ongoing rate needed to continue funding underground capital infrastructure improvement in the future .

In addition, historically, the Village has received higher costs to purchase water than what was charged to users. For example, in 2023, the BWJWA received a 22.55% water rate increase to the cost of water purchased from the City of Chicago, which was passed on to the Village. In the same year, Village water rates increased 3%. This has resulted in costs outpacing revenues in the Villages Utility Fund.

Estimates used in Village Staff analysis during the multiple meetings the Village Board reviewed and discussed recommendations for rate adjustments follow the EPA average individual consumption rate of 82 gallons per day. However, many Westchester residents use substantially less than 82 gallons per individual per day. As part of the communications and information about the rate adjustments, a utility bill calculator tool is available below. This calculator, along with additional information about the rate change, is available on the Village website so residents can enter their most recent usage from the May utility bills to see an estimate of their September utility bill.

Fortunately, the Village is transitioning to a new rubbish service hauler, SBC Waste Solutions, on July 1, which will be seen on the upcoming July utility bills. This transition will save residents approximately 23.6% on the rubbish charge, partially offsetting the utility usage rate increases.

Alternative Funding to Address Capital Improvement

Village staff and consultants are extremely diligent in pursuing grants for projects to reduce the financial burden on Westchester residents and businesses. Due to this extreme effort, for the current fiscal year, the Village is receiving \$4.3 million in capital

project grant funding awards.

Anytime a grant is available that the Village is even remotely eligible for, the Village applies for that grant. It is important to note that several grant opportunities require projects to be "shovel ready", meaning if the grant is awarded, the project is already designed, engineered, and ready to be sent out to bid. As such, the Village tries to stay one construction season ahead of anticipated future projects so if a grant opportunity arises, the Village is more likely to obtain that grant.

Unfortunately, a lot of the current grant and loan (with forgiveness) programs available for underground infrastructure have median household income (MHI) limits. Recently per the IEPA, the MHI for our area is \$72,563, and Westchester's MHI is \$94,151. As such, the Village is frequently denied grant opportunities due to Westchester's MHI exceeding grant eligibility requirements.

Overall Objective

The fundamental objective of the Village remains to deliver safe and dependable services to our residents. Remember, from the day-to-day motions of turning on a faucet or flushing a toilet, to the sudden emergencies that require firefighting efforts, our goal is to ensure that these essential services are always readily available, without compromise.

Your understanding and support are crucial as we work towards building a safer and more resilient community for generations to come.

PUBLIC WORKS

Village branch collection for June will be the week of the 3rd – 7th

July's collection will be the week of July 8th – 12th

August's collection will be the week of August 5th – 9th

The Public Works Department will collect branches the first full working week of every month (April-November)

- All brush must be put out on the front parkway by 7:00 a.m. on the designated pickup day. Branches can be up to 7 feet in length and stacked with the butt ends facing the street in the same direction. If not stacked properly, a "restack" notice will be left.
- Again, please put ALL brush out on your designated pickup day and Public Works crews will determine what constitutes an open load, which will be picked up later in the week.
- An open load would include any brush that will not fit through the chipper such as logs, stumps, and large limbs. These must be cut for one man to lift. Dirt must be removed from any root balls for pickup.
- Public Works Crews will only pass through a designated pickup area once due to time, scheduling, and other workload responsibilities.

Landscapers & tree services are responsible for their own brush disposal.

Please note the following schedule for branch pickup:

MONDAY: From Mannheim Rd west to Wolf Rd and from Canterbury St south to Windsor Dr-including both sides of Windsor Dr. Also Waterford, Waverly, Camelot and Concord.

TUESDAY: Roosevelt Rd south to Cermak Rd-from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd.

WEDNESDAY: From Roosevelt Rd north

to the expressway and from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd. Also, Roosevelt Rd south to Canterbury St from Haase Ave west to Heidorn Ave.

THURSDAY: From Belleview Ave west to Wolf Rd, Martindale Dr south to 31st Street

Waste Management also collects yard waste weekly on your regular collection day.

- If your garbage or recycling was not picked up on your regular day, please call Waste Management directly to report a missed collection.
- If you have large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.,) please call Waste Management directly to schedule a large item collection.

The Waste Management's "At Your Door Special Collection" service will pick up unwanted-potentially hazardous and hard-to-recycle items from your home.

Street Parking Restrictions

As of April 1, snow parking restrictions are lifted and street maintenance parking restrictions go into effect. Please check the signs at the ends of your block or check the Village website so you don't receive a ticket!

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if

you would like to request a tree be planted sooner rather than later in a parkway.

2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident can choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees, please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

Westchester Sidewalk Replacement Program

The Village will replace public sidewalk trip hazards this fall. We also offer a 50/50 shared cost sidewalk replacement program if the public sidewalk in front and/or on the side of your residence is in poor condition, but does not qualify as a hazard. Please call Public Works at 708-345-0041 to have an evaluation done and to register for squares. Both programs are first come, first served.

Village Watering Restrictions

There are water use restrictions in effect every year, May 15th to September 15th, from

12 p.m. to 6 p.m. This includes:

- (1) Outdoor Watering
- (2) Cleaning Outdoor Surfaces
- (3) Cleaning Buildings
- (4) Pool Filling
- (5) Sprinkling/sprinklers

Outdoor water use during unrestricted hours (before 12 p.m., after 6 p.m.) is allowed on even numbered days for residents with even numbered addresses, and on odd numbered days for residents with odd numbered addresses. If we have a dry summer, further restrictions may be necessary.






• 2024 Street Resurfacing Program

Global Warming and Electric Vehicles - Why buy an EV?

As you may already know and have read in previous GROW articles in this newspaper, the earth is experiencing global warming. Our local temperatures, on average, are warmer now than decades ago. I grew up in Chicago and have seen the warming winters with less snowfall and the increasing severity of storms, all consequences of rising temperatures. Are we (humans) the cause for this warming? The vast majority of climate scientists agree that burning of coal to create electricity, the burning of refined oil to create gasoline/diesel-powered cars/ trucks/trains/planes and the burning of natural gas to heat buildings and to cook have caused a rapid buildup of carbon dioxide (CO2) and other greenhouse gases in the atmosphere. (99.966% of the peer-reviewed scientific papers in the last decade are in agreement with human activity as the cause of climate change. Ref 1) With the onset of the industrial revolution. humans unknowingly extracted these fossil fuels (i.e. coal, oil, and natural gas) which were then thought to be a gold mind of energy from the earth. But, in reality, today we now know that although burning fossil fuels created energy, a comfortable life style, and wealth, it also released back into the air the buried carbon causing global warming (Ref 2, 3).

I have asked myself, but what more can I do to reduce my CO2 emissions? The Congressional Budget Office recently reports that transportation is a major emitter of CO2. Personal vehicles (cars, light trucks such as sport utility vehicles/ SUV, and motorcycles) are responsible for about 22% of all energy-related emissions of CO2 (16% originates from buses, commercial trucks, aviation, rail, and ships)(Ref 4). Thus, my solution was to reduce our high transportation carbon footprint. But what would it be like to not use any gasoline to commute. Well, one can walk or bike, but this was not very convenient when commuting to work or when taking my son to and from school.

In 2012, when my 12 year old full size, gas powered sedan developed a major repair, we decided to buy a hybrid plugin electric vehicle, the Chevy Volt. The price of the car was reduced with both Federal and State rebates. The car was



small in size, but it worked. With a fully charged battery, the Volt would drive off of the battery until out of charge. Then, a gasoline engine would turn on to power the battery that propelled the car. Initially, it had a 50 mile range off of the battery and a 260 mile range off of the gasoline engine. With the gas engine running, the Volt got about 40 mpg. I charged the car in my garage overnight using a 110 volt line 1-2 times per week. I would drive months without needing the gas engine. In the past twelve years, I only drove about 2000 miles using the gas engine. The downside of charging the battery was that the electricity came from coal burning power plants. In 2013, my wife found and we gladly converted our electricity from coal burning plants to wind farms in Indiana.

Also in 2013, my wife's small gas powered SUV developed a major repair. Then, because we appreciated not having to buy a lot of gasoline for the Volt, we decided to buy an all electric Tesla with its longer range 280 mile battery. At that time, Tesla had a series of supercharging stations already built through parts of the USA. As of 2023, Tesla alone has nearly 22,000 superchargers in every state of the USA (Ref 5). There are > 145,000 gas fueling stations in the USA (Ref 6) because owners of gas powered vehicles cannot refuel their vehicle at home. Most EV owners charge their car's battery in their home garage. With the Tesla, we have only gone to a supercharger once or twice per year. The high number of superchargers made it easy for my family to take longer trips without worrying about running out of battery charge. As with the Volt, the cost of the Tesla was reduced by tax rebates from the Federal and State governments. Because of the larger battery on the Tesla, a 220 volt line was installed in the garage. My wife charges the Tesla overnight about every other week. When charging either car, the cost of renewable electricity per miles driven is about a third of the cost of gasoline used per miles driven.

Over the past 11 years of driving the Volt, I filled the 9 gal gas tank approximately 10 times. Only twice did I need to change the gas engine oil, brakes and tires. I replaced the smaller 12 volt battery once and had two repairs on the larger battery – the first time the battery problem was covered under warranty (a blockage in the battery coolant system needed to be flushed), while the second time a \$260 battery sensor was replaced.

A few months ago, we decided to change cars from the hybrid plug-in Volt to a fully electric vehicle. Imagine, I would no longer pump gas into a tank nor change the engine oil. Today's EVs even have longer battery ranges than my wife's car and can be supercharged in under 30 minutes. Now with more reports on EVs in the social media, some acquaintances advised me not to buy an EV. These reports complain that the mining of lithium and other rare elements used in making the battery is environmentally unfriendly. Also, the EV is so heavy that there is excessive wear of the tires creating another different environmental problem which is the increased formation of microplastics and nanoplastics from

Firstly, the concern over mining of lithium and other rare elements is bad

for the environment is correct. However, after making the battery, it is used and charged often without emitting any CO2 or greenhouse gases when driving and that battery lasts for more than ten years in our experience. Our 2013 Tesla still runs off of the original battery needing no repairs, so far. In contrast, I see more harm to the environment from the continuous removal of crude oil from the earth to make gasoline. One realizes that there is a carbon footprint with oil extraction and the common oil spills, the refining of crude oil to gasoline, the transportation of refined gas by tanker trucks to stations, and the burning of gasoline. All of these environmentally unfriendly steps are needed for everyday use of a gaspowered vehicle and occur for the life of the vehicle. (For a somewhat technical review on EVs and gas-powered cars, I refer you to the article by Massachusetts Institute of Technology/MIT Climate scientist. Ref 7.)

Secondly, I considered buying a Tesla Model Y SUV that has a 75 kilowatt hour battery but NO gas powered engine, transmission, exhaust system, etc. that would add to the overall curb weight. My new EV weighs 4,400 pounds, while other SUVs with gas engines have similar weights (for example, the Jeep Grand Cherokee, Ford Explorer, and Toyota RAV4 - data obtained from manufacturers website). In addition, all drivers are aware that tire wear also depends on how one drives.

Hard stops and fast starts will wear the tire tread rapidly too.

Another advantage of an EV vs a gasoline powered car is that the EV has less parts to break. The EV has mainly a large battery and an electric motor. Of course, both cars have a chassis, brakes, windows, etc. The EV has no spark plugs, wiring to the plugs, fuel injectors that can foul, heater hoses that can leak, engine belts that wear and slip, starting motors, mufflers, catalytic converters that some like to steal, gas tanks and fuel lines that can leak, and more. In a recent Consumer Reports article by Jeff Bartlett, Teslas were found to have the lowest maintenance costs over a ten year evaluation (Ref 8).

It is important to be aware that in cold weather, the driving range of an EV's battery is LESS. This was true for the Volt and the Tesla. You may expect a 30 to 40% drop in the battery's driving range

on days when the temperature drops below 30-20 degree Fahrenheit. A lot of the decreased range is due to the battery's charge being used to warm the cabin and the battery itself. The battery will charge slower because ions (electricity) move slower in the cold. I have never had any difficulty starting our cars in the winter.

Thus, when weighing the pros and cons of buying an EV, my decision is that driving an EV is a good choice to help fight climate change. We were the first to buy a Hybrid Plug-in EV and later a full EV on our block, but now we have five neighbors driving EVs and many others have hybrid cars. Even to this day, my wife and I love the quiet in the car's cabin, especially when the road has been recently paved. Then there is only the road noise. I ask you to consider buying an EV or start with a Hybrid plug-in EV as I did. Also, consider changing your electricity over from coal burning to

renewable energy coming from wind or solar sources.

In the next few months, GROW and I will be notifying you of free EV showings so you can stop and talk with various owners about their experiences driving an EV.







A Letter from the Superintendent

Dear Parents and Guardians,

We will start Student Registration for the 2024-2025 school year on July 1st. All returning families must register online through your PowerSchool Parent Portal Account.

- 1. Please ensure all unpaid fees from previous years are paid in full before registration so you can take advantage of the Early Bird Registration Rate (July 16th at 4:00 pm).
- All IDs and vehicle registrations must have current Westchester addresses. Area DMVs require appointments, so please allow yourself enough time to make the necessary changes to avoid any registration delays. Click here to schedule an appointment with the DMV.
- 3. All students needing bus transportation must complete a Request for Transportation Form, which will be available on the district website. Students will only receive transportation services after completing registration, including payment, and submitting the transportation form by July 31, 2024.
- 4. Please make arrangements for your child to receive any necessary physicals or immunizations as soon as possible. Students enrolling in school for the first time, Kindergarten, and 6th grade students must present proof of a health examination and required immunizations before the start of school. Per Board policy 7-100, students who do not comply with these requirements prior to the first day of school will be excluded until the required forms are provided. - July 16 Early Bird Deadline 4:00 p.m.
- July 31 Registration Deadline

As in the past, you will be required to upload documents online that prove your residency; no in-person or document drop-off will be available. Tutorials to help guide you through the process are posted online. Timely registration will allow principals to staff their buildings adequately, so we ask that you start registering your children early. Teacher assignments and student schedules will be shared beginning the week of August 12th. Registration for new students will also start on July 1st. As this school year has come to a close, the WPS Staff would like to thank all of our families for their partnerships this year. From our first day of school in August, our children have been resilient. Our May assessments of learning measure student growth and provide information to identify our student strengths and areas for improvement. Our staff will have a busy summer planning for learning, and we encourage all families to take advantage of SUMMER LEARNING located on our sd925.org website because it is very important to learn all year long! During the summer, students' skills and knowledge can SLIDE back 2-3 months. Illinois State Learning standards are very rigorous, and students jump right into learning on the first day of school. Moreover, as we look ahead to the first weeks of the 24-25 school year, our children will be assessed in reading and math. They will take the standardized MAP test, as well as other assessments. Based on those assessments, academic decisions will be made to place the children in the correct reading and math differentiated groups within their classroom. Students who need more support may be meeting with our support staff for additional learning time. Home partnership and support will help children make a SPLASH next year! Please help your child be prepared for the first day of school by spending some academic time during the summer. Also, as part of planning for the next school year, parents are urged to register their children and return completed paperwork as soon as possible when registration opens in July. We are closely monitoring class sizes. So, if you have a child that will be five years old on or before September 1, 2021, please be sure to complete Kindergarten Pre-Registration online for the 2024-2025 school year on our school district website at https://www.sd925.org/ and use the following menu path:

- 1. Click on the "Registration" tab
- 2. Click on the "Kindergarten" tab

This is the first step in enrolling your child for kindergarten starting this fall. You will receive a notice after the review of your materials confirming the pre-registration process is complete. By early July you will receive information in the mail to complete the online registration/residency verification process and pay fees. Here is the Checklist for Pre-Registration:

- 1. Complete the Kindergarten Enrollment Form.
- 2. Email a copy of your child's official birth certificate. A child must be five (5) years old on or before September 1, 2024.
- 3. Email a state or government-issued photo ID with your name and current address.
- 4. Email birth certificate and ID to gchayka@sd925.org.
- 5. Email your child's kindergarten physical exam to jsardinas@sd925.org.

Please note that all items (completed enrollment form, ID, and birth certificate) must be received to process pre-registration.
