Happy New Year Westchester!!! 2024 is Here!!

The Village was recently contacted by Secretary of State, Alexi Giannoulias about opening a senior citizen only driver's license and service facility within the Village Hall. Their timeline was short, however due to the hard work of Village staff the facilities were formally opened on November 27th. Seniors over the age of 65 of age can visit, without an appointment, to renew their license and renew license plates stickers. The written test as well as the drivers test can be done at this facility.

There will be some transition around the village hall and the post office as we work on parking availability as the board approved modifications to increase the amount of parking available. The overall project will add approximately 40 parking spaces, with 30 of those for village and Secretary of State staff, along with added parking along Municipal Drive to assist visitors to the driver's facility.

On November 28th the village welcomed Speaker of the House Emanuel "Chris" Welch, Senate Majority Leader Kimberly Lightford, Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias along with 21st District State Representative Abdelnasser Rashid and 8th District Representative La Shawn Ford to announce the opening.

Thank you Speaker Welch, Leader Lightford and Secretary of State Giannoulias for considering Westchester when seeking the next location for a senior services driver's facility. I would also like to thank Trustee Nick Steker who was instrumental in bringing Westchester forward as an option in the location selection process.

The Village Board is continuing to review information related to the redevelopment and potential move from our Roosevelt Road campus but there have been no firm decisions made. Our first step in this process involved determining our space needs and a deeper review of the property previously purchased on Enterprise Drive. Each of these steps in reaching a conclusion requires time to have professionals review and inform the board of their findings. The annual Shop with a Cop event allows Westchester children an opportunity to experience a happy holiday that they would not otherwise have been able to, was a great success this year. This year's sponsorship provided presents and a shopping experience for 10 Westchester children to share with Westchester and neighboring police officers. Thank you to School Resource Officer Cristian Aguirre for reaching out to the business community and for those businesses who provided a monetary donation to support the event.

The recent two-day Winter Wonderland hosted by the Westchester Park District in cooperation with the Village was incredible this past December. The weather was above average this year and I was extremely pleased with the turnout for this event. The Village has discussed an increased partnership and collaboration with our taxing bodies and Chamber of Commerce to share in the costs and staff work of hosting events throughout the year. Our special events committee is working at outlining a summer event schedule for 2024 and look forward to cohosting several events throughout the year.

The Village has made many attempts to determine the best methods of providing information to the public. There is currently the newsletter delivered to residents monthly. There is the text and email alerting system, Code Red, that provides real-time information-based alerts regarding emergency water shut offs, construction updates and other alerts that are provided via phone call, text messages or emails and recently the Village began a weekly digital newsletter. Lastly, I would encourage everyone to welcome the recently opened Jungle Plate restaurant located at 9916 Roosevelt Road. The owners, husband, and wife Westchester residents, have crafted a Caribbean and African cuisine serving food made from scratch.

# **Prevention of Winter Fires: Home Heating Safety**

Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. Sources of carbon monoxide in the home include heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel, like a gas stove or fireplace. Each year, thousands of people are treated at hospital emergency rooms for CO poisoning; unfortunately hundreds of people die (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention/Consumer Product Safety Commission).

Prevent Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

• Make sure appliances are installed and operated according to the manufacturer's instructions and local building codes. Most appliances should be installed by qualified professionals. Have the heating system professionally inspected and serviced annually to ensure proper operation. The inspector should also check chimneys and flues for blockages, corrosion, partial and complete disconnections, and loose connections.

• Avoid using a portable generator or any other gasoline engine-powered tool in or near an enclosed space such as a garage, house, or other building. Even with open doors and windows, these spaces can trap CO and allow it to quickly build to lethal levels.

• Install CO alarms on every level of the home.

• Make sure the alarm cannot be covered up by furniture or draperies.

• Avoid using portable fuel-burning equipment inside a home or garage, unless it is specifically designed for use in an enclosed space and provides instructions for safe use in an enclosed area.

• Avoid burning charcoal inside your home or garage.

•Avoid running your car in an attached garage, even with the garage door open.

• Avoid using gas appliances such as ranges, ovens, or clothes dryers to heat your home.

• Do not cover the bottom of natural gas or propane ovens with aluminum foil. Doing so blocks the combustion air flow through the appliance and can produce CO.

• During home renovations, make sure appliance vents and chimneys are not





## Did you know?

## More than 150 people in the U.S. die every year from accidental nonfire-related carbon monoxide poisoning.

Carbon monoxide or CO is a colorless and odorless gas. CO poisoning can occur when a fuel-burning appliance or machine, such as a furnace, heater or generator, is not working or vented properly. Breathing in CO at high levels can be fatal.

#### Learn what you can do to protect your family from the dangers of CO.

- Install and maintain CO alarms inside your home to provide early warning of CO.
- Install CO alarms in a central location outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of your home.
- Use portable generators outdoors in well-ventilated areas away from all doors, windows and vents.
- Make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove and fireplace are clear of snow and other debris.

blocked by tarps or debris. Make sure appliances are in proper working order when renovations are complete.

• During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.

• Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO – only use outside.

Maintain Your CO Alarms

CO alarms always have been and still are designed to alarm before potentially life-threatening levels of CO are reached.

• Follow the manufacturer's instructions.

• Test your alarm monthly by using the test button.

• Look for your alarms expiration date and replace as needed.

• CO alarms may be installed into a plugin receptacle or high on the wall. Hard wired or plug-in CO alarms should have battery backup. Never Ignore an Alarming CO Alarm

It is warning you of a potentially deadly hazard. If your alarm is going off, do not try to find the source of the CO. Prompt medical attention is important if you are experiencing any symptoms of CO poisoning, take the following action:

• Call 911 if think you are experiencing any of the symptoms of CO poisoning.

• Immediately get outside to fresh air.

• Leave the home and call your fire department to report your symptoms from a neighbor's home.

• Avoid re-entering your home; you could lose consciousness and die.

• Tell the paramedics/doctors that you suspect CO poisoning.

• If the source of the CO is determined to be a malfunctioning appliance, DO NOT operate that appliance until it has been properly serviced by trained personnel.

#### Symptoms of CO Poisoning

KY Batters

A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time. Because CO is odorless, colorless, and otherwise undetectable to the human senses, people often don't realize they are being exposed to this harmful poison. Initial symptoms of low to moderate CO poisoning are similar to the flu (but without the fever). Symptoms include:

- HeadacheFatigue
- Shortness of breath
- Nausea
- Dizziness

High level CO poisoning results in progressively more severe symptoms, including:

- Mental confusion
- Vomiting
- Loss of muscular coordinationLoss of consciousness
- Ultimately death

## 2023-2024 Snow Removal Rebate Program for Low-Income Seniors

The Village of Westchester is pleased to announce a rebate program to assist up to 100 lowincome senior residents, aged 65 or older, with snow removal on their private property.

Interested participants must apply annually and meet eligibility requirements. Applications for the 2023-2024 season are currently open and will be accepted until February 1, 2024, or until the program reaches capacity, whichever comes first. Applications will be processed in the order they are received. **Eligible residents can submit a completed application in person or by mail to the attention of Annie Canavan at the Village of Westchester, 10300 W Roosevelt Rd, Westchester, IL 60154.** 

### **Program Information:**

- Participants are solely responsible for service coordination and payment to contractor. Contractor must be registered with the Village of Westchester. Check the Village website for a current list of registered contractors (snow removal contractors are typically in the "landscape" category).
- The Village of Westchester will reimburse each participant \$25 per snowfall event, up to \$250 total per residence for the season, pending receipt of proof of service.
- Participants are able to submit receipts to the Village of Westchester in person at Village Hall once a month, by the last Wednesday of the month. Reimbursement payments will be remitted via check and mailed to participants on or around the 15<sup>th</sup> of the subsequent month. All receipts for the 2023-2024 season must be submitted within 30 days of the final snowfall event of the season.

## **Eligibility Requirements:**

- Participants must reside in the Village of Westchester. Accepted items for proof of residency include a copy of your driver's license or state ID.
- Participants must be 65 years of age or older. Accepted items for proof of age include a copy of your driver's license, state ID, or birth certificate.
- Participants must prove low-income status by providing a copy of **one** of the following: Medicaid card; Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) card; or proof of Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) enrollment.
- No persons capable of removing snow can reside in the household.





## GROW Ecological Commission: Two Years of Environmental Action

The Green Residents of Westchester (GROW) Ecological Commission is a volunteer group that advises the village and educates the community on environmental issues. We are critical partners in beautification and ecological decisions. The commission is responsible for preparing, achieving objectives of, and sustaining Westchester's Climate Action Plan.

#### Highlights of our recent work:

Native plants and landscaping: Restoring native plant habitat is vital to preserving biodiversity and can help reduce flooding.

Organized a native plant educational event and a plant sale with I Love Native Plants and Westchester Community Church.

Held a sustainable landscaping education event with Midwest Grows Green/IPM Institute.

Encouraged residents and children to appreciate nature by promoting events like the City Nature Challenge and the Villages' Arbor Day tree planting events at Westchester schools.

Tree Care and Canopy Restoration: Each year, Westchester's tree canopy provides \$1.8 million in ecosystem services that include carbon storage and sequestration, air pollution removal, and storm water interception (according to the Morton Arboretum 2020 Chicago Region Tree Census). They also can improve quality of life, increase property values, help foster good mental and physical health, and reduce surface temperatures.

Assisted the Village with writing two grants. A grant of \$25,000 was awarded for a comprehensive tree inventory and management plan for Village-owned trees. This will enable the Village to more efficiently build and maintain the canopy with an eye to age and species diversity.

Distributed native tree saplings provided by the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District to residents during the Village's shredding events.

Distributed bookmarks highlighting the trees most commonly found within Westchester, as well as instruction tags for Public Works to provide residents with newly planted trees.

Advocated for the Cook County Forest Preserve Referendum and for the Village to update its Noxious Weeds Ordinance.

Alternative Transportation: One of the

most effective ways to reduce acute and chronic respiratory ailments related to air pollution is to decrease the number of combustion vehicles on the road. This can be accomplished in many ways: carpooling, using public transportation, buying an electric or hybrid vehicle, walking or cycling. Walking and cycling are particularly impactful because they improve health.

Between, Nov'17 and Nov'23 the number of EVs in our village increased from 6 to 76, with the greatest increase occurring in 2023.

Collaborated with the Police Department to host two bike safety events (for adults and children).

Featured alternative forms of transportation at the 4th of July parade: Mustang Mach-E, Tesla Y, and Volkswagen e-Golf and the Westchester Cycling Group

Endorsed Westchester's participation in Tour de Proviso, township-wide bike event. Recommended that the Village mitigate the impact on the environment without sacrificing needed functionality as Fleet Vehicles are due for replacement by: 1) considering total cost of ownership instead of capital and operating expenses separately (reference: Argonne National Laboratory), 2) planning for adequate EV charging functionality, and eventual reevaluation of the need for underground fuel, and 3) considering staff input into new vehicle assessments while prioritizing EVs and hybrids.

Solar Power: Adding clean, renewable solar energy to the electrical grid will have the greatest impact on reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions.

Hosted five solar events with Citizens Utility Board. The sessions covered rooftop solar, community solar, the Illinois Solar for All Program, and the opportunity to participate in the GROW Solar Chicagoland and Solar Switch Chicagoland group purchasing discounts.

Recommended that the Village participate in the Chicago Metropolitan Mayors Caucus' Community Solar Clearinghouse Solution, which will allow residents the opportunity to opt-in to this program.

Reduce Green House Gas (GHG) Emissions: Residential natural gas consumption is the greatest source of greenhouse gas equivalents in our community, and our community's utilization of natural gas and electricity are significantly higher than the average for the metropolitan region, Cook County and our surrounding communities.

Hosted two energy efficiency events with Nicor to inform our community about free in-home energy assessments, free and discounted energy savings devices, and incentives/rebates that may be available.

Increased resident requests for Water Savings Kits (74 more kits) and Weatherization Kits (60 more kits) from the previous year.

Minimize waste: Globally, landfills are the 3rd largest producers of methane gas, which traps 80 times more heat than carbon dioxide during its first 20 years in the atmosphere.

Hosted a composting educational event and met residents to highlight the benefits of composting at Tour de Proviso.

Held two annual Reuse-a-palooza events yard sale and reuse festival weekends. Over 170 houses participated in Reuse-apalooza each year.

Provided opportunities for residents to have their holiday pumpkins and gourds composted by providing "Pumpkin Smash" collection bins.

Gave feedback on the waste/recycling contract scope of services and ideas to help the Village reduce its landfilled waste. The suggestions included educational events/materials on acceptable materials in curbside recycling, right-sized services to incentivize residents to reduce solid waste, and options to compost organic waste, among others.

Prepare for climate change: Scientists are clear about the reality of climate change and with devastating storms, dangerous floods, melting glaciers, and rising seas becoming an increasingly regular part of life. We need to start working on ways to reduce the impact of climate change.

• Reviewed various climate mitigation strategies, their costs, and benefits, and drafted a Climate Action Plan, which was unanimously supported by the Commission.

Encouraged the Village President to join other local mayors in signing a Memorandum of Understanding to work collaboratively to reduce GHG emissions and other air pollutants in our area by joining the C4 - Cross Community Climate Collaborative. The Memorandum of Understanding has been adopted by the full Village board, and was presented at the Nov. 28th board meeting, and will be voted on — presumably favorably — by the time of publication.

#### Our 2024 goals:

GROW is committed to continuing to work with the community to make Westchester a more sustainable and environmentally friendly place to live. In the coming year, GROW plans to focus on the following: Take action:

Continue to develop Westchester's Climate Action Plan in collaboration with the Village.

Increase resident engagement in sustainable landscaping, composting, and other ecological initiatives that benefit residents.

#### Educate:

Inform the community about water quality and sustainability.

Increase awareness about air pollution, how it impacts health, and actions that can be taken.

Identify rebates and tax incentives for residents interested in considering electric vehicles and electric appliances.

Continue to provide information on solar technology and financial incentives for homeowners and renters, regardless of income.

Increase funding & partnerships:

Identify opportunities to secure funding for additional environmental projects.

Strengthen connections within our community and with our partners: Cook County Forest Preserve, Wolf Road Prairie, the Grassroots Garden Group, Park District, Westchester Public Library, the schools, the Illinois Extension Service, and within Proviso Township.





2024 Martin Luther King Jr. Day Holiday Garbage Schedule

There will be no change to the garbage collection schedule.

Live Christmas trees up to 5 feet long will be collected on your regular garbage day the first two weeks of January. Trees over 5 feet in length must be cut down for collection.

Yard waste collection will resume your first collection day of April, 2024.

Village branch collection will resume the week of April 1st - 5th 2024.

• If your garbage or recycling was not picked up on your regular day, please call Waste Management directly.

• If you would like to request a new garbage or recycling receptacle, please call Waste Management directly.

• If you have large items that will not fit in your receptacle (i.e. couch, chairs, tables, etc.,) please call Waste Management directly to schedule a large item collection.

The Waste Management's "At Your Door Special Collection" service will pick up unwanted-potentially hazardous and hard-to-recycle items from your home.

The Village Hall will be collecting non-working holiday lights for recycling until February 1st.

VILLAGE SNOW RESTRICTIONS

Public Works crews keep our streets free of snow and ice during the winter months.

Please assist us by observing the following:

• Place garbage cans 3 feet behind the curb line- do not place them in the street.

• Do not shovel or blow snow back into the cleared streets.

• Please observe the "NO PARKING SNOW ROUTE" signs.

-The snow portion of the signs will be enforced after 2 inches of snowfall between December 1st and March 31st.

If you reside on a Primary designated SNOW ROUTE, after 2 inches of snowfall you must remove all vehicles from the snow route. Vehicles must stay off the street until the streets are cleared thoroughly by the plows by Public Works. If the snowfall is continuing, the restriction is in place until Public Works completes the plowing for the day. Please check the signs at the corners of your block.

If you reside on a Secondary route, there is no parking Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday on the even numbered house side and no parking Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday on the odd numbered house side after 2 inches of snowfall. Please check the signs at the corners and center of your block for guidance. (This includes ALL side streets not designated a Primary snow route.)

If you have a Fire Hydrant on your parkway, please help keep the hydrant clear of snow so that the Fire Department may easily access the hydrant in case of an emergency, and so that the snow plows may quickly identify the hydrants while plowing.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence.

If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident can choose the tree from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree and planting with the Village. To request a 50/50 tree, please call the Public Works Department at 708.345.0041.

As always, residents are asked to call Public Works at 708.345.0041 if an unusual amount of water is visible in the street or parkway. This could be a main break or water leak that requires our immediate attention. If after 3:30pm M-F & on weekends and holidays, please call 708.345.0060.

When our students return to school in January, Westchester Primary School assesses first and second-grade students using the MAP (Measures of Academic Progress). This is a state-aligned computerized adaptive assessment program that provides educators with the information they need to improve teaching and learning and make student-focused and data-driven decisions. Students in grades one and two are tested three times each year (fall, winter, and spring) in the areas of reading and math. All kindergarten, first, and second graders are also assessed using Fastbridge and other grade-level assessments to determine their growth from fall to winter. The teachers use this growth and achievement data to develop targeted instructional strategies and to plan school-wide curricular improvements.

Additionally, at the end of each January, students identified as English Language Learners, will participate in ACCESS, the state assessment designed to measure students' proficiency and growth in English in all four domains of language- reading, writing, listening, and speaking. This test is also designed to measure student performance with both social languages used every day and more complex academic language. Students will participate in whole group reading, writing, and listening tests and individual speaking assessments. Information gathered from this assessment assists teachers with designing effective instruction.


