From the desk of Village President Greg Hribal

Welcome to winter, although it might not yet feel like it. We once again anticipate a mild weather pattern in December and instead of working on snow removal, public works will be focused on keeping the streets clear of leaves and other debris which will help prevent flooding in addition to reducing hazardous conditions for drivers.

SBC will continue to collect yard waste through the end of December on normal pick-up days, and we remind residents not to rake or blow leaves into the street.

On December 9th, the Village Board will discuss options of an offer for the property located at Mannheim and Roosevelt. Xceed Commercial Real Estate and a Culver's franchisee have partnered to redevelop the three-acre parcel that previously housed several three-story office buildings.

This is not the sale of the property; rather, it is the first step toward negotiating a redevelopment agreement that would ultimately lead to a sale. While selling the property is important, ensuring that its future use positively impacts the community has been a top priority.

The Village is currently reviewing the format and delivery method of this newsletter. We've received concerns about the timeliness of the information it contains, as well as delays and occasional lapses in delivery with the current system.

Because the newsletter must be prepared up to 20 days before it is printed and hand-delivered, some residents have reported not receiving their copy at all.

To address these issues, we are exploring several options, including mailing the newsletter directly and using a new printer that can produce and distribute content within just a few days. Discussions are still ongoing, but our priority remains the same: ensuring that every resident receives timely, reliable information each month

Celebrating 75 Years of the Westchester Community Church

While not a traditional business, the Westchester Community Church has long served as an important pillar in our community.

For 75 years, the church has played a meaningful role in Westchester's development, civic life, and sense of togetherness. In recognition of its lasting impact and continued service to our residents, we are proud to feature the Westchester Community Church in this month's Community Spotlight.

The Westchester Community Church (WCC) was formed in October/November of 1949. The church was founded by residents of Westchester from a wide range of Protestant backgrounds. Josephine and Chuck Field are credited as the originators and played a significant role in canvassing the community and inviting others to help establish WCC.

Unlike many Protestant churches of the time—which were placed in communities through denominational or ecumenical assignments—WCC's early members met together to determine their own theology and governance.

The church was originally Congregational and later joined the United Church of Christ. Today, the Westchester Community Church remains a truly community-minded church, grounded in the belief that "Whoever you are, and wherever you are on life's journey of faith, you are welcome at the Westchester Community Church."

In 2025, the church celebrates 75 years of worship, service, and dedication to the Village of Westchester. The church has long been committed to caring for all people—Christian and non-Christian alike—and strongly believes in the unity of Christ's church, working together for peace, justice, and healing.

From its earliest days, members of WCC were instrumental in helping establish the Westchester Public Library, LaGrange Hospital, and the Westchester Chamber of Commerce. Their hallmark has always been caring for the entire community and finding ways to bring people together. Over the years, WCC has

hosted public forums on local schools, community issues, and prospective elected officials. The church proudly supports

groups and organizations such as the Westchester Food Pantry, scouting programs, Brownies, two A.A. groups, multiple theatre groups, and numerous community meetings, senior events, and youth sports activities.

They also help host multiple blood drives and are known for their annual Craft Fair, Bible studies, weddings, and funerals. Weekly activities are posted on the church's website.

WCC is also home to a vibrant preschool called Sticks and Stones. Additionally, the church quietly supports the community by allowing parking for Park District events and offering facility rentals to non-members for important family gatherings.

The church is active seven days a week, frequently hosting forums and discussions that address community issues, encourage dialogue, and foster collaboration. Since 1997, WCC has helped create and sustain the Chicago Tamil United Church of Christ, a Tamil-speaking Indian congregation.

WCC also serves as the host site for the Illinois Conference of the United Church of Christ, which oversees UCC churches in northern and central Illinois. The church additionally houses a counseling center for clergy of various denominations known as Midwest Careers.

Pastor Joe Mills has served as Senior Pastor since 1994. He is active in the area's United Church of Christ cluster and supports many regional mission efforts.

He is married to Barb, who recently retired after serving as a kindergarten teacher at Lindop School in Broadview. They have two adult children—one a physical therapist for children with multiple special needs, and the other a First Lieutenant in the U.S. Army. Pastor Joe is also deeply involved in the local community as Police and Fire Chaplain, Chair of the Economic Development Committee, and a board member of the Westches-


ter Chamber of Commerce.



<u>Live Christmas trees</u> up to 5 feet long will be collected on your regular rubbish day December 26, 2025 through January 16, 2026.

Yard waste collection ends December 30th and will resume April 2nd, 2026. Village branch collection will resume the week of April 6th – 10th 2026.

The Village Hall will be collecting non-working holiday lights for recycling until February 2nd

- If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.
- You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.,) at the curb every week for collection.

Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.

• S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), <u>at no additional charge</u>, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, universal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Leaf Reminders As leaves fall, please remember **DO NOT** pile, blow, or rake your leaves into the street. This causes storm sewer problems which leads to flooding, and it is against Village Code. Yard waste is collected by S.B.C. through the end of December.

Village Snow Restrictions

Public Works crews keep our streets free of snow and ice during the winter months.

Please assist us by observing the following:

- Place garbage cans 3 feet behind the curb line- **do not place them in the street.**
- Do not shovel or blow snow back into the cleared streets.
- Please observe the "NO PARKING SNOW ROUTE" signs.
- -The snow portion of the signs will be enforced after 2 inches of snowfall between December 1st and March 31st. If you reside on a Primary designated SNOW

ROUTE, after 2 inches of snowfall you must remove all vehicles from the snow route. Vehicles must stay off the street until the streets are cleared thoroughly by the plows by Public Works

If the snowfall is continuing, the restriction is in place until Public Works completes the plowing for the day. Please check the signs at the corners of your block.

If you reside on a Secondary route, there is no parking Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday on the even numbered house side and no parking Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday on the odd numbered house side after 2 inches of snowfall. Please check the signs at the corners and center of your block for guidance. (This includes ALL side streets not designated a Primary snow route.)

If you have a Fire Hydrant on your parkway, please help keep the hydrant clear of snow so that the Fire Department may easily access the hydrant in case of an emergency, and so that the snow plows may quickly identify the hydrants while plowing.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree

be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.

2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program.

The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees, please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

As always, residents are asked to call Public Works at 708-345-0041 if an unusual amount of water is visible in the street or parkway. This could be a main break or water leak that requires our immediate attention.

Come learn about the origin and practices of decorating trees for the holidays



Walter S. Baltus: Westchester Developer

If one drives down many of the Westchester streets, one will invariably encounter Baltis Built Homes. Driving down Westchester Blvd., Manchester, Hawthorne, Kensington or Balmoral, even Mannheim Road, one will find homes built by Walter S. Baltus.

He built Georgians, colonials, spit-levels, two-flats, and larger apartment units, but he is probably best known for the mid-century Baltis Built ranches strewn throughout the village.

Walter S. Baltis began his life in Poland on September19, 1904 with the last name Baltruszajtis. He emigrated to the U.S. when he was ten years old and grew up in Chicago. He became a naturalized U.S. citizen at the age of 32. He was married to Marie R. Nejdlik and had four daughters: Joan, Rita, Bonnie and Phyllis. They were residents of Riverside.

He started building homes in Westchester in 1941 and was a driving force behind the Westchester housing boom after World War II. The Williamsburginspired colonials he had been building did not really take off in Westchester, as new residents wanted modern, efficient housing with ample space.

His ranch-style homes included multiple entrances, large living room and dining room areas, two to four bedrooms, ceramic-tiled bathrooms, hardwood birch trim throughout, large windows for brighter interiors, ample storage, basements, and attached garages, which were not common with standard colonials.

By 1959, added family and utility rooms provided more square footage in his bi-level homes.

He constructed model homes that prospective buyers could visit on Westchester Boulevard and on Dorchester Avenue.

One lucky prospective buyer won a 1965 Mustang car as a Moen Fawcett sweep-stakes prize for visiting a model home in Westchester as part of the Chicago Tribune's Spring Festival of Homes. Baltis Built Homes developed the area around Mayfair with custom-designed houses.

Their aim was to build homes solidly, with good quality serving as a source of pride.

Walter Baltis had an amazing and lucrative career.

He started in the 1920s as sales manager at Cicero Motor Sales. He became the owner of Arrow Motor Sales from 1930 to 1935. He was a member of the Cermak Road Business Men's Association in the early 1930s. Then he became the manager of Stastny Builders in Berwyn. In Westchester, he became president of Baltis Built Homes in 1941.

He had a sales office in Berwyn before moving his main office to 1905 Mannheim Road in Westchester. Besides building over 2000 homes in Westchester by 1956, he developed suburbs in North Riverside, Stickney, and Forest View.

He also built houses and apartments in Berwyn. Thus, his company became a major developing firm of the western suburbs.


In 1956 he made an unsuccessful bid to become the state senator from the second Senatorial District on the Democratic ticket.

From 1953 into the 1960s he was president of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association in Westchester.

He was also president of the Globe Savings and Loan Association and was head of the Baltis Plaza Shopping Center. From the late fifties until 1964, Baltis served as a trustee for Metropolitan Sanitary District of Geater Chicago.

In the 1960s he became president of a credit union. One other noteworthy service to Westchester was donating 7.75 acres to the Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago, which deeded that land to the Divine Providence Parish to build the Catholic church and school on Mayfair

At the age of 86, Walter Stanley Baltis passed away in Florida. He lies buried at the Queen of Heaven Cemetery along with his wife, who outlived him for several years.

Perhaps most representative of his legacy are the many houses that shape the mid-century vibe that the Village of Westchester boasts, enabling many young families to rediscover and appreciate well-built homes to bring up to date for lasting value today.

New Water & Sewer Rates

These changes took effect July 1, 2025, following a professional rate study, and represent the next phase of the Village's multi-year plan to address aging infrastructure, comply with the State's Lead Service Line Replacement Mandate, and maintain long-term financial sustainability of our water and sewer systems.

New Rates Effective July 1, 2025:

- Water usage: \$19.21 per 1,000 gallons
- Sewer usage: \$4.03 per 1,000 gallons
- Water infrastructure fee: \$22 per month (\$44 per bill)
- Sewer infrastructure fee: \$15 per month (\$30 per bill)

The approved ordinance also includes a 10% increase in July 2026, a 5% increase in July 2027, and then annual increases of 3–5% to keep pace with infrastructure maintenance and water delivery costs.

Water Fixture Efficiency **Reimbursement Grant Program**

The Village of Westchester is offering a Water Fixture Efficiency Reimbursement Grant to assist low-income residents in reducing water usage and offsetting the cost of high-efficiency fixtures. Eligible residents can receive up to 90% reimbursement on the purchase and installation of lead-free toilets, faucets, and showerheads—with a lifetime household maximum of \$500.





• Gift Memories, Not Things: Go gift free and focus on creating memories. If you are gifting, choose experiences (like event tickets, classes, services), shop second hand, or give something homemade.



• Conscious Wrapping: Wrap gifts using reusable fabric bags, scarves, dishcloths, or newspaper instead of conventional, non-recyclable wrapping paper or plastic ribbon.

Say No to Disposables

- Use Reusables: Choose real plates, glasses, and silverware. If you don't own enough, borrow from neighbors, friends, or rent them. Thrift shops can make for great finds. And mismatched tableware can add a charming, eclectic flair!
- Cloth Napkins: Swap paper napkins for washable

cloth napkins and tablecloths.

• Bulk Beverages: Buy drinks in large containers instead of individual bottles or cans. Set up a water station with tap water infused with fruit or herbs, and encourage guests to bring their own reusable water bottles or use your glassware.

Simple & Natural Decor

- Natural Elements: Decorate with natural greenery like pinecones, branches, or dried citrus garlands. These items are beautiful and compostable.
- DIY & Secondhand: Use existing ornaments or

make new ones from natural materials. **Thrift stores** are also excellent sources for unique, pre-loved holiday decorations.

• Reusable Lights: Choose LED lights for maximum energy efficiency, check light strands for dead bulbs before disposing of the set, and recycle old light strands at collection sites throughout the area.

Choose the changes that work for you and remember small changes add up for big impact. With a few mindful choices, events and gatherings are a great time for making memorable and beautiful moments that are a gift to your guests and the planet.

Recipe of the Month

This month's recipe makes for an easy onthe-go lunch during the holiday season or a veggie-packed snack to fuel your day. Try sprinkling everything bagel seasoning or other herbs/spices on the sweet potato for an added burst of flavor.

Collard Green Wraps

makes 2 servings

Ingredient

- 2 collard green leaves
- 1 small or medium sweet potato
- 2 teaspoons sesame oil
- 1 teaspoon pink sea salt
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- ¼ cup sprouts or shredded cabbage
- ¼ cup bell pepper, diced
- ¼ cups shredded (or diced) carrots

• ¼ cup cucumber, chopped or cut in thin, length-

• 1/2 an avocado, cubed (optional)

<u>Instructions</u>

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. $\,$
- 2. Wash and peel the sweet potato, then slice it into rounds about ¼-inch thick. Place the rounds in a single layer on a baking sheet and lightly coat them with sesame oil, salt and pepper. Bake for 25–30 minutes, turning over halfway through the cook time
- 3. Place collard greens in a large pan with an inch of water. Cover and steam the greens over medium heat until wilted, about 2 minutes. Remove the greens from heat, drain the water and set the softened leaves aside.
- 4. Divide all prepped ingredients into two portions before beginning to assemble the wraps.
- 5. To assemble a wrap, fill a collard green leaf

starting with the roasted sweet potato, followed by carrots, bell pepper, cucumber, sprouts (or cabbage) and avocado (if using). Be careful not to overfill. This will help to prevent tearing the leaf.

- 6. If desired, add 1–2 tablespoons of sriracha, chutney, peanut sauce, tahini or another condiment of your choosing.
- 7. Fold in the long sides of the leaf first. Then fold over the edge of the leaf closest to you. Keep rolling to fully seal the wrap. Repeat with the second leaf.
