From the desk of Village President Greg Hribal

Being the centennial anniversary of the Village of Westchester, we have presented those residing in the community for over 50 years with a certificate of acknowledgement. Recently, a certificate was presented to Mrs. Irene Jedd, a 70-year resident who made Westchester her home in her late 20s and has been the only owner of her home since it was built in the mid-1950s. Coincidentally, she will be celebrating her 100th birthday next March, and we wish to extend early birthday wishes to her and her family! Thank you, Irene, for making Westchester home for 70 years and helping us celebrate our 100th anniversary.

In addition to this being a centennial year, I'm extremely proud to be honoring the Westchester Lions Club on their 60th anniversary and the Westchester Food Pantry for their dedication to serving those in need on their 30th anniversary.

The Westchester Lions Club has been a wonderful sponsor of various local groups and events, such as Shop With A Cop, the Veterans Memorial at Mayfair, boys' baseball and girls' softball, to name a few. The Westchester Food Pantry, currently led by Amanda Grant, has increased the pantry's size and scope to provide over \$2,000,000 in food—but more importantly, over 500,000 meals annually—to local families. Thank you, Westchester Lions Club and Food Pantry, for all that you do in our community! Both organizations have been recognized with a proclamation honoring their public service to Westchester.

The Village of Westchester recently approved the painting and, in some cases, repainting of all fire hydrants. The last painting project of our hydrants happened approximately 10 years ago, and during that process all the remaining lead paint was removed by sandblasting.

This year's painting required that the hydrants be primed with gray paint before being painted red shortly thereafter. Some have asked about the blue-painted hydrants observed. Although uncommon, blue-painted fire hydrants are part of the incoming water lines to our water system and do not have the same pressure in the line,

which limits their use during fires.

They are currently preparing their renovations and expect to open in late fall this year.

Happy Halloween from the Chief

Well, it's that time of year again—the nights are getting cooler, the leaves are falling, and the north winds remind us that old man winter is on his way. For the kids, Halloween is the warm-up holiday before Christmas.

Even though candy prices are at an alltime high (and I had to give up chocolate myself), kids will be out looking for the best giveaways of the night. Some will bring pillowcases to build up a sixmonth stash.

I still remember running house to house with my friends, racing against the dark, determined to hit every porch we could.



Back then, communities would hold big bonfires with a paper witch on top, and villages handed out candy apples.

Times have changed, and today we

need to be a lot wiser about safety—but the fun can still be just as memorable (hopefully without rain or freezing cold!). Here are a few important tips to help keep our kids safe while trick-ortreating:

- 1. Children should always be with at least one adult. Teens should use phone trackers, and kids with phones should check in with parents regularly.
- 2. Carry a flashlight for dark areas and when crossing streets.
- 3. Remind kids never to enter someone's home or car, and not to talk to strangers.
- 4. Don't let kids eat treats until they're home and an adult has checked them.
- 5. Stay on sidewalks—don't cut across lawns.
- 6. Avoid costumes with props that could be mistaken for weapons.
- 7. Never dart between parked cars when crossing the street—always stop and look first.



8. Add reflective tape to costumes so kids are visible at night.

9. Call 911 if you see suspicious or unsafe activity.

10. Skip houses with no lights on and move on to the next.

11. Make sure costumes allow kids to

see and hear clearly.

Village branch collection for October will be the week of October 6th – 10th

November's collection will be the week of November 3rd – 7th (last collection of the year)

The Public Works Department will collect branches the <u>first full **working** week of every month</u> (April-November)

- All brush must be put out on the front parkway by 7:00 a.m. on your designated collection day. Branches can be up to 7 feet in length and stacked with the butt ends facing the street in the same direction. If not stacked properly, a "restack" notice will be left.
- Again, please put ALL brush out on your designated collection day and Public Works crews will determine what constitutes an open load, which will be picked up later in the week.
- An open load would include any brush that will not fit through the chipper such as logs, stumps, and large limbs. These must be cut for one man to lift. Dirt must be removed from any root balls for pickup.
- Public Works Crews will only pass through a designated pickup area once due to time, scheduling, and other workload responsibilities.

Landscapers & tree services are responsible

for their own debris disposal.

Please note the following schedule for branch pickup:

MONDAY: From Mannheim Rd west to Wolf Rd and from Canterbury St south to Windsor Dr-including both sides of Windsor Dr. Also Waterford, Waverly, Camelot and Concord.

This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Street Parking Restrictions

From April 1 through November 30, parking restrictions are in effect to support street maintenance activities. Please check posted street signs carefully—it is unlawful to park or leave a vehicle parked during designated weekday hours on streets marked for maintenance.

These restrictions help ensure our streets stay clean and well-maintained. These restrictions are for one side of the street, once a week, 7am-3pm as designated by posted signage.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence.

Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.

2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village.

Modernizing Lives with the Inventions of the 1920s

When Westchester was established as a town in 1925, the 1920s were roaring. It was America's most optimistic period, and the development of the town and subsequent community of Westchester reflected that. Numerous inventions marked the decade to a degree that today we could not imagine life without the amenities, medicines, and gadgets that someone introduced or created during this period. As new homes were built on 2000 acres in Westchester, purchased by Samuel Insull's developers, the inventions of the period sparked a new chapter of life for the inhabitants and newcomers. It was truly a remarkable decade.

In 1923 the bulldozer was invented, with a patent obtained in 1925 by James Cunning and Earl McLeod, which was useful in all the building projects undertaken in town. The model T Henry Ford launched in 1908 was still in production, a classic automobile frequently seen on Roosevelt Road, Cermak, Mannheim and Wolf Roads. Modern traffic lights with red, yellow and green lights were introduced in 1920 by William Poltz from Detroit, enhancing the flow of traffic. A car headrest (1921) was added for safety, and in 1922 the convertible was brought out. Power steering was conceived in 1926, but it did not come into use until the 1930s.

The 1920s led to changes in how people lived, with better communication, expanded mobility, and a novel focus on entertainment. This was the golden age of the radio, where people gathered round to listen to news, baseball and stories, but jazz music defined the 1920s as the "Jazz Age," and music was everywhere. The Charleston was all the rage on twenties dance floors. A car radio was perfected in 1929. The Jukebox was invented in 1927, and loudspeakers were available for the first time in 1924. The instant camera (1925) documented people's lives. Philo Farnsworth invented the first electronic television which he conceived as a 14-year-old in 1921 and patented in 1927. People enjoyed going to the movies and pined after the latest screen star. City Center Bank in Kansas City used the first drive-through in 1926, and soon drive-throughs were everywhere, even for burger outlets and restaurants. In 1922 water skiing became a new sport. Everything in the decade had an element of sound and speed. No wonder, young girls emulated the novel young woman called the Flapper. The 1920s were indeed "roaring."

With new and updated building types being constructed in 1920s Westchester, such as the bungalows, multi-level apartments, and English style houses, the family could enjoy a variety of new amenities in the home. These were much facilitated by the electricity that was available because Samuel Insull was in the process of connecting the western suburbs to Chicago. Washing machines and vacuum cleaners were electrified in the 1920s and much improved, and Frigidaire created a new type of refrigerator that replaced the icebox and the iceman who had delivered large

blocks of ice to the homes. Ice cube trays were an invention of 1928. Freshnesspreserving frozen food for purchase was made practical by Clarence Birdseye in 1927. Many of the ovens for sale in the decade had electric burners. Some homes added a garbage disposal after its invention in 1927. In 1926 the newest thing was a pop-up toaster called the Toastmaster. At the end of a busy day, a recliner (conceived as a wooden structure in 1927, with added leather for comfort a bit later), graced many family rooms to enjoy radio and later TV (still before mass distribution in the 1920s) or bring relaxation at the end of a busy day. One could even start an electric fan to stay cool.


Other inventions made life easier for everyone in the family. Women used hair dryers for the first time in 1920--a flexible pipe leading from a vacuum cleaner was the nearest option prior to that invention for hair drying. Men began using electric shavers starting in 1925. Cotton swabs, commonly known for its brand name Q-Tips (Q for quality) first appeared on shelves in 1923. The need to shield eyes from bright light led to the introduction of modern sunglasses in 1929. The lifesaving medical developments of insulin (1922) and penicillin (1928) also came in this decade.

Band-Aids had already been available for the little accidental mishaps since 1920. After playing on the new jungle gyms, which appeared for the first time in 1920, kids would have enjoyed a fabulous array of treats from store candy counters. An all-around favorite was bubble gum, marketed after its bubble-blowing formulation in 1928 as "Dubble Bubble," which included a Fleer Funnies color comic strip. At a penny apiece, it sold \$1.5 million dollars worth in its first year. It is amazing how many of our favorite candies we grew up with first appeared in the 1920s: Juicy Fruit (1920), Mounds (1920), Oh Henry! (1920), Baby Ruth (1921), Butterfinger (1923), Milky Way (1924), Reese's (1925) Pez (1927), Heath Bar (1928), Milk Duds (1928), and Twizzlers (1929), among many others. The 1920s Eskimo Pies were a great way to combine chocolate and ice cream, using a silver-foil wrapper. One local report from the 1920s attests to children buying candy at a favorite destination, a store formerly located at the Fresh Meadow's Golf Course on Cermak and Wolf Road.

The 1920s was indeed an amazing period for change in the western suburbs. Developers were able to optimize train connections to Chicago by setting model communities closely integrated with transportation opportunities. It basically marked the beginning of modern life and the consumer society. With advertising expanding into all areas of life, the spirit of the age was very optimistic and innovative, and the town of Westchester was truly a product of this fascinating decade.

New Water & Sewer Rates

These changes took effect July 1, 2025, following a professional rate study, and represent the next phase of the Village's multi-year plan to address aging infrastructure, comply with the State's Lead Service Line Replacement Mandate, and maintain long-term financial sustainability of our water and sewer systems.

New Rates Effective July 1, 2025:

- Water usage: \$19.21 per 1,000 gallons
- Sewer usage: \$4.03 per 1,000 gallons
- Water infrastructure fee: \$22 per month
- Sewer infrastructure fee: \$15 per month

These rates will appear on the OCTOBER 2025 utility bills.

The approved ordinance also includes a 10% increase in July 2026, a 5% increase in July 2027, and then annual increases of 3–5% to keep pace with infrastructure maintenance and water delivery costs.

Water Fixture Efficiency **Reimbursement Grant Program**

The Village of Westchester is offering a Water Fixture Efficiency Reimbursement Grant to assist low-income residents in reducing water usage and offsetting the cost of high-efficiency fixtures. Eligible residents can receive up to 90% reimbursement on the purchase and installation of lead-free toilets, faucets, and showerheads—with a lifetime household maximum of \$500.

 - \$200 per toilet
 - \$100 per faucet
 - \$75 per showerhead

- ✓ Must meet water-efficiency standards (e.g. 1.28 gallons per flush for toilets)

Westchester 2025 Pumpkin Smash

As Halloween approaches, so too does Westchester's 7th Annual Pumpkin Smash brought to you by the Green Residents of Westchester (GROW).

The Pumpkin Smash is an annual effort by communities to divert pumpkins from landfills by providing locations for residents to drop off jack-o-lanterns (minus candles) and other gourds to be compost-

It is held each year after Halloween and this year that will be on Saturday and Sunday, November 8th & 9th in Westchester. Items accepted include pumpkins, gourds, cornstalks, and hay bales.

Be sure to remove candles, stickers, pipe cleaners, and any non-compostable decorations before placing your pumpkins in

This year we will have two locations!

Behind the Westchester Community Church: 1840 Westchester Boulevard In the back of the Mayfair Recreation Center parking lot: 10835 Wakefield Street

Many people are surprised to find out that Illinois is the top producer of pumpkins in the United States.

In 2023, Illinois produced more pounds of pumpkins than the five next top producing states combined (Source: USDA).

So why bother to compost them instead of just throwing them in the trash? Pumpkins are nutritionally valuable since they



contain significant amounts of fiber, potassium, and protein.

Pumpkins are also 90% water and thus when disposed of in a landfill these nutrients and water are lost from the environment rather than being recycled or reinvested back into the environment.

The decomposition of organic matter, such as pumpkins, produces greenhouse

Landfills are the 3rd largest producers of greenhouse gasses so by composting them we can significantly reduce those emisComposting any organic matter is also just plain beneficial. Compost reduces, and in some cases, eliminates the need for chemical fertilizers. It is a nutrient-dense soil amendment that can provide cost savings over conventional soil remediation.

Lastly, compost enhances water retention in soils helping to reduce flooding in our yards and streets.

In 2024, Westchester joined with 100+ Pumpkin Smash sites to divert pumpkins from making it into landfills. The event resulted in the composting of 326,000 pounds of pumpkins.

This equates to a reduction of 118 tons of CO2 from entering the atmosphere and the diverting of over 35,400 gallons from entering landfills.

Can't make it during the Pumpkin Smash? Use your SBC yard waste bin to dispose of pumpkins, corn stalks, and hay bundles and it will be picked up during Westchester's weekly curbside pickup.

Green Fact of the Month

In the USA, more than 2 billion pumpkins are grown.

Only 20% of the pumpkins are used for food, while the remainder are used as Halloween decorations.

In order to prevent your pumpkins from ending up in landfills, which creates methane gas that is harmful to the warming climate, consider depositing your jack-o'-lanterns in Westchester's designated composting bins see accompanying article.

Recipe of the Month

Even as fall approaches, there's so much fresh and local seasonal produce still to enjoy. This sweet salad is great for those that are new to beets or just like a quick-to-prepare dish. Add your favorite protein for a light lunch or serve as a side dish or snack. This comes together in 15 minutes!

Moroccan Grated Carrot and Beet Salad

makes 4 servings

- 2 cups grated carrots (from about 3 carrots)
- 1 cup grated fresh beets

(from about 1 medium-sized peeled beet)

- 1/2 cup golden raisins
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika (sweet, not hot)
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- Small pinch salt
- Small pinch cayenne • 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons honey
- 2 tablespoons sliced fresh mint leaves

Instructions

- Place the grated carrots in a medium sized serving bowl.
- Place the grated beets into a sieve and briefly rinse with cold water. This will rinse away a little of the excess beet juice that may otherwise color the whole salad beet red. Pat dry with a paper towel.

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• Then add to the bowl with the carrots. Add the raisins. Stir to gently combine.

- In a small bowl, whisk together the paprika, cumin, cinnamon, salt, and cayenne. Then add the lemon juice and honey and whisk until smooth.
- Drizzle over the carrots and beets, then gently fold until the carrots and beets are lightly coated. Let sit for an hour before serving, either chilled or at room temperature, for the dressing to seep into the carrots and beets.
- Right before serving, stir in a couple tablespoons of sliced fresh mint leaves. Garnish with fresh

Food Rescue Volunteers Needed!

WHAT IS FOOD RESCUE?

Each year, 40% of the food we provide to our neighbors in need comes from food reclamation. This is food that is no longer sell-able, but still perfectly edible. Food reclamation keeps good food out of landfills and gets it to the vulnerable people in our communities who need it the most!

HOW DOES IT WORK?

On their designated week, volunteers go to their assigned store to pick up food and deliver it to the Pantry. For example: Volunteer Vivian goes to Store A on the first Wednesday of each month. This commitment is once a month for a full year. In less than 24 hours spread over a year, you could save tons of food from landfills and get it to our neighbors in need.



WHAT ARE THE REQUIREMENTS?

Food pick-up must be done between 11am-12pm on the designated reclamation day. Be able to lift multiple boxes weighing up to 30 pounds. Have a larger vehicle (minivan, SUV, station wagon).
