With school back in session, please make every effort to be alert while driving and be mindful of children walking to or from school or bus stops. With the use of electronic devices and headphones by children on their way to school, the lack of attention to traffic can be dangerous.

Be mindful at crossings and remember that it is illegal to pass a school bus with its stop arm out and flashing.

A warning from School District 92 ½ recently advised of an email scam that has been reported to them. Emails that have the appearance of being an official email from the school district have a link that is attempting to obtain password information from the recipient when the link is clicked.

If you open the email, do not open the attachment that is linked within.

The Village of Westchester was recently notified that we have been awarded a Cook County Bureau of Economic Development Block Grant in the amount of \$250,000 that will be utilized for water main improvements in two separate locations.

This is the second Community Block Grant award to be received recently that will be utilized to complete more of the repairs needed and replace century old water mains.

The Village of Westchester hosted two town hall meetings recently, regarding the new online water usage portal Veregy.

This portal has already been extremely impactful to residents who were unaware of small leaks in their house, mostly due to a faulty toilet flap.

Sign up on our website and be notified if there is a suspected leak or continuous use of water through your water meter long before a bill comes. Also, you can review projected water use at any time during the month. If you require assistance in setting up this service please contact public works.

The Illinois Secretary of State's REAL ID rush has calmed down in the past month, reducing the waiting times at the facility.

The Westchester Senior Secretary of State service office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 to 4:00pm offering services to those 65 and older. Drivers license renewals, license plate stickers and driver's tests are just a few of the services seniors can have handled without an appointment.

BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT: Celebrating Paul Gattuso and Paul's Pizza

Westchester is fortunate to be home to many excellent businesses and many dedicated business owners. When those two come together, the entire community is made stronger. Few stories capture this better than that of Paul Gattuso and his longtime business, Paul's Pizza.

Although Paul's Pizza recently closed its doors, Paul continues his work in the restaurant world as co-owner of GP Italiano in La-Grange. While Paul may not be a lifelong resident of Westchester, his contributions as a business owner, Village Trustee, and Village President have left a lasting mark on our community.

Paul's story is one of determination and hard work. From his early years holding three jobs—at Sears in Berwyn, Sexton's Paint, and the Berwyn Theatre—Paul dreamed of running his own hot dog stand. He saved diligently and eventually opened his first store at Harlem and Irving. Wanting to establish himself in the western suburbs, Paul found a small 600-square-foot shop on 31st Street in Westchester by Rosemary Joyce Real Estate, where he operated for more than 20 years.

Paul credits several community mentors—Tony Christopher, Angelo Luciano, John Sinde, and Wayne Busa to name a few—with helping him understand both business and community life. Their support, advice, and even hands-on assistance in his shop shaped his approach to leadership and service.

From the beginning, Paul embraced the belief that true business success

munity. Starting with Westchester Baseball, his support extended to Girls Softball, Blind Baseball, local hockey leagues, churches, the "Soup for Veterans Run," and countless police, fire, and emergency personnel throughout the western suburbs. His guiding principle has always been simple: "You do good because it's good. If you do that, it will come back tenfold."

In 1999, Paul relocated down the street to Westbrook Commons, where he built lasting relationships with neighboring businesses. Together, they formed a nonprofit group that organized craft fairs, car shows, movie nights, and concerts—events that strengthened local business and community ties

Over the years, Paul's Pizza became more than a restaurant—it became a gathering place. From the "Morning Coffee Clutch" to regular lunch groups, Paul knew his customers by name and by order. The Monday Hot Dog crowd, the Tuesday Beef Sandwich and Meatball group, and fans of his Eggplant Parmesan each added to the fabric of his business. Paul was thankful that Chauncey from Chauncev's Great Outdoors on ESPN 1000 hosted a live remote every year on the first Saturday of August for 20 years. Paul is thankful for everyone who helped Paul's Pizza be a success. Through it all, Paul felt every day was made brighter when his father, Anthony, worked alongside him, instilling lessons of hard work and integrity that Paul carries with him to this day.


Not only was Paul's Pizza a West-

as an important first job for many young people in Westchester. Over the years, Paul employed more than high school and college students. Paul is grateful for his first set of employees - Michael Sullivan, Jesus as all the others who made Paul's Pizza a neighborhood institution. Whether the employees were working the hot dog table, beef table, frier, pizza oven, or cleaning tables, Paul valued them all the same. His longest-serving employee, Luis Landeros, and his family became like family to Paul. For Paul, supporting and mentoring young workers was as rewarding as running a successful business.

Today, Paul has partnered with Joe Delcroce—a former Paul's Pizza employee and Kendall College Culinary graduate—to operate GP Italiano. Together, they serve a mix of traditional Italian favorites and contemporary dishes, from Chicken Parmesan and steaks to short ribs, octopus, and wood-fired pizzas.

While many will miss Paul's Pizza the food, the staff, and even the hand-painted mural by Bruce Sirus (which Paul still has today)—Paul continues to serve with the same passion, work ethic, and love for community at GP Italiano. GP Italiano is located at 1 S. LaGrange Road, open Tuesday – Saturday 4:00-10:00, and Sunday 4:00-8:00.

School's Back—Let's Keep Our Children Safe

Well, just like that, our children are back in school! Many are traveling by bicycle, walking, or taking the bus each day. This is a time when drivers must be especially observant and alert—particularly in school zones and around buses making stops.

By law, drivers must come to a complete stop when a school bus has its red lights flashing and stop arm extended. Bus drivers do their best to guide children safely, but kids can act unpredictably.

That's why it's critical for all of us behind the wheel to stay attentive and prepared for the unexpected so every child gets to and from school safely.

Remember: school buses are equipped with camera systems that can record traffic violations, and those recordings can be used by police in court. Too often, crashes happen when drivers rush to get from point A to point B. Slowing down, observing speed limits, and giving yourself extra travel time can prevent injuries—or even save a life.

Stay aware of your surroundings, avoid



distractions like your phone, and watch carefully when making turns near side streets in school zones. Crossing guards are out there helping, but they can only do so much. Always maintain a safe distance from buses in case of sudden stops. At the end of the day, it's up to us as responsible drivers to protect children. Tragedies can be avoided by being patient, alert, and cautious. Please—slow

down, because once something bad happens, we cannot turn back time.

Tips to Make Your Reuse-a-Palooza Yard Sale a Success

Westchester's Reuse-a-Palooza yard sale fest is hosted by the Green Residents of Westchester (GROW) Ecological Commission with a goal to help you declutter your home, make extra cash, and ensure your items stay out of the landfill. Here are some helpful tips to set your sale up for success:

Plan Ahead

- **Timing:** Consider holding your sale over both days to maximize revenue and the amount of stuff you can declutter.
- Weather: Monitor the weather forecast and have a backup plan in case of rain, such as tarps, tents, or an indoor area.
- **Set your pricing strategy:** See page three for pricing and sales tips.
- Cash and digital payments: Have plenty of change available and keep cash in a secure, easily accessible place like a money belt or a lockbox. Consider accepting digital payments via apps like Venmo or PayPal to accommodate more buyers.

Get buyers to your sale:

- Help spread the word: Advertising and marketing of your individual sale is your responsibility. Promote your garage sale items on community boards, local newspapers, and online platforms like Craigslist, Facebook Marketplace, and Nextdoor. Use clear, eye-catching signs around your neighborhood with the sale address. Remember: The Village will post banners, but cannot promote individual sales.
- Collaborate with your neighbors: This event is just as much about community engagement as it is about yard sales. Check the map to see who is hosting in your area to a) Collaborate with your neighbors to hold a larger sale b) get neighbors involved so more buyers will come to your area.
- Consider a theme. Think about what you are selling and how you can highlight your sale from the others taking place (vintage kitchenware, baby accessories, electronics, etc), and advertise accordingly.

Set Up Effectively

- Categorize: Arrange items by category (e.g., clothes, toys, books) to make browsing more convenient for shoppers. Especially with multiple sales on the same day, buyers may be less likely to spend lots of time at a sale if they can't immediately find items of interest to them.
- **Display:** Use tables, shelves, and racks to display items neatly. Ensure everything is visible and within easy reach.
- Cleanliness: Clean all items before the sale. A tidy, well-organized setup can attract more buyers.
- **Comfort:** Consider providing shade and seating for yourself and shoppers, especially if the weather is hot. Encourage shoppers to linger at your sale instead of moving on.
- **Safety:** Keep valuable items close to you and consider having a helper to keep an eye on things.

Extra Ways to Build Community

- **Greeting:** Be friendly and greet shoppers as they arrive. A warm welcome can make people more comfortable and willing to browse.
- **Refreshments:** Offering inexpensive refreshments like bottled water or homemade lemonade can entice customers to stay longer and shop more.

After the Sale

• **Donations:** Decide in advance what to do with unsold items. Consider donating them to charity or scheduling a pickup with a local donation center. The Eventbrite page includes a repository of potential donation resources, but this is not an exhaustive list.

The village will not be coordinating trash pick up or donation pick up: The purpose of this event is to encourage landfill diversion, so there will be no special trash pickup. It is impossible to predict the types, locations, and quantities of items being donated, so the Village is unable to engage a charity to drive around town with a box truck to pick up donations.

• Cleanup: Remove any remaining signs from your neighborhood to avoid fines and maintain goodwill.

Pricing and Sales Tips

Remember that this event is intended to help you declutter your house, not to fully fund your retirement. By having realistic expectations and following these pricing tips, you can attract more buyers, encourage sales, and ensure your items move quickly during your garage sale.

Set Your Prices:

- Research pricing: Check online marketplaces like eBay, Craigslist, and Facebook Marketplace to see what similar items are sold for. This will give you a baseline for pricing. You can also visit other garage sales in your area to understand local pricing trends. Note the prices of items similar to what you're selling.
- Condition: Price items based on their condition. Items in excellent condition can be priced higher, while those with visible wear and tear should be priced lower.
- **Depreciation:** Remember that used items typically sell for much less than their original purchase price. Aim for about 10-30% of the original retail price, depending on the item's condition and demand.

- Early Bird Discounts: Offer and post on Facebook if you will offer a discount to early shoppers or for those who buy multiple items. For example, "Buy 2, get 1 free" or "10% off before 10 AM."
- Low-Priced or Free Items: Have a bargain bin with items priced at \$1 or less or even a "free" section. This can lure more shoppers to your sale and help move smaller, less valuable items quickly.
- Last-Day Deals: On the final day/in the final hours of your sale, consider slashing prices or offering deep discounts to clear out remaining items.

Recipe of the Month

Keep enjoying what's in season!

This bake is easy to customize with your favorite spices and veggies and works well as a side or main dish. Leave out the parmesan to make it vegan/dairy-free.

Tomato Eggplant Zucchini Bake with Garlic and Parmesan

makes 6 servings

Ingredient

- -3 medium zucchini (about 1 1/2 pounds)
- -1 small/medium eggplant (about 3/4 pound)
- -1 pint cherry tomatoes or grape tomatoes -1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
- 4 large cloves garlic, minced

- ¼ teaspoon kosher salt

- ¼ teaspoon ground black pepper
- ¾ cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese divided (about 2 1/2 ounces)
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup chopped fresh basil divided
- -1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley divided

<u>Instructions</u>

-Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly grease a deep 9x9-inch baking dish or similar 3 1/2-quart casserole dish with nonstick spray.

- -Quarter the zucchini then cut into 1/2-inch slices and place in a large mixing bowl (each piece of zucchini should be roughly 1/2 to 3/4 inches in size).
- -Next, slice the eggplant into 1/4-inch rounds, then stack the rounds and cut into roughly 3/4inch pieces. Add to the bowl with the zucchini. Halve the cherry tomatoes and add them to the

- -Drizzle the cut vegetables with the olive oil, then add the garlic, salt, pepper, 1/3 cup of the Parmesan cheese, and half of the basil and parsley. Toss gently to combine.
- -Transfer the vegetables to the prepared baking dish. Bake for 25 minutes, cover the pan with aluminum foil, then continue baking for 10 to 20 additional minutes, until the vegetables are
- -Sprinkle with the remaining Parmesan cheese, basil, and parsley. Serve warm.

PUBLIC WORKS

Village branch collection for September will be the week of September 8th – 12th October's collection will be the week of October 6th – 10th

November's collection will be the week of November 3rd – 7th (last collection of the season)

The Public Works Department will collect branches the <u>first full working week of every</u> month

(April-November)

- All brush must be put out on the front parkway by 7:00 a.m. on your designated collection day. Branches can be up to 7 feet in length and stacked with the butt ends facing the street in the same direction. If not stacked properly, a "restack" notice will be left.
- Again, please put ALL brush out on your designated collection day and Public Works crews will determine what constitutes an open load, which will be picked up later in the week.
- An open load would include any brush that will not fit through the chipper such as logs, stumps, and large limbs. These must be cut for one man to lift. Dirt must be removed from any root balls for pickup.
- Public Works Crews will only pass through a designated pickup area once due to time, scheduling, and other workload responsibilities.

Landscapers & tree services are responsible for their own debris disposal.

Please note the following schedule for branch pickup:

MONDAY: From Mannheim Rd west to Wolf Rd and from Canterbury St south to Windsor Dr-including both sides of Windsor Dr. Also Waterford, Waverly, Camelot and Concord.

TUESDAY: Roosevelt Rd south to Cermak Rd-from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd.

WEDNESDAY: From Roosevelt Rd north to the expressway and from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd. Also, Roosevelt Rd south to Canterbury St from Haase Ave west to Heidorn Ave.

THURSDAY: From Belleview Ave west to Wolf Rd, Martindale Dr south to 31st Street.

Weekly yard waste collection by S.B.C. began on your first rubbish collection day in April.

- Labor Day Delay: There will be no garbage pickup on Monday, September 1. Monday routes will be collected on Tuesday, September 2. Tuesday routes will be collected on Wednesday, September 3. Thursday and Friday routes will remain on their regular schedule.
- If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected

by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.

- You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.,) at the curb **every week** for collection. Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.
- S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), at no additional charge, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, universal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Street Parking Restrictions

From April 1 through November 30, parking restrictions are in effect to support **street maintenance** activities. Please check posted street signs carefully—it is unlawful to park or leave a vehicle parked during designated weekday hours on streets marked for maintenance. These restrictions help ensure our streets stay clean and well-maintained. These restrictions are for one side of the street, once a week, 7am-3pm as designated by posted signage.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted,

the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.

2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees, please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

Village Watering Restrictions

There are water use restrictions in effect every year, May 15th to September 15th, from 12pm to 6pm. This includes:

- (1) Outdoor Watering
- (2) Cleaning Outdoor Surfaces
- (3) Cleaning Buildings
- (4) Pool Filling
- (5) Sprinkling/ sprinklers

Outdoor water usage during unrestricted hours (before noon, after 6pm) is allowed on even numbered days for residents with even numbered addresses, and on odd numbered days for residents with odd numbered addresses. If we have a dry summer, further restrictions may be necessary.



CENTENNIAL HISTORY: William Zelosky

One of the earliest developers of the model town of Westchester was William Zelosky. His office was located on Roosevelt Road very near the Roosevelt train station that opened on Oct. 1, 1925, connecting Westchester to the city of Chicago. Zelosky's real estate sales office was intended from the start to be donated to the village of Westchester as a civic center after the William Zelosky Company no longer needed it as a sales center. The building was created as a modified English-style building with a thatched roof. The interior was to contain a hall holding about 400 people with an arched ceiling. It was planned with the most modern conveniences, with an executive office and ten private offices for sales managers, including restrooms and lighting effects.

His vision was to create communities close to transportation with key infrastructure in place, such as water and gas mains, sewers, and street lighting. Sidewalks and extra wide streets were to be created, as well as parklands.

He also advocated for elm trees to be planted, and Westchester planted 15,000 of these trees. He had already developed eight subdivisions on the Northwest side, where he had restricted properties and zoned them for residences, apartments and business buildings before Chicago adopted zoning laws.

His main hub of operations was located at 111 West Washington, on the second floor of what was then known as the Conway Building, designed by famed architect Daniel Burnham, now called the Burnham Center. Wherever Zelosky created subdivisions, they bore his unique stamp of community planning.

Who was this successful real estate developer? William Paul Zelosky (originally Zelichowski) was born on May 8, 1867, in Gniewkowo, Poland. He came to the US in 1880 and settled in Ft. Worth, Texas, where he resided from 1890 to circa 1900. His brother Frank emigrated from Poland and settle there as well in 1884, changing his name to Zeloski in 1909. William encouraged his niece Rose Cecilia Zelosky (with a "y") to study law at the University of Texas at Austin, and she became one of the first women to graduate from law school in Texas.

William Zelosky had promised her a trip to Europe if she completed her studies. She became a suffragette and worked on the legal team of AT&T and later for the Veteran's Administration. After the Columbian Exposition in Chicago, William Zelosky decided to move and settle in Chicago, where he began his real estate business around 1896. He traveled frequently, visiting places such

as Europe, Egypt, Palestine, Puerto Rico, and Hawaii, collecting ideas and inspiration. He was married twice, marrying his second wife in Chicago in 1915. He was a member of the Chicago Real Estate Board, North-West Side Real Estate Board, Illinois Athletic Club and the Press Club. He often was invited as key speaker to real estate and other organizations, and his offices ran real estate classes toward licensing future real estate agents. He was made president of Chicago Mayor Dever's Housing Commission. Dever was mayor from 1923-1927.

William Zelosky created several improvements for financing properties and homes for prospective owners. Many ads were placed in the Chicago Tirbune advertising investments in lots and homes in these newly expanded communities.

Back in the 1920s banks required a 50 percent downpayment on a home. Zelosky created his own financing plans which helped many working-class people be able to afford their own home through lower monthly payments, "like paying rent." He specialized in brick homes, especially bungalows, two-flats, and on occasion, three-flats. In 1924, he invested in and developed subdivisions in Lake View West, Rosedale Manor, Colonial Gardens, Park View West, Catalpa Park, Gladstone Park and Gardens, and Jefferson Park. One can still find a rare plaque on the sidewalks of Catalpa Avenue bearing the William Zelosky Company name. He offered safe, efficient and attractive subdivisions to prospective

He had offices in eight locations in the Chicago area, with four on Milwaukee Avenue alone. In the early to mid-1920s, he recruited sales managers, real estate agents, and staff to conduct his business. When Westchester was created in 1925, he had already gathered the requisite knowledge and experience to create and develop attractive subdivisions near the city of Chicago. What was new was that he was able to work setting up a community from scratch.

All the other communities he had worked on were already partially developed and did not have the open space that the Westchester area had to offer. The first baby born in Westchester was named after him - William Paul Gardaphe, whose father Charles worked for the Zelosky Company. William Zelosky died of a heart attack in Del Mar, San Diego, California.

He was 78 years old. If you visit the Westchester streets north of Roosevelt Road, you can still find examples of Zelosky homes and developments sandwiched between more modern postwar

buildings. Today the Westchester Village Hall is located where his sales office used to be. Starting in 1962, following the death of William's wife Mildred Zeloskyin 1959, an exchange scholarship program was set up to have U.S students study in Poland, and Polish students study in the U.S. Above all William Zelosky had great faith in the expansion

of Chicago and its surrounding communities with transportation services and infrastructure in place. Westchester was inspired by his vision of the perfect model town.

New Water & Sewer Rates

These changes took effect July 1, 2025, following a professional rate study, and represent the next phase of the Village's multi-year plan to address aging infrastructure, comply with the State's Lead Service Line Replacement Mandate, and maintain long-term financial sustainability of our water and sewer systems.

New Rates Effective July 1, 2025:

- Water usage: \$19.21 per 1,000 gallons
- Sewer usage: \$4.03 per 1,000 gallons
- Water infrastructure fee: \$22 per month
- Sewer infrastructure fee: \$15 per month

These rates will appear on the **September 2025 utility bills**.

The approved ordinance also includes a 10% increase in July 2026, a 5% increase in July 2027, and then annual increases of 3–5% to keep pace with infrastructure maintenance and water delivery costs.

Please note: Garbage rates as of July 1, 2025, will be \$21.65 per month (or \$18.56 per month for senior households), based on the standard annual increase in the Village's solid waste contract.

Water Fixture Efficiency Reimbursement Grant Program

The Village of Westchester is offering a Water Fixture Efficiency Reimbursement Grant to assist low-income residents in reducing water usage and offsetting the cost of high-efficiency fixtures. Eligible residents can receive up to 90% reimbursement on the purchase and installation of lead-free toilets, faucets, and showerheads—with a lifetime household maximum of \$500.

Highlights:

- ✓ Covers up to:
 - \$200 per toilet
 - \$100 per faucet

- \$75 per showerhead
- ✓ Must meet water-efficiency standards (e.g. 1.28 gallons per flush for toilets)
- Must obtain a free plumbing permit Income eligibility required (e.g. Med icaid, SNAP, LIHEAP, or unemploy ment letter)

Utility Bill Hardship Program

The Village of Westchester offers a Utility Bill Hardship Program to assist residents who are experiencing financial difficulty in keeping up with their water and sewer bill. This program allows eligible account holders to apply for a payment arrangement through a formal hardship hearing.

Program Details:

- ✓ Account must not be delinquent at the time of application
- ✓ Residents must apply in writing using the official application
- ✓ Only one hardship arrangement allowed every 6 months

- ✓ Applicants must attend a scheduled hardship hearing – missing it counts as your one chance for the 6-month period
- ✓ If approved, failure to follow the payment plan will result in termination and the full balance becoming due





The villages of Oak Park, Forest Park and River Forest will host the Sixth Annual Tour de Proviso on Saturday, October 4 to promote health and wellness across Proviso Township and its neighboring villages.

Each year, a different municipality takes the lead in organizing the route and activities. Oak Park is hosting Tour de Proviso for the first time and is looking forward to welcoming riders this fall.

Routes: Tour de Proviso is a family-friendly event designed for cyclists of all skill levels. Two routes will be offered at varied distances, a seven-mile route and 20-mile route.

Both routes begin and end in Oak Park, near Village Hall (123 Madison St.), and have been reviewed in coordination with the Oak Park Police Department, the Department of Public Works and leaders from neighboring municipalities most impacted by the routes, including Forest Park and River Forest.

Community Fair: The Village of Oak Park will host a Community Fair from 9 a.m. to noon on the south lawn at Village Hall. The fair will feature 20+ participants from across west Cook County, including elected officials, local organizations, businesses. There will be food vendors on site, with music also provided by a DJ.

Last Chance for Federal Tax Savings on Electric Vehicles, Solar Panels and More

Elizabeth Wiseman-Chase, GROW Commissioner, July 24th, 2025

Recent legislation will end Federal tax incentives on electric vehicles, rooftop solar and battery storage, home weatherization, and installation of a heat pump HVAC system or hot water heater.*

* Please consult your tax advisor on how these incentives may apply to you

Electric Vehicles and Home EV Chargers:

The Federal Clean Vehicle Tax Credit incentive of up to \$7,500 for purchasing a new EV, and up to \$4,000 for a used one will end on September 30, 2025. If you're in the market for an EV, there is still time to take advantage of this incentive and some manufacturers are offering attractive financing. Level 2 chargers placed in service before June 30, 2026 may be eligible for up to \$1,000 with the Alternative Fuel Vehicle Refueling Property Credit incentive. ComEd is offering incentives of up to \$3,750 for installation of a home charger.

Rooftop Solar and/or Battery Storage

The Residential Clean Energy Credit of 30% for the cost of purchase and installation. Systems must be installed and placed into service by December 31, 2025. Upgrading the electrical panel with installation of rooftop solar and/or battery storage may qualify you for an uncapped 30% credit on the panel upgrade.


There is an additional group purchasing discount (up to 17%) offered by the Switch Together Program that has been vetted by Citizens Utility Board, the Midwest Renewable Energy Association, and Cook County. The program is scheduled to open on August 6th, and the decision deadline will be September 3rd. The program cannot guarantee projects will be installed by the end of the year (which would give customers a better chance at claiming the tax credit) but that is the goal.

Home Energy Efficiency

The Energy Efficient Home Improvement Credit of up to 30% of the cost of purchase and installation. Systems must be installed and placed into service by December 31, 2025.

There are aggregate limits for this credit: \$1,200 limit for projects like a professional home energy audit; installing insulation; door, window and electrical panel upgrades; and installing insulation; door, window and electrical panel upgrades; and installing a high efficiency air-conditioning unit. There's an additional credit of up to \$2,000 is available for buying an electric heat pump (HVAC) system or a heat pump water heater. Upgrading your electrical panel to 200 amp service is eligible for a 30% credit, up to \$600. Combining an electrical panel upgrade alongside a heat pump could potentially allow for \$2,600 in Federal tax credits. ComEd is offering ENERGY STAR rebates on select electric and heat pump washers/dryers, induction cooktops and ranges.


