From the desk of Village President Greg Hribal

You may be wondering why recent water main replacements and breaks have led to localized boil orders. These notices are issued as a precaution, based on guidance from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. A precautionary boil order is put in place when water pressure to affected homes drops below the required minimum or is completely shut off, which can introduce air into the system. Boil orders apply only to water used for consumption, such as drinking or cooking, and typically remain in effect for a short time during repairs. They are lifted once an independent laboratory confirms the water is safe following restoration of service. To date, all boil orders issued by the village have been precautionary. A mandatory boil order would only be issued if a contaminant is detected through laboratory testing. To continually ensure our drinking water is safe, periodic water test samples are collected throughout town in various locations twice a month and independently tested.

Hand delivered notifications of boil orders are distributed door-to-door by our public works staff and the CodeRed notification program is another resource for receiving vital and location-based alerts. CodeRed provides your choice of notification type, such as by email, phone or text when events such as boil orders are issued. Visit our website to sign up for these notifications.

With construction season beginning soon, we urge residents to visit our website to view daily updates on road work that may impact your area. Notices are hand delivered to homeowners the day before any work impacting the access or use of one's driveway. If you need more information on projects being worked on this year, please contact public works department at 708-345-0041.

The newsletter you are reading is typically scheduled to be delivered on the first Monday of every month and has been that way for over 15 years. The village has been made aware of several residents who have not been receiving this newsletter by doorstep delivery in recent months. We apologize and have been working with the service that provides delivery and discussing alternative delivery methods to ensure that everyone receives the newsletter in a timely manner.

The Village Board is currently preparing both a veterans and senior committee working to provide outreach and determine how we can effectively provide services for the veterans and seniors living in our community. Both committees are being discussed at the board meetings and our intention is to move forward with them this summer. - ✓ For added protection, place an alarm inside every bedroom.
- ✓ Alarms should be installed at least 10 feet away from any cooking appliances.
- ✓ Ceiling installation is best. If mounting on a wall, place the alarm no more than 12 inches from the ceiling.
- ✓ Replace smoke alarm batteries every 6 months.
- ✓ The average lifespan of a smoke alarm is 10 years—replace units accordingly.

With spring fully underway and warmer weather upon us, many changes come—including an increase in motor vehicle accidents. Heavy rains during this time of year can bring oil to the surface of roadways, making them dangerously slippery, like ice, or worse, causing vehicles to hydroplane and spin out of control.

It's also the season when many people are tackling their to-do lists — traveling more often to local hardware stores on weekends, picking up household supplies, planting flowers, and working on outdoor projects. This means more traffic on the roads, busier parking lots, and unfortunately, less patient drivers. All of these factors can lead to an increase in accidents and even heated confrontations between individuals.

It's important to remember that patience is a true virtue. Allow yourself plenty of time to get from point A to point B, and try not to get stressed or drawn into someone else's anger. Road rage can escalate quickly, often over something we have no control over — like another driver speeding, cutting you off, or taking a parking spot. As I've gotten older, I've become a strong advocate for stress management tools like yoga, meditation, or, when necessary, speaking to your doctor for additional support. We live in a fast-paced and often impatient society,

and it's more important than ever to stay calm and focused behind the wheel.

Now is a good time to recommit to being a “defensive driver.” Stay alert, drive cautiously, and keep a safe distance around your vehicle at all times. Defensive driving skills can help you avoid accidents caused by those who may not be as careful. I have personally avoided many accidents simply by staying calm, driving slowly, and watching the behavior of others around me.

In closing, I am often asked, “How do I avoid red light ticket violations?” It’s simple: When approaching an intersection, you will see a large white stop line, about one foot wide and six feet long. Always come to a full stop before the white line and pause for about 30 seconds before proceeding through your turn. This ensures you won’t trigger a violation. If you look closely, you’ll also notice two gray, round-shaped sensors embedded in the pavement before the line. These sensors activate the camera and monitor whether a complete stop was made — not a “California roll” through the intersection.

Drive safely, stay patient, and enjoy the start of the summer season.

PUBLIC WORKS

Village branch collection for May will be the week of May 5th – 9th

June’s collection will be the week of June 2nd – 6th
July’s collection will be the week of July 7th – 11th

The Public Works Department will collect branches the first full working week of every month (April-November)

- All brush must be put out on the front parkway by 7:00 a.m. on your designated collection day. Branches can be up to 7 feet in length and stacked with the butt ends facing the street in the same direction. If not stacked properly, a “restack” notice will be left.
- Again, please put ALL brush out on your designated collection day and Public Works crews will determine what constitutes an open load, which will be picked up later in the week.
- An open load would include any brush that will not fit through the chipper such as logs, stumps, and large limbs. These must be cut for one man to lift. Dirt must be removed from any root balls for pickup.
- Public Works Crews will only pass through a designated pickup area once due to time, scheduling, and other workload responsibilities.

Landscapers & tree services are responsible for their own debris disposal.

Please note the following schedule for branch pickup:

MONDAY: From Mannheim Rd west to Wolf Rd and from Canterbury St south to Windsor Dr-including both sides of Windsor Dr. Also Waterford, Waverly, Camelot and Concord.
TUESDAY: Roosevelt Rd south to Cermak Rd-from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd.
WEDNESDAY: From Roosevelt Rd north to the expressway and from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd. Also, Roosevelt Rd

south to Canterbury St from Haase Ave west to Heidorn Ave.

THURSDAY: From Bellevue Ave west to Wolf Rd, Martindale Dr south to 31st Street.

Weekly yard waste collection by S.B.C. will begin on your first regular collection day in April.

- If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.
- You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.,) at the curb every week for collection. Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.
- S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), at no additional charge, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, universal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Street Parking Restrictions
From April 1 through November 30, parking restrictions are in effect to support street maintenance activities. Please check posted street signs carefully—it is unlawful to park or leave a vehicle parked during designated weekday hours on streets marked for maintenance. These restrictions help ensure our streets stay clean and well-maintained. These restrictions are for one side of the street, once a week, 7am-3pm as designated by posted signage.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.
2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees, please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

Village Watering Restrictions
There are water use restrictions in effect every year, May 15th to September 15th, from 12pm to 6pm. This includes:

- (1) Outdoor Watering
- (2) Cleaning Outdoor Surfaces
- (3) Cleaning Buildings
- (4) Pool Filling
- (5) Sprinkling/ sprinklers

Outdoor water use during unrestricted hours (before noon, after 6pm) is allowed on even numbered days for residents with even numbered addresses, and on odd numbered days for residents with odd numbered addresses. If we have a dry summer, further restrictions may be necessary.

National Drinking Water Week: May 4th – May 10th
Drinking Water Week is an annual observance in May sponsored by the American Water Works Association to

recognize the critical role drinking water plays in our daily lives. This week also helps to reaffirm the tireless efforts and importance of those who provide clean, safe drinking water for the public.

Ways to Live Without Plastics

Plastics were initially designed to be used and thrown away into landfills. (1) Recycling of plastics is extremely difficult as there is contamination from the many different plastics types (1, 2, 4, 5, and 7). In addition, when plastics degrade, they become non-digestible, small plastic particles (Micro- and Nano-plastics / MNPs) which enters our oceans and drinkable water systems like aquifers, rivers, and lakes. These MNPs are ingested by many living organisms including humans. So far, their deleterious effects on various organism and human life are now becoming known. One recent article identified individuals, who have MNPs in their carotid artery plaque, as having a 5 fold higher likelihood of a future stroke, heart attack or even death over a three year period, when compared to similarly matched individuals who did not have MNPs in their carotid artery plaque. (2)

NOW we understand that plastics, as they are, may have been a mistake. This article is a summary of the book by Sandra Ann Harris, “Say Goodbye to Plastic”. (3) The below text identifies 15 ways to live without plastics and will mainly focus on plastics in the kitchen. (Please look at the weekly Westchester e-Newsletter for how to replace plastics for the other rooms in your home.)

1. If consumers do not buy items made from or contained in plastic, manufacturers won't make item. For example, I can buy apple sauce in a glass jar and not a plastic container. If the item you buy only comes in a plastic container even from different manufactures, consider re-thinking the need to purchase that item. Find an appropriate replacement (e.g. I have used apple sauce to replace sugar in some recipes.)

2. Single ply plastic bag alternative: When shopping, bring re-usable bags to put your groceries in. Ten years ago, Mariano's sold canvas containers with handles which I still use when shopping even at other stores.

3. Plastic baggie alternative: Use safe, washable metal containers with silicone lids as a container when making a lunch for your school age children or for left overs. (Look at the stackable options from ECOlunchbox at <https://search.app/Lm2RMOUrPkKm2Jrk8>).

4. Styrofoam cup/paper coffee cup/plastic water bottle alternatives: Use reusable, washable metal (or ceramic/glass) sealed travel mugs. Ask if your barista can fill your

reusable non-plastic cup when ordering your coffee.

5. Single use straws, plastic utensils, etc. alternatives: Refuse to take items from your “to go” order and replace with reusable glass/metal/ceramic containers with silicone lids and use your washable metal/wood utensils.

6. Plastic trash can liner alternative: Consider new biodegradable bioplastics which degrade best at high temperatures used at an industrial composting facility. Otherwise, reconsider using such bioplastics until more information is available on its safety to soil and ecosystems.

7. Certain bamboo kitchen utensils may not be recyclable or compostable because of their lacquered finish. But if finished with an organic oil, then those are okay to use and dispose of in the trash.

8. Black plastic utensils alternative: Note that these utensils are known to leach forever chemicals (PFASs) that are harmful to us. If you have these, discard in trash and do not buy them anymore (4). Rather, use metal, wood or silicone utensils.

9. Existing plastic containers in your home can be repurposed using them as non-food storage containers, potted plant containers, etc.

10. Bread in a plastic bag alternatives: Rather buy bread that comes in a paper bag (but without the cellophane window). At a bakery, ask to place bread in a paper bag or bring your own clean cloth bag (pillow case?) or waxed cotton bread bag. Store bagged bread in a metal/wood/bamboo bread box at home.

11. Tea bag alternative: Because many tea bags are made from polyethylene (PET) and nylon, you can buy tea in metal containers. Steep tea in hot water using a reusable metal infuser.

12. Alternatives for Tetra Packs (cardboard looking outside with foil lining inside) that are used for prepackaged baby food, broth, spaghetti sauces, etc.: This packaging is not recyclable. Rather buy items in glass jars or aluminum/metal cans.

13. Plastic wrap and wax paper alternatives (where the coating is a petroleum product): Instead use paper coated with beeswax or jojoba oil. Also consider using parchment paper that has a coating of silicone or aluminum foil. Used, but clean, aluminum foil is 100% recyclable.

14. Kitchen sink (plastic) sponge alternatives: Note some

sponges have antibacterial Triclosan in them, but now this chemical is found to be toxic to humans and marine life. Use steel wool pads, natural loofah or a dish cloth (like your mother may have used).

15. Teflon and non-stick pots and pans alternatives: Note: the non-stick surface can leach forever chemicals (PFAFs and others) that are harmful to humans. (4) Rather, one can cook with a cast iron skillet or stainless steel/ceramic/glass cooking containers, pots and pans.

Recipe of the Month

Lentil Bolognese

Ingredients

- 1 ½ tablespoons olive oil
- 1 large onion, diced
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme (or use more oregano)
- 1 ½ teaspoons kosher salt, plus more to taste
- Freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 1 (5.3-ounce) tube of tomato paste
- 1/2 cup dry red wine (optional)
- 3 cups vegetable broth
- 1 cup red lentils, soaked (see step #1)
- ¼ cup walnuts (or pecans), crushed finely
- 1 (14.5-ounce/410g) can of crushed tomatoes or whole peeled tomatoes, crushed by hand
- 12-16 ounces long, wide pasta (such as pappardelle or fettuccine; or pasta of your choice)
- 1 tablespoon high-quality balsamic vinegar
- Flat-leaf Italian parsley or fresh basil, chopped or slivered (optional)

Instructions

1. Soak the 1 cup of lentils in water for 30 minutes, or up to

60 minutes. Meanwhile, prep all the other ingredients (i.e., chop the onions and garlic, chop the walnuts, etc.)

2. Heat a 12-inch deep sauté pan or Dutch oven on medium-high heat. Add the olive oil, and once it's shimmering, add the onions and season with a pinch of salt. Stir occasionally and cook the onions until a light brown fond starts to form on the surface of the pan, about 5 minutes. Add a few spoons of water to deglaze the pan, and stir. Continue cooking the onions, adding more water every few minutes and stirring frequently to prevent burning, until the onions are softened and golden brown, 9-10 minutes.

3. Add the garlic, thyme, oregano, 1 1/2 teaspoons kosher salt, and pepper to taste. Stir frequently and cook for 60-90 seconds.

4. Stir in the tomato paste and cook for 2-3 minutes to caramelize, stirring very frequently, until it's darker red in color.

5. Optional: If using the red wine, pour the wine into the pan and deglaze, scraping up any browned bits. Cook for 1-2 minutes, until the smell of alcohol has burned off and the mixture is jammy.

6. Pour in the broth to deglaze the pan, stirring any browned bits on the bottom of the pot and stirring the broth into the tomato paste to combine. Add the lentils and walnuts, and

stir to incorporate. Heat until the mixture comes to a boil, then reduce the heat to medium-low to maintain a rapid simmer for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

7. Add the crushed tomatoes and simmer for another 15-20 minutes, or until the lentils are tender but still al dente, stirring occasionally to prevent burning and sticking. If using crushed tomatoes, you may need to add a little water or lower the heat as needed to prevent burning. I prefer to cook for 20 minutes for a more developed flavor.

8. Meanwhile, bring a large pot of water to a boil and salt generously. Add the pasta and cook until just al dente. Reserve a ladle or so of pasta water (may not need it). Drain the pasta but do not rinse it.

9. Taste the bolognese for seasonings, adding more salt and pepper to taste. Finish with the balsamic vinegar and stir to combine.

10. Add the hot cooked pasta to the bolognese and toss until well coated in the sauce, adding a bit of pasta water as needed to ensure the sauce coats the noodles. Garnish with chopped parsley or basil, if using.

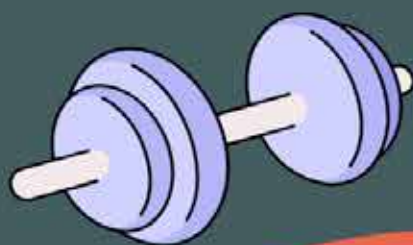

CENTENNIAL

What Preceded the 1925 Founding of Westchester

Before the town of Westchester was established in 1925, Native Prairie Potawatomis roamed the area. A large Native American settlement called Sauganakka along York Road included Graue Mill, which serviced surrounding farmers in the early 1850s. Sauganakka extended from south of Ogden Avenue up to Roosevelt Road. The natives established trails following animal tracks that became many of the main road arteries going to Chicago. Although the 1833 Chicago Treaty forced native tribes to depart the area prior to the settlement of German farmers here, the Christian Thiele family recalled when Native Americans did come to trade supplies at his general store at the intersection of Cermak and Wolf Road (now Fresh Meadow's Golf Course).

The township of Proviso was created in 1850. It was named after the Wilmot Proviso, legislation that was intended to stop the spread of slavery. Before Proviso the Township was named Taylor in honor of President Zachary Taylor, who died on July 9, 1850, soon after taking office. Earlier the area was named Franzosenbusch by the many German-speaking settlers, as Nicholas Thorode, a French immigrant from the island of Guernsey, had settled before them with his family on York Road near the Elmhurst Hospital. Thorode had a stone house, the first orchard and numerous sheep; he operated a sawmill where Graue Mill is now located.

Initially speculators bought the land that was up for sale after the departure of Native Americans. The first white settler in Proviso was Aaron Parsell, who bought land in section 29 near Salt Creek. He acquired several land sections, starting in 1832. One document of a purchase Parsell made in 1845 was signed by President Martin van Buren himself.

Soon after settlers and speculators bought large parcels of land, many of them arrived from the East Coast in the 1830s. They were Lyman B. Bennett, Charles Chaman, George Mower, Trumble Kent, and a few others. Unfortunately, all that land speculation around the Chicago area caused the Panic of 1837, a depression that shook the nation for several years.

In 1835 Robert Jones, one of these large-scale landowners, owned the three parcels in section 20 along Wolf Road and Cermak Road that were to become the Boeger and Heidorn farms. He also owned tracts in Hillside. John S.C. Hogan owned Wolf Road Prairie and Westchester Commons in 1835. Wilhelm Mandel from Hanover bought that section along 31st Street extending beyond Mannheim Road into La Grange Park. Hogan also owned the entire stretch from Wolf Road south of Cermak to the county line. One Hogan property later became the Heinrich Degener land where the Westbrook Corporate Center was built. Degener's main residence was north of Cermak next to Queen of Heaven Cemetery. Dietrich Dieckhoff purchased the land from Heinrich Degener's heirs in 1884. His farm was sold to developers in 1924. His farmhouse incorporated the first Lutheran school house, which then served as their living room. The structure had been moved there from the Immanuel Lutheran forty acres, probably around 1908. The Dieckhoff farm is one of the last farmhouses still standing in Westchester. It was moved to its current location on Wolf Road Prairie in 1985.

Hogan's land also included land that was sold to Heinrich Volberding, which in the early 20th century became the Heinrich Schramm farm. Heinrich and Friedrich Volberding were brothers who immigrated from Rodewald along with their older sister who

married Friedrich Degener. Friedrich's property, extending all the way to the county line, is now the Highland Golf Course. His Volberding relatives were living on land directly west of the current location of the Prairie House. Friedrich and Heinrich Degener were also brothers, and Heinrich's land deed created the forty acres for the 1868 Immanuel Lutheran Church. These families and the Mesenbrinks came from Rodewald in the Kingdom of Hanover in the 1840s. Queen of Heaven Cemetery is located on the former Mesenbrink homestead, but the Mesenbrinks also owned land just east of Mannheim Road and south of Roosevelt Road across from Westchester's city hall. These farmers were instrumental in creating a school for the German-speaking Lutheran children, so that they did not have to walk nine miles to the Addison church school. Surprisingly, the custom of wearing wooden shoes was brought over from the town of Rodewald because the farmers there did seasonal work in Holland, and their lands in Hanover were flat and marshy.

In Westchester, some of the earliest German speaking settlers were Christian Gottlieb Puscheck (c. 1802-1861), his wife Rosina (nee Huebsch, 18-1875) and their children Helena, Anna, Karl, Wilhelm, and Gottlieb. They came from Kurzwitz, county Olm, in Silesia. They were Old Lutherans escaping from religious dictates in Silesia. They settled on the west side of Gardner Road, formerly Puscheck Road, on the eastern boundary of Westchester. Detailed records of their journey showed them leaving the port of Hamburg on July 1, 1839, on the Brig Caroline, weathering extreme storms, sailing around Scotland, surviving hurricanes on the Atlantic, and finally arriving in New York on the 27th of August, 1839. They took a steamboat to Albany and a train to Buffalo. From

there he settled on a maple farm in either Minnesota or Wisconsin and traveled on a covered wagon to Illinois. Staying briefly in Lyons Township, they settled into the southern part of section 16 in 1845. Puscheck raised livestock and was an excellent grain farmer. His farm was divided between his two sons Karl and John Gottlieb upon his death in 1861. Christian G. Puscheck was one of the "founding fathers" who obtained permission from the Zion Lutheran church in Addison (where German Lutherans had to go for services), to form a school district in Proviso in 1852. The Puschecks intermarried with the Ahrens, Boeger, Degener and Heidorn families. Friedrich Ahrens owned land next to the Puschecks.

The German families who settled Westchester created the southern school district of the Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church in Addison (now located in Bensenville on Church Road). The nine founding fathers of the 1853 school were Heinrich and Friedrich Degener, Heinrich and Friedrich Volberding, Heinrich Mesenbrink, Heinrich Evers, Christian Puscheck, and Wilhelm Mandel. Dedicated to the education of their children, they founded the Immanuel Lutheran congregation in 1858 and built a larger school. It served as a church for ten years until the completion of a white Gothic church. The forty acres of the church were not incorporated into Hillside until 1958. Sadly, this landmark burned down in 1975. Many of the early Westchester settlers' graves can be seen in the 1880 Immanuel Lutheran cemetery. Their contributions led to the creation of the future town of Westchester. Stay tuned for part two of the continuing story of the local 19th century families in the next edition.

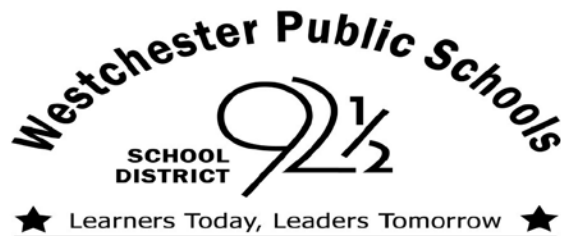

We had our 3rd Annual Westchester Pre-K Health & Wellness Fair on Saturday, April 26 from 11:00-1:00PM. The Health and Wellness Fair was an opportunity for families to connect and engage together with music and movement, food, and other families. All children aged 3-5 years old and their families living in the Westchester area and surrounding communities were welcome to attend. The event was also intended to raise awareness of local resources and small businesses available in the Westchester area and nearby communities.

WPS Open House and Fine Arts Showcase was held on April 17th! The Westchester Primary School kindergarten, first-graders, and second graders gave live musical performances, showcased their artwork, and showcased their writing research for all to see. Kindergarten and first grade students researched their favorite animal, and the second graders researched animals that help with pollination and seed dispersal. The event was a fantastic success to celebrate and showcase spring learning!

The WPTC/WPS Spring Book Fair event held in April was also successful. The Scholastic Spring Book Fair at WPS provides our school with funds to purchase books and resources to support all student learning.

In May, our students are participating in benchmark assessments, including the NWEA MAP (Measures of Academic Progress). This state-aligned computerized adaptive assessment program provides educators with the information they need to improve teaching and learning and make student-focused and data-driven decisions. Students are tested on MAP three times each year (fall, winter, and spring) in the areas of reading and math. The teachers use this growth and achievement data from MAP and other benchmark assessments to determine student growth for this school year, including student academic strengths and areas for growth.

Kindergarten Screenings and parent tours will be held at WPS by appointment on Thursday, May 22, 2025, from 9:00 AM - 6:00 PM for pre-registered students. Both a parent and pre-registered child must attend the screening. Preregistration began on April 8, 2025. Please check our website for more information or contact the School Office at 708-562-1509.

As the school year is coming to an end, WPS continues to engage students in learning and several special activities/celebrations. We will host the 92 1/2 Jazz Band. Their music and talent is unparalleled, and they inspired our students to be musicians. Our students are currently reflecting on their year-long growth in learning to prepare for our fabulous grade-level Victory Day celebrations. Additionally, the wonderful WPTC will sponsor our Second Grade Celebration, and Field Day is fast approaching.

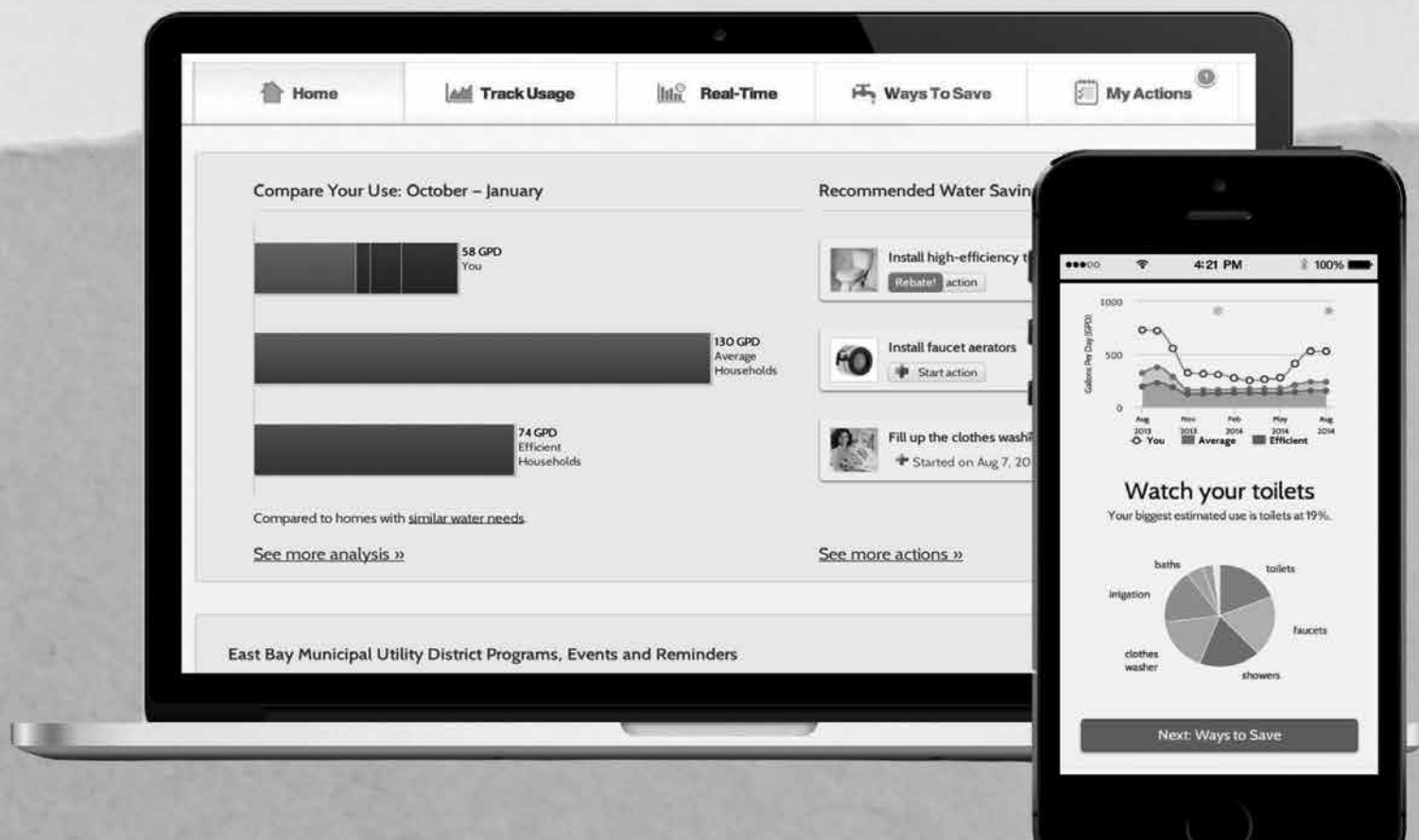
