The Village's Fall Shred Event, held in October, was once again a tremendous success! For those who may not be familiar, the Village hosts shred events twice a year — in April and October — to give residents the opportunity to safely and securely dispose of sensitive documents such as bank records, tax papers, and old receipts.

In addition to document shredding, residents can also drop off unused or expired prescription medications and recycle electronics, including televisions and computers. This year, we doubled our capacity by creating two lines of traffic, helping the event run even more smoothly.

A special thank you goes out to SBC Waste for generously donating a truck that allowed us to recycle the boxes and bags used to transport documents. Your continued participation and support make this community event possible!

At the October shred event, the Westchester Food Pantry reported cash donations in the amount of \$1,235 in addition to a carload of food that was donated. The Food Pantry has noticed a rise in the need to feed those in our community recently and are seeking more donations of food, funds and those able to donate their time this holiday season.

The Village of Westchester Water Department is asking for residents' help in collecting water samples from homes throughout the community. These samples play an important role in ensuring that our water quality remains safe and consistently monitored to protect the health of all residents.

To participate, visit our website to register. The Water Department will deliver empty water sample bottles directly to your home — simply fill them up and place them back on your front porch for collection. Your participation helps keep Westchester's water clean and our community healthy!

The Village of Westchester has been actively

engaged in a series of strategic planning sessions and would like to thank all residents who took the time to complete the community survey and participate in recent focus groups. Your input is invaluable in shaping the Village's future direction.

The next step in this process will involve the Village Board and department heads working together to outline key priorities and goals for the next five years. These efforts will help ensure that the Village continues to serve residents efficiently and plan thoughtfully for future growth and improvement.

The Village Board recently approved the creation of a Veterans and Senior Commission. The two newly implemented commissions are seeking interested volunteers to help support both missions of working with veterans and our seniors in our community.

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.



HOLIDAY DECORATING

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.



HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.



Before Heading Out or to Bed

Blow out lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Turn off all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

- (!) More than **one-third** of home decoration fires are started by candles.
- (!) More than two of every five decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.

Alpine Food Shop: A Westchester Favorite

Westchester's Alpine Food Shop has become a local favorite known not just for its famous subs, but for its family roots, friendly faces, and the welcoming energy that keeps customers coming back.

Even an hour after the lunch rush, the Alpine Food Shop is buzzing with people — a familiar sight in Westchester. Though this location opened only in 2017, it already feels like a community staple.

The Westchester shop is the second Alpine location; the original in Elmwood Park opened in 1955. The name came from the **Barbi family**, the original owners, who hailed from northern Italy and were inspired by the mountains they loved.

Over time, the Bonaccorsi family acquired Alpine and, noticing many regular customers lived south and west of Elmwood Park, decided to expand. **Stevie Bonaccorsi**, working with his uncles and aunts John, Rob, Amy, and Kathy, led the charge to open the new spot on 31st

An entrepreneur at heart, Stevie also runs a firewood delivery service and a Christmas tree business.

He brought several of his employees into Alpine, helping the business grow steadily from day one

Loyal customers from Elmwood Park followed, and new faces from Westchester, Oak Brook, La Grange, and beyond soon became regulars.

During peak seasons, Alpine employs up to 35 people, with lunch hours bringing in a lively crowd.

Alpine's menu features their famous **Italian Sub**, the top seller, followed closely by the **Turkey Sub**.

They also serve pasta and potato

salads, frozen Nottoli sausage, Massa pizzas, and locally produced frozen steaks and burgers.

Alpine proudly stocks area favorites like Local Style and Broad Ripple potato chips — with fun flavors such as Hot Dog, Beef, and Deep Dish Pizza. Stevie says that his family system helped him immensely in learning how to manage teams, work efficiently, and build customer trust.

He prides himself on how customers are treated:

"We want to make personal connections, make for a good experience, and a welcoming feel. I want coming into Alpine to be more than just getting a good sandwich, but also a great experience."

That commitment to warmth shines through in the words of one regular customer:

"If I'm ever feeling down, I love to stop by here. There is always such a warm, welcoming feeling walking into the store full of happiness. It gives me joy to see such a well-mannered and polite young group of people."

Stevie credits the community's support — and word-of-mouth — as the shop's best advertising.


He is especially thankful for members of the Westchester Chamber of Commerce, including John Watson, who helped Alpine join the Village's Party in the Park event ("a wonderful experience," Stevie says), and Judy Saraceno Swenson, a loyal supporter of the staff and business.

Protecting Our Vehicles from Auto Thefts and Break-Ins

As we go about our daily routines, it's important to stay vigilant in protecting our vehicles from theft and break-ins.

A moment of convenience — such as leaving your car running while getting gas or running into a store — can quickly turn into a costly mistake.

Many busy gas stations and shopping areas have lookouts waiting for that very opportunity.

In just seconds, your car can be gone, leaving you stranded and still making monthly payments on a vehicle that may never be recovered.

Take a few extra seconds to turn off your engine, remove your keys, lock your doors, and roll up your windows every time you step away.

Never leave your vehicle running or unattended — even for a short time.

Avoid placing your wallet or purse in the trunk of your car; thieves often watch for drivers to do this, then break the trunk lock and disappear with your belongings before anyone even notices.

Whenever possible, park in well-lit, high-traffic areas and avoid isolated spots.

Don't leave valuables in plain view, and consider investing in a car alarm system with GPS tracking to increase the chances of recovery if your vehicle is stolen.

Auto theft remains one of the most common crimes across the country.

Stolen vehicles are often dismantled for parts and shipped overseas — a major reason thieves target high-value vehicles like Rolls-Royces, Hyundai Sonatas, Chevy Silverados, and Ford Super Duty pickup trucks. With today's trucks and SUVs often costing between \$60,000



and \$100,000, taking extra precautions is well worth the investment.

Sometimes, the best protection is still the simplest — use a visible steering wheel lock like "The Club" or a locking device for your gas pedal. These tools act as strong deterrents for opportunistic thieves.

Remember: Always be aware of your surroundings and belongings. A few small safety steps can prevent a major loss.

Tips to Prevent Auto Theft

- 1. Turn Off and Lock Up Always shut off the engine, remove your keys, lock your doors, and roll up all windows — even if you're stepping away for just a moment.
- 2. Park Smart Choose well-lit, high-traffic areas and avoid isolated spots, especially at night.
- 3. Keep Valuables Out of Sight Never leave purses, wallets, electronics, or bags visible in your car.

Store them at home or out of view before reaching your destination.

- 4. Invest in Security Install a car alarm and consider a GPS tracking device to improve recovery chances if your vehicle is stolen.
- 5. Use a Visible Deterrent A steering wheel lock or gas pedal lock can discourage thieves and make your vehicle less of a target.

Village branch collection for October will be the week of October 6th - 10th

November's collection will be the week of November 3rd – 7th (last collection of the year)

The Public Works Department will collect branches the <u>first full **working** week</u> <u>of every month</u> (April-November)

- All brush must be put out on the front parkway by 7:00 a.m. on your designated collection day. Branches can be up to 7 feet in length and stacked with the butt ends facing the street in the same direction. If not stacked properly, a "restack" notice will be left.
- Again, please put ALL brush out on your designated collection day and Public Works crews will determine what constitutes an open load, which will be picked up later in the week.
- An open load would include any brush that will not fit through the chipper such as logs, stumps, and large limbs. These must be cut for one man to lift. Dirt must be removed from any root balls for pickup.
- Public Works Crews will only pass through a designated pickup area once due to time, scheduling, and other workload responsibilities.

Landscapers & tree services are responsible for their own debris disposal.

<u>Please note the following schedule for branch pickup:</u>

MONDAY: From Mannheim Rd west to Wolf Rd and from Canterbury St south to Windsor Dr-including both sides of Windsor Dr. Also Waterford, Waverly, Camelot and Concord.

TUESDAY: Roosevelt Rd south to Cermak Rd-from Gardner Rd west to

Mannheim Rd.

WEDNESDAY: From Roosevelt Rd north to the expressway and from Gardner Rd west to Mannheim Rd. Also, Roosevelt Rd south to Canterbury St from Haase Ave west to Heidorn Ave.

THURSDAY: From Belleview Ave west to Wolf Rd, Martindale Dr south to 31st Street.

Weekly yard waste collection by S.B.C. began on your first rubbish collection day in April.

- If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.
- You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.,) at the curb every week for collection. Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.
- S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), at no additional charge, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, univer-

sal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Leaf & Snow Reminders

As leaves fall, please remember DO NOT pile, blow, or rake your leaves into the street. This causes storm sewer problems which leads to flooding, and it is against Village Code. Yard waste is collected by S.B.C. through the end of December. Public Works crews keep our streets free of snow and ice during the winter months.

Please assist us by observing the following:

- Place garbage cans 3 feet behind the curb line- do not place them in the street.
- Do not shovel or blow snow back into the cleared streets.
- Please observe the "NO PARKING SNOW ROUTE" signs.
- -The snow portion of the signs will be enforced after 2 inches of snowfall between December 1st and March 31st.

Street Parking Restrictions

From April 1 through November 30, parking restrictions are in effect to support street maintenance activities. Please check posted street signs carefully—it is unlawful to park or leave a vehicle parked during designated weekday hours on streets marked for maintenance.

These restrictions help ensure our streets stay clean and well-maintained. These restrictions are for one side of the street, once a week, 7am-3pm as designated by posted signage.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resi-

dent. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence.

Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.

2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program. The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village.

George F. Nixon

The most prolific developer in Westchester was George F. Nixon and Company. Nixon developed the areas south of Roosevelt Road. Westchester's town center was to be developed around the train line coming down from Roosevelt Road past Canterbury Station and expanding towards Mannheim Road following the curve of Balmoral Avenue. The Nixon company drew up an intricate map in 1930 of its planned development area designating specific sites for single family homes, apartments, and businesses. Lots were to be extra wide to meet new fire codes; only brick was to be used; land was to be set aside for parks and recreation; and strict zoning laws were to be applied. The most amazing aspect about George Nixon is that he was able to continue investing, expanding, and developing in Westchester in the wake of the huge economic downturn of the Great Depression. His company provided affordable homes for new residents in the postwar years, realizing a second building boom in the village in the 1940s and 1950s.

George Frederick Nixon was born on January 26,1892, the oldest of four children, to a mother of German heritage. His father was from Kentucky, a salesman of medical instruments who later worked many years for the Rapid Transit Lines. George himself grew up in Chicago then married twice, first to Elise Witte, with whom he had a son Robert G. and a daughter Consuelo (m. Gould). After Elise died in 1930 he married Mildred Virginia McCloy in 1933, at her grandmother's home near Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He then took Mildred on a honeymoon to California via Chicago on his own plane. Later they had a son, Carver. Mr. Nixon enjoyed playing polo and being an aviator. He had a penthouse home on Sheridan Road in the Edgewater Beach Apartments. He also acquired a mansion in Glenview set on 160 acres from business partner William H. Colvin, with whom he jointly developed forty apartment suites at 1550 North State Street in 1944 to be rented out to war plant executives.

Nixon was there at the beginning of the founding of the town of Westchester in 1925. His headquarters and center of operations when the new model town of Westchester was founded on October 19, 1925, was a Chicago high-rise called the Nixon Building. It was located on the southwest corner of Clark and Monroe Streets. In 1925, Nixon was also expanding developments to the North Shore and Niles Center. The executive departments for those locations in 1925 were in his Uptown office on the southwest corner of Broadway and Wilson Avenues. Already in 1916 Samuel Insull was interested in continuing to develop the Northshore Line from Chicago to Milwaukee, to expand the reach of his utilities throughout the northern suburbs.

Knowing that Insull's utilities would be extended to the new western suburbs as well, Nixon invested five million dollars to develop Westchester. In 1926 Nixon created another "super suburb" in Northfield, which will celebrate its centennial next year. A train line called the

Skokie Valley Route, built from 1923 to 1926, created new

development projects along the right-of-way and new train stations for Nixon's company. Nixon developed part of his mansion's 160 acres, creating the luxury-home Glenayre section of Glenview around 1938. He built twenty houses in Skokie, across from the Evanston Golf Course, and in 1961, together with Irvin A. Blietz, Nixon developed King's Cove in Deerfield, bordering on Highland Park. At this time his brother Albert served as Vice-president of the Nixon Company, and his son Robert served on the executive board. Nixon also worked on homes in Highland Park Gardens, keeping several projects running at the same time. As for his offices, one was in Glenview, a colonial style office next to his home, and two others were also located in the northern suburbs.

During the Second World War, his company kept active by developing duplexes in Melrose Park for workers at the Buick plant. By 1942, ten duplexes were completed, some with three bedrooms along 1608-1618 Broadway Avenue. The homes were intended for war-time workers.

Nixon continued creating homes for the postwar families in Westchester. The first batch of those homes in 1947 was located on a block between Dickens and Canterbury along the streets of Manchester and Bristol and bordering Gardner Road. According to Shirley Slanker (whose husband ran the Westchester News and who was a prolific local historian) reported that Albert, Nixon's younger brother by twelve years, handled all the sales of the subdivided farmland of the Battermann farm. That farmhouse is still located on Cermak Road between Newcastle and Portsmouth.

The area became known as the Fairview Addition in 1948, featuring houses with more gingerbread decoration detailing. Starting in 1949 Nixon had an office in the Village Hall of Westchester on Roosevelt Road, with a five-year building plan for one thousand homes in Westchester in place. Also, in the late forties he donated a fifty-foot lot to the Divine Infant Church and School in order to expand their convent to house the Catholic sisters.

It is amazing what all Mr. Nixon accomplished in his lifetime. He was president of the Chicago Real Estate Board in 1928 and the Illinois Association of Real Estate Boards in 1932. In 1939 he was the first president of the Metropolitan Chicago Home Builder's Association. From 1940-1942 he was founder and president of the Home Builders Association of Greater Chicagoland. In addition, he was one of the founders of the National Association of Home Builders, acting as its first president in 1940, which led to him being inducted into that organization's Hall of Fame in 1977. From 1932 to 1934 he fought to lower people's taxes on the County Board of Appeals. For sixteen years, from 1938 to 1954, he was a suburban Cook County commissioner, running on the Re-

publican ticket until he retired. He advertised mostly in the Chicago Tribune for his projects and received a certificate from the newspaper for selling over one million dollars in the year 1959. Nixon was a noted public speaker, holding talks for audiences ranging from real estate groups to civic organizations such as Kiwanis. He also talked college students. Even though he did not attend college, he promoted the value of higher education in economics and business. While he himself traveled to places such as England, Puerto Rico and Honolulu to understand their community trends, he sent his top-selling salespeople on airplane trips to other cities in the nation to learn about sales and urban planning. His offices also set up a training school for sales staff. Most impressive of all, since becoming a home developer in 1913, he developed over 5000 acres in the Chicago suburbs. Quite a feat!

George F. Nixon died on September 25, 1975,

at the age of eighty-three. He was laid to rest at the famous Rosehill Cemetery in Chicago where a monument was placed for the Nixon family. Graves included his wife Mildred, his parents, and his son Robert G. Nixon. The George Nixon Elementary school in Westchester was named after him in 1931.

The George Nixon Forest Preserve of 500 acres was also established in his honor by a unanimous vote by the Forest Preserve Commission in1955. A part of it retained the original historic name of Harms Woods in a section within the Nixon Preserve adjoining Golf and Glenview Roads. As part of the centennial celebration, George F. Nixon should be remembered for developing a very large part of the village of Westchester.

New Water & Sewer Rates

These changes took effect July 1, 2025, following a professional rate study, and represent the next phase of the Village's multi-year plan to address aging infrastructure, comply with the State's Lead Service Line Replacement Mandate, and maintain long-term financial sustainability of our water and sewer systems.

New Rates Effective July 1, 2025:

- Water usage: \$19.21 per 1,000 gallons
- Sewer usage: \$4.03 per 1,000 gallons
- Water infrastructure fee: \$22 per month (\$44 per bill)
- Sewer infrastructure fee: \$15 per month (\$30 per bill)

The approved ordinance also includes a 10% increase in July 2026, a 5% increase in July 2027, and then annual increases of 3–5% to keep pace with infrastructure maintenance and water delivery costs.

Water Fixture Efficiency **Reimbursement Grant Program**

The Village of Westchester is offering a Water Fixture Efficiency Reimbursement Grant to assist low-income residents in reducing water usage and offsetting the cost of high-efficiency fixtures. Eligible residents can receive up to 90% reimbursement on the purchase and installation of lead-free toilets, faucets, and showerheads—with a lifetime household maximum of \$500.







How to Lower your Electricity Costs with Solar

At this time of increasing energy costs, you may be feeling there is little you can do about it. Fortunately, through the use of solar energy, you can reduce your energy costs and environmental impact.

Our sun's light and heat can be converted to direct current using solar panels. The efficiency of the conversion is improving with time and new technologies, but the average efficiency with existing panels that are currently available ranges from 18-20 %. Although the efficiency is low, the amount of energy from the sun is very high making solar energy a feasible, cost-effective means of generating your electricity in the long run.

Currently, electricity in the Westchester area of northern Illinois comes from a mixture of sources – nuclear power plants and burning of fossil fuels like natural gas, coal, etc. Burning of fossil fuels is not healthy for humans, other living creatures, and our environment. Nuclear energy, though thought to be a clean alternative, poses other risks mainly from creating radioactive waste and where to bury that waste. Solar energy is a very clean energy source.

The manufacturing of solar panels, like every

man-made material, impacts our environment, and has a carbon footprint, but that footprint is very small mainly because the panels are expected to be functional for 20-25 years.

In contrast, the environmental impact of fossil fuels is markedly higher because it is used (burned once) and more fuel must be continuously extracted, refined, transported and burned to create energy over the same 20-25 year period.

There are three ways that Westchester residents may reduce their electricity bills and their environmental impact by making the switch to solar energy:

Illinois Solar for All (ISFA) makes solar energy affordable to Illinois residents.



The goal of this program is to save homeowners and renters money on their electricity bills. ISFA provides the option of rooftop solar or a solar farm subscription. Residents can save up to \$1,000 annually off their electricity costs with rooftop solar (no cost for

installation) or at least 50% monthly off the energy portion of their bill, with a solar farm subscription.

The maximum household income to be eligible in Cook County is as follows:

1 person - \$67,150	2 people - \$76,750	3 people - \$86,350	4 people - \$95,900
5 people - \$103,600	6 people - \$111,250	7 people - \$118,950	8+ people - \$126,000

Rooftop Solar Purchase – Incentives that would apply regardless of the vendor you select are:

- State Solar Renewable Energy Credits (SRECs) can cover around 30% of cost
- Federal Tax Credit of 30% (this credit is available on systems installed and placed into service by 12/31/25)
- Utility Net Metering credits (help you pay back your system faster)
- * Note: If you choose to purchase your

solar system through the Solar Switch Group Buy Program, there is typically an additional savings of around \$4,600.

Solar Farm Subscriptions – The Illinois Shines Program allows you to subscribe to a large solar farm and receive cost-saving credits on your electricity bills, without installing panels. Savings are typically 10-15% off of the energy portion of your

Other Opportunities to Lower Your Energy Costs

Last call to take advantage of the Federal Energy Efficient Home Improvement Credit of up to 30% of the cost of purchase and installation.

Systems must be installed and placed into service by December 31, 2025. There are aggregate limits for this credit: \$1,200 limit for projects like a professional home energy audit; installing insulation; door,

window and electrical panel upgrades; and installing a high efficiency air-conditioning unit.

Recipe of the Month

This month try a little something different for breakfast. This recipe offers a sweet treat and maybe some new breakfast ingredients to consider.

Chocolate Banana Buckwheat Porridge

makes 1 serving

Ingredients

- \bullet $^{1}\!\!/_{\!3}$ cup roasted buckwheat groats
- 1¹/₄ cups unsweetened soy milk (or dairy-free milk of choosing)

1 banana, mashed

- 1 Tbsp Dutch-process cocoa powder
- 1 Tbsp tahin
- 1 tsp maple syrup, plus more to taste (optional)
- ¼ tsp pure vanilla extract
- ullet 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 pinch salt

Optional toppings:

- ullet 1 Tbsp unsalted roasted walnuts, chopped
- ½ Tbsp mini dark chocolate chips
- \bullet ½ tsp toasted sesame seeds

Instructions

1. Add the buckwheat and milk to a saucepan. Bring to a boil, reduce to a simmer, and cook covered with a lid for 15 minutes, stirring often.

- 2. When cooked, add the mashed banana, cocoa powder, tahini, maple syrup, vanilla, cinnamon, and salt. Stir until heated through.
- 3. Remove from the heat and cover with a lid. Let sit for 5 minutes. This helps to soften the grain further
- 4. Serve, add toppings as desired, and enjoy!
