# ANNUAL REPORT

#### **DEAR VILLAGE BOARD & CITIZENS OF WESTCHESTER,**

It's with great honor and privilege that we continue to serve the Westchester community.

Throughout 2023, Westchester firefighters remained tirelessly committed to our duties. We handled a total of 3,482 calls for service, marking a slight decrease of 3.7% compared to the previous year. Notably, responses to building fires also saw a decline of 19%, dropping from 42 to 34 incidents since 2022. Over the years, our call volume has generally trended upwards, with intermittent decreases in 2020 and 2023: 2018 - 2,890; 2019 - 3,238; 2020 - 3,135; 2021 - 3,292; 2022 - 3,615; and 2023 - 3,482.

Our operations are centralized across 2 fire stations situated at 10240 Roosevelt Road (Station 25) and 10760 Cermak Road (Station 26). Each shift is staffed with 9 authorized personnel, ensuring a minimum of 6 Firefighter/Paramedics remain on duty around the clock. At Station 25, 2 staff members man the ambulance, 2 operate a Rescue Squad/Ladder Truck, while Station 26 is manned by 2 staff members operating the Engine. At full capacity, our department boasts 28 firefighters and 1 non-commissioned employee.

As of the beginning of 2023, we started with a staffing level of 25 commissioned personnel and 1 non-commissioned employee, including 1 Fire Chief, 3 Captains, 3 Lieutenants, 18 Firefighter/Paramedics, and 1 Part-Time Administrative Assistant, with 3 vacancies.

Throughout the year, several members left the department for various reasons: Firefighter/Paramedic Mitch Zable on March 2nd, Firefighter/Paramedic Matt Rouleau on March 31st, Firefighter/Paramedic Dan Honea on June 26th, Firefighter/Paramedic Zach Heiderman on August 26th, and Captain Scot Stauber on December 15th. On a positive note,

Probationary Firefighter/Paramedic Carlos Ward joined us on September 18th, followed by Probationary Firefighter/Paramedic Reilly Curran on September 25th.

By the end of 2023, our staffing level decreased to 22 commissioned personnel and 1 non-commissioned employee, with 1 Fire Chief, 2 Captains, 3 Lieutenants, 16 Firefighter/Paramedics, and 1 Part-Time Administrative Assistant, leaving 6 vacancies.

Looking ahead, the next eligibility test is scheduled for February 11, 2024.


## NEW **EQUIPMENT**

In 2023, with the support of the Village Board, the Fire Department was able to continue replacing outdated equipment and purchase new equipment to enhance the quality of services we provide to our residents.

- 4 MORE AED'S WERE PLACED INTO SERVICE FOR POLICE DEPARTMENT PATROL VEHICLES WITH THE GOAL OF IMPROVING CARDIAC SURVIVAL OF RESIDENTS.
- 2 AED'S AND CABINETS WERE INSTALLED AT VILLAGE HALL WITH THE GOAL OF IMPROVING CARDIAC SURVIVAL OF RESIDENTS.
- BLEEDING CONTROL STATIONS HAVE BEEN INSTALLED IN DISTRICT 92 ½ SCHOOLS AND VILLAGE HALL AS PART OF OUR ACTIVE SHOOTER PREPAREDNESS PROGRAM.
- THE DEPARTMENT RECEIVED A FEMA ASSISTANCE TO FIREFIGHTERS GRANT (AFG) THAT WILL PROVIDE INTEROPERABLE MOBILE AND PORTABLE RADIOS.

Property losses due to fire amounted to approximately \$383,355.00 in 2023. The Fire Department saved approximately \$415,000 of property in 2023.

## EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

All fire personnel assigned to shifts are licensed as paramedics by the State of Illinois.

The Westchester Fire Department staffs 1 paramedic, advanced life support ambulance 24 hours per day. Medic 25 is based at 10240 Roosevelt Road (Station 25).

75% (2,618) OF THE DEPARTMENT'S RESPONSES IN 2023 WERE EMERGENCY MEDICAL AND RESCUE CALLS.

Due to our ambulance being already committed on calls, mutual aid ambulances from nearby communities responded into Westchester 357 times in 2023 to care for Westchester residents. 285 times, Westchester residents were transported to the hospital by a mutual aid ambulance from another community.

Not counted in our EMS responses, during 2023, we assisted residents 336 times from their car to into the house; from the house to the car; or assisted them moving from one location in a residence to another location in the residence. This type of call is called a patient assist.



### **TRAINING**

Part of the firefighter's creed is a dedication to training. At the Westchester Fire Department, we do not train to minimum performance standards, we train to be able to be at our best when our residents need us.

### **COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION**

In 2022, the department re-joined the Be Alarmed Smoke Detector Program to provide and install free smoke detectors to residents. "Be Alarmed!" is a fire safety education and smoke alarm installation program administered cooperatively between the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance (IFSA) and the Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal (OSFM). The program distributes fire safety education materials and 10-year sealed battery smoke alarms to fire departments in the state of Illinois.



The fire departments then deliver the education while installing smoke alarms in at-risk homes within their communities. Both the educational materials and smoke alarms are provided at no cost as a result of funding from both the IFSA and OSFM.

The program was developed to educate Illinois residents on the dangers of fire in the home and how to prevent fires from occurring in the home, as well as to ensure there are working smoke alarms properly installed in homes. By providing 10-year concealed battery smoke alarms, it ensures that the power source cannot be removed from the unit and, if properly maintained, will last the life of the device.

DURING 2023, 70 SMOKE ALARMS WERE INSTALLED IN WESTCHESTER HOMES BY OUR FIREFIGHTERS AT NO COST, AND THE DEPARTMENT CONDUCTED 3 SMOKE DETECTOR CANVASSES OF THE IMMEDIATE BLOCK NEAR RESIDENTIAL BUILDING FIRES THAT OCCURRED IN THE VILLAGE.

### **COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION**

In 2022, the department began training instructors to deliver Stop the Bleed training to our citizens. This training teaches citizens how to control life threatening bleeding as a result of accidents or violence. We plan to offer this training in 2024 as an add-on to our CPR/AED courses. The department will also

be deploying more bleeding control stations in 2024.



It is the goal of the Westchester Fire Department to train as many residents as possible, at no cost, to perform CPR and use an AED. In 2023, we issued 48 CPR cards to residents and 5 to firefighters.

In 2022, 3 Westchester firefighters were trained as certified child passenger safety technicians and can provide education and assistance with car seat selection and installation. Our technicians installed 7 car seats in vehicles during 2023.





In 2023, we continued to provide fire extinguisher training to businesses in the village. In 2024, our goal is to purchase a new live fire extinguisher training prop to expand this training to Westchester residents.
